Each member has had a special contribution to make and I thank you most sincerely for your loyalty, love and support. Thank you to those who have given extra time to make things run smoothly. A very big thank you to the ladies who have been gracious hostesses for our special visitors, providing beds and food and arranging outings.

A special thank you to Mrs Marie McCann and Mrs Edith Ridge, who have been wonderful secretaries during my term as President, and without whom I could not have managed. Thank you to Mrs Dorothy Lumb our very hard-working and efficient Treasurer, and to all members of Executive.

It has been a privilege to be your representative at many meetings of sister organisations. I have greatly enjoyed getting to know what other women are thinking and doing. There has been a feeling of warmth and friendship as I've talked about A.C.W. and what we do.

In July, 1989 we were pleased to meet with our (then) National President, Rev. Lee Edwards and with Mrs Muriel Olsson, an aboriginal lady who travelled around the state units for 'Operation Understanding'. What a wonderful person Muriel is! We wish her God's blessing as she goes to represent her people at the A.C.W.C. Conference in Jakarta in November this year.

The National Conference of A.C.W. was held in Perth from 11th to 15th September 1989. The theme was 'Come, Holy Spirit, Come' and it

truly was a spirit-filled time. The venue, speakers and Bible studies were outstanding as was the warm fellowship. Twelve ladies from N.S.W. attended, despite a national air strike, proving that God still works miracles. We were so proud of our N.S.W. friends who were installed as the National Executive for the next two-year term. Pray for Mrs Marie McCann and her Executive as they plan for the National Conference in Sydney in 1991.

Our Winifred Kiek scholar for 1989, Miss Failautusi Teb'ati visited us in October. This was her last stop after visiting the other State units. She was a delight to meet and with the aid of a video on Kiribati, gave us a very good picture of her homeland, her people and their way of life.

We have had excellent speakers at our Council meetings. Mrs Dorothy Harris, one of our delegates, an aboriginal lady, wife of Rev. Charles Harris of the Aboriginal & Islander Congress of the Uniting Church, gave us much to think about as she told of her struggles in our society. Mrs Hermine Partamian, of the A.C.C. Refugee and Migrant Services told us her story as a refugee in Europe, the U.S.A., and as a migrant in Australia. Although she speaks five languages, it was impossible for her to find work in countries where her status was 'displaced person'. Her story made us aware of the need of love and friendship to migrant women. We recommend Hermine to you if you are looking for a good speaker, but be prepared to be moved and challenged!

The incoming President, Mrs Major Joan Tong introduced herself to us in a very charming way at our February meeting this year. You, with me, will wish her much joy and blessing as she takes on this task for the next two years.

May the love of God enfold you and His Spirit guide and sustain you.

- * The chance to see the Branch banners again at the May service.
- * The visit of President Lee Edwards and Muriel Oleson to our unit and Muriel's amazing witness through her life story.
- * The chance to take our visitors on two occasions to the beautiful Blue Mountains, on the Harbour and to Terrigal.
- * The visit of W.K.S. scholar, Failautusi Teb'ati from Kiribati.
- * Dorothy Harrie's witness in her story and the faith she showed in the time of her husband's serious illness.

- * Getting-to-know Joan Tong, President-Elect, who told us of her pilgrimage in the faith.
- * The moving story that Hermine Partamian brought to us out of her experience as a displaced person and a migrant to Australia.
- * The privilege of several of our Council members in celebrating with the Catholic Church in Sydney, the 25th Anniversary of the Promulgation of Vatican II's Decree on Ecumenism.
- * The lovely Christmas devotions brought to us by Doreen Moore.
- * The National Conference in Perth. In a time of a national air strike the twelve N.S.W. women who ventured forth in faith proved once again that God honours those who love and serve and trust Him. This Conference will always be remembered for the times of worry and difficulty we had in attending it and in returning home, but we will remember more than that. The West Australian Executive provided us with a wonderful week of Conference when we came close to our sisters from other State units and to previously unknown women who showed their compassion and friendship when we most needed them.
- * The pride and joy we experienced as our friends from the N.S.W. Unit were installed into office at the Perth Conference.

