THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

As from

All Saints' Rectory, Petersham.

21st June, 1939.

Dear People of All Saints',

Because I had no opportunity of doing so before leaving home, I am writing this from Brisbane in perfect Queensland winter conditions. The injunction "go away and forget all about Petersham" cannot be obeyed until this is ready for the printer at the end of the month! In any case, I'm not so sure I want to "forget all about Petersham": like every parish it has its problems and disappointments—not the least being those who are apathetic and indifferent to the things that matter most—but at the same time it has its encouragements, and a rector would be less than human if he did not wonder occasionally how things are going in his absence.

You probably forget sometimes that although we do have to wear our collars the wrong way round, we are just human beings, as you are; prone to become discouraged, disappointed, and generally "fed-up"! Obviously, if you want the best from your clergy (as you do) you are not going to get it by discouraging them by your lack of interest, such as attending church one Sunday out of ten, or by not coming at all! Most people are wonderfully responsive to a little encouragement, and the clergy are not devoid of ordinary human feelings.

The July Chronicle reminds us that it is time to prepare in earnest for our forthcoming Consecration Festival in August. Will you commence, at once, to get in touch with all former parishioners and invite them to come back for worship in their old parish church at least once on Sunday, August 20? This will again be observed as a "Back-to-All Saints'" Sunday, when we hope to commemorate the 37th anniversary of the consecration of our Parish Church. We also plan to have the usual Tea Meeting and Re-union of parishioners past and present on Wednesday, August 23rd.

This is just a preliminary notice of our plans for the Festival; full details will be supplied in next month's Chronicle.

Upon our Festival Sunday—August 20—the boxes we are using, in lieu of a fete, will be called in and presented. If you are amongst those who were not able to assist by taking a box, we will provide you with a special envelope in the August Chronicle, in which you are invited to place your special offering. If we are to attain our objective—£200—we shall require the utmost co-operation of all our people.

Confirmation classes I hope to commence during the first week in August, and I would earnestly ask that parents and friends of our young people may give them every help and encouragement in this most important matter of Confirmation. I know you cannot decide for them, but your attitude towards their religious life and your enthusiasm (or lack of it) for Christ and His Church will perhaps either make or mar a decision which they have to make at this most critical period in their lives. It should not be necessary to remind parents and godparents of the solemn charge given when the children were brought for Baptism: "Ye are to **TAKE CARE** that this child be brought to the Bishop **TO BE CONFIRMED BY HIM.**" If numbers warrant it, I shall be pleased to arrange a special preparation class for adults who may desire to present themselves for Confirmation.

The interchange of pulpits postponed from Whitsunday, will take place on Sunday evening, July 23. I am not at present able to tell you who will be the preacher at All Saints', but I am relying on you to give him a good Anglican welcome. You can best do this by your presence at that service.

Sorrow has come into many homes during the past month by reason of bereavement. I pray that the Holy Spirit may, in special measure, come into the hearts and minds of those who are sad. Human sympathy is very helpful, but we need something more at these times, and that is a sustaining power which can only come from God. All Saints' lost a good friend in the Home Call of Mrs. Hordern, for so many years a parishioner and worshipper in our parish church; who, even after leaving Petersham, retained her love for and interest in All Saints', and whose interest and support of the Women's work in the parish was unflinching. The passing of these more senior members of our church family is surely a challenge to those who are younger to fill in the gaps and to take up the work which was so dear to their hearts and so loyally performed.

The Rector has received the following from His Grace, the Archbishop:—

Chain Letters.

"My attention has been directed to a Chain Letter, which is being circulated with instructions that the receiver must send it on to four persons to whom they wish prosperity. Instances are given of good luck which followed the receipt of the letter, and warnings that the breaking of the chain will involve the person guilty in serious misfortune.

"You may like to warn the readers of your parish paper against giving countenance to a superstition of this kind. No one has any right to demand that you shall further their private fancies, and no one has any authority to assume that destiny can be controlled by such a process as forwarding letters. If we are to be true to the higher conception of the providence of God we must decline any part in such proceedings.

"Chain letters of this kind make their appearance periodically. Sometimes they originate in a disordered mind, but there are not wanting instances in which they have done untold harm."

THE RECTOR'S LETTER TO THE SENIOR GIRLS AND BOYS

Dear Girls and Boys:

Once again the time has come round for a special letter to those who are approaching Confirmation age. I hope to commence Preparation classes during the first week in August; you will hear the exact dates given out at Church and Sunday School. Meanwhile, I want you to think very seriously about this important matter.

Of course, **no one** can decide this question **FOR** you. Whilst parents and friends will, I hope, advise you, the desire for Confirmation, if it is to be of any real value in your life, must come from **YOU**.

Growing up must bring responsibilities and the problem of making decisions. Put very simply, it means that you are facing a choice between two ways of life—between life for God and life for self. If you choose the former, you will soon find that you have chosen the harder way, which will need a constant effort of will to put your choice into practice. Your church knows all about the difficulties of choosing the **unselfish** way, and after your Confirmation, admits you to Holy Communion so that you may obtain more strength and courage for the difficult, but worthwhile task which faces you.

I don't want you to get the idea that Confirmation is a prize for specially good people. It is a gift of help for those who feel they are not good enough and who want to be better. Like all gifts, it depends upon **how much you make use of it**. You must see that no one can give you his religion. He may tell you about it, advise you, guide you; but it is not **yours** until you use it, and claim it as your own. There are many good reasons why you should be confirmed, but I will give you only three: (1) To claim Christianity as your own religion; (2) to claim the gift God has to offer you at Confirmation; and (3) to claim the privilege of becoming a full member of the Christian Church.

Unless you are absolutely and thoroughly in earnest about it, I would rather you did **not** present yourselves for preparation. I have seen so many young people who just came along for Confirmation and then gradually drifted away from the church, attending their Communion perhaps at Christmas and Easter, and some of them not coming at all. They could not have been really in earnest when they made their promises at Confirmation, or they would not have become numbered amongst the "drifters."

The Archbishop desires that all candidates for Confirmation should be not less than fourteen years of age, but if you attain that age on or before October 29 (the day of the Confirmation Service) you will be eligible for preparation. Before attending classes, it is necessary for you to be able to say when and where you were baptised.

Lastly, you must be prepared to attend classes **regularly**, and you will be required to attend church at least once per Sunday. Intending candidates will please give their names and addresses to Mr. Gardner or to me before July 31st.

May God the Holy Spirit guide you in making your decision.