Our delegates to other organisations have been faithful in attending for our Unit. We thank them.

The Special Days attendances continue to grow, as more women in our branches share in Fellowship Day and World Community Day. We are pleased to report new branches in several places.

Collections at the Special Days are gradually rising, also.

Some of our members have benefitted from attending the Migrant Workshops held by A.C.C.

I represent the unit at the Committee in N.S.W. for the Decade of Churches' Solidarity with Women and find it a most worthwhile meeting. Membership of the committee extends past the usual mainstream denominations to members of several ethnic Churches. We continue to learn from one another.

The Newsette Editor and Manager continue to bring to us a Magazine both interesting and worthwhile. They are ably supported by their committee members, as are the other Convenors.

We are grateful to the Uniting Church for the use of the meeting room monthly and for other rooms as we need them from time to time.

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FELLOWSHIP OF THE LEAST COIN ANNUAL REPORT

This year FLC celebrates 33 years of service and we rejoice in the knowledge that it keeps on growing. It is a fellowship for prayer and reconciliation and the tangible evidence of our commitment to these acts, is the giving of our 'least coins'. Without these three elements of Prayer, Reconciliation and Giving, FLC is robbed of its full meaning.

It is a time of joy each year at the World Community Day services when we bring our offerings for dedication. The collections grow each year as more and more women take part in this world-wide fellowship.

To help us in our knowledge of our sisters around the world, the world committee of FLC produces the prayer booklet 'Circle of Prayer'. We are currently using number 11, Justice... Peace... Creation... Let us Act! Copies of this booklet are available on request; just ring the Convenor, Patricia Burke who will be pleased to post you one.

The World Committee allocates grants to many countries each year. As we give, so the work can grow. Three grants have just been announced for projects in Australia - for Women's Prison Chaplaincy in South Australia, for Leadership Training for women in New Guinea and for a church programme about Women, the Church and Domestic Violence. The lists of projects are published by us in Newsette, look for them.

Our FLC Convenor, Patricia is at present away overseas, but she especially asked that mention might be made in this report done on her behalf, of her concern about the importance of clean water for all people of the world. Pat has been privileged in the last twelve months to be part of a team of Catholic Relief to Tanzania and visited partner church agencies in East and Southern Africa. There she

became aware of the huge problems faced by the people because of the spread of AIDS. Pat's own words as printed in the May copy of Newsletter express better than I can what she feels about the importance of water.

'I have been thinking very much lately about this precious gift from God (water), which is so essential to our life and yet of which millions of people have so little, and what many have is contaminated and brings disease and death. I would like to ask A.C.W. members, maybe once each day, when having a drink of water - could we say a prayer for the many in the world who do not have a supply of clean water, to be provided for?'

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WINIFRED KIEK SCHOLARSHIP REPORT

The purpose of this scholarship is to provide supplementary training for a Christian woman from the Asian, Indian or Pacific areas.

Our 1988 Scholar, Rashmira Maharjan from Nepal was able to eventually undertake a course of study at the Bible School in Singapore, which she found most helpful and stimulating. (Rashmira's earlier enrolment had been delayed because of her husband's eye surgery and recovery therefrom and we give thanks to God that Rashmira was able to proceed as arranged.)

Our scholar for 1989, Failautusi Tab'ati (Faylotus) from the Republic of Kiribati (Kiribus) had a very successful year studying at the Edwards International Secretarial College, Perth, Western Australia. She was also able to have work experience at the Anglican and Uniting Church Offices as well as the Y.W.C.A.

Fay was a delightful lass and endeared herself to all those she met. She spoke at many meetings and services in all States of Australia and showed slides of her beautiful island home and told of her work there as Secretary of the Women's Fellowship of the Kiribati Protestant Church.

An electric typewriter was presented to Fay to take back to Kiribati to assist with her work. This was inscribed 'Given to the Women's Fellowship of the Kiribati Protestant Church from Australian Church Women 1989'.

We are looking forward to welcoming Miss Doreen Tie Chin Bing from Sarawak, Malaysia, our 1990 Scholar. She will be coming to Sydney to study specialised teaching of intellectually handicapped children with the Developmental Disabilities Services Training School and also do some practical work with the special schools servicing this work.

We pray that God will bless and guide all our Winifred Kiek scholars and especially those in troubled areas.

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PROMOTION

During the year past, 36 branches have held Fellowship Day Services and 39 branches have held World Community Day Services. For the most part, branches reported good numbers present although, in some cases, weather conditions in July spoiled the Fellowship Day attendances.

The World Community Day theme, 'Bridging the Gap', followed closely on that of Fellowship Day and it, too, proved to be a great spiritual blessing in all areas.

The beautiful hymns written by Margaret Knauerhase were given special mention in many of the reports. Reference was also made to the helpful explanation given concerning the background, activities and purpose of A.C.W. by many speakers on both Special Days.

A great deal of interest has been expressed in some new areas in both city and country, and several Information Kits and letters explaining F.L.C. have been sent out during the year. We pray that this interest will lead to the formation of new branches.

I would especially thank the willing team of helpers on Packing Days; they made a heavy task much lighter and were a wonderful source of encouragement to me personally.

We pray for continued support for this vital ecumenical movement of ours, that with the Lord's help we will come to see a closer association of Christian women's groups praying for peace and love in the hearts of His people. Surely the need has never been greater for us to hold hands and reach out in love, a united Christian front.

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Chatswood/Willoughby

I am pleased to report on another successful year of activities in the Chatswood/Willoughby Branch of ACW.

Our Banner has been displayed at functions at both local and State level and has had a fringe and better top added.

Fellowship Day was held at the Clanwilliam Street Uniting Church, Willoughby on 28 July 1989, when Mrs Major Pam Alley was speaker, Mrs Stanley soloist and Mrs Quamby organist. Luncheon, followed by a brisk discussion of questions by Mrs Alley, proved popular. Offering was \$105 and 36 ladies were present.

World Community Day was held in the Salvation Army, Chatswood on 30 October. Speaker was Brig. Offering was \$94.73; Fellowship of Least coin \$378.81; 67 ladies were present and supper was provided.

On 16 February a well patronised stall was held when an amount of \$326 was raised, of which \$20 was allocated to Partners with Asian Church women; \$200 to Community Aid and \$100 to Helpmates. In 1989 \$50 was sent to State Units Travel fund.

Mrs Frances Gray, our Treasurer attends local Inter-agency meetings to keep the work of ACW before the local community.

Some members were able to attend the annual service at Central Baptist Church in May, 1989. We thank the Lord for another year of Fellowship and friendship at Inter-denominational level in this area.

The City Branch is healthy and strong. Members of the branch donated a large amount for a gift for Bronwen as a token of thanks to her. Mrs Vi Minty of St Philip's was elected as President and Mrs Minty presided at both services in 1989.

Miss Glyn Robinson represented the State Unit on the N.S.W. Council for Children's Films & Television. Glyn's experience and work in the film industry well qualified her for that role and she kept us up to date on what was happening. Many letters and telephone calls to film and television producers and A.P.'s have followed up the notices brought to our attention.

The number of city churches unable to attend our meetings during the week has been a cause of concern and during the year a special meeting was called to pray and discuss this matter. It was overwhelmingly agreed to change at least one of our meetings in 1990 to a Saturday, in the form of discussion group and this is in the process of being implemented.

We look back on a year of fellowship with each other and with our Saviour. We rejoice over friendships which have grown during the year and we praise God for the loyalty and support of all the churches. We look to 1990 as a 'stepping out in faith and obedience' year. The aim is to reach more and more women in the city churches, those who are members and those who sleep in the doorways of those same churches, all made in the image of God.
