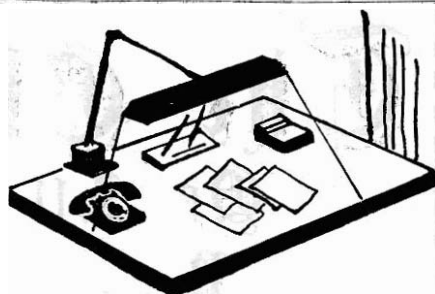

From your Minister's Desk



My dear friends,

It's some time ago now since it happened. One day my door-bell rang. There was a man of middle to late years waiting when I opened the door. He said something like "Would you like a sentence sign for your notice board?" I must admit my reply was a puzzled "How do you mean?" He went on to tell me of a Church notice board bearing a sentence that had impressed him and suggested I might use it here at All Saints'. The message he'd read ran—

"IF GOD SEEMS FAR AWAY, GUESS WHO MOVED?"

It is good, isn't it? We so often tend to blame God for our own inadequacies and failures.

One of the most encouraging truths revealed to us in His Word is that He doesn't change. He's always reliable. "He is the same yesterday, today and forever" says Hebrews 13: 8. And James in his epistle tells us "He is the Father of lights with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change." That's a very re-assuring word.

But we are fickle. We blow hot and cold. All manner of things can change our attitudes. One moment our feelings will be running buoyant, the next even the smallest disappointment at times can have us "plumbing the depths"! Then we throw a "Why didn't you do something, God?" against heaven! And we begin to wonder whether 'any-one is there' anyway.

Recently I had the responsibility of ministering in a situation which brought great sorrow to a family. In the midst of a conversation one of the family suggested that God had failed to prevent grief. I couldn't help asking when they had thought about Him before. I was very impressed by their honesty as they quietly admitted they couldn't recall.

We do tend to be like that, don't we? God is the one Who is wrong. He is the one who deserts us. Or, at least, even if we haven't been all we should be, He should be ready to 'hop to it' when we bother to turn to Him.

The trouble is we find ourselves so far out of touch because of our casual ignoring of Him that at the point of need we can't 'find' Him. And that spells tragedy. The beginning of the answer lies in being quite honest with ourselves and being able to admit that we are the ones who've drifted. When we can do that we're able to re-locate Him. And it's true we'll find Him the same and never having "moved". As I said earlier that's a very re-assuring truth. It's one of the happy privileges of a minister's life to be with people who "find" Him again. That discovery is able to soften a very heavy heart-ache as I discovered

Fact & Opinion

Here are abstracts from interesting surveys and opinion polls reported in the Press during the past three months which may interest Chronicle readers.

Declining Belief in God

The author of a recently published book on the Catholic Church and community in Australia quoted opinion poll figures which showed that belief in God has declined from 95 percent in 1949 to 87 percent in 1969 and 76 percent in 1976. (Sydney Morning Herald 14/2/78).

Few Concerned About Gambling

63 percent of people are not concerned about the prevalence of gambling and betting, and 87 percent have taken part in some kind of gambling in the past three months. (Sydney Morning Herald 14/2/78).

Regular Exercise Uncommon

38 percent of respondents exercise at least one day a week and only 17 percent exercise daily. The 50 and over age group has the highest proportion of daily exercisers. The most common form of regular exercise was walking followed by physical exercise at home. (Bulletin 13/1/78).

"Rough Justice"

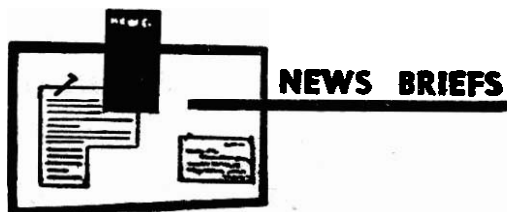
The report of the survey of 70 people by the Brotherhood of St. Laurence in Melbourne found only 19 percent of people struck off the dole and refused Social Security benefits knew about their right to appeal. The study found that the most common reasons among the 70 respondents for termination of unemployment benefits were failure to lodge income statements (15) failure to report to the CES office personally (11) and refusal of "suitable work" (21). (National Times 23-28/1/78).

Marriage and Divorce

52 percent of respondents believed that marriage is a life-time contract, against 25 percent who believed it is a contract which can be broken after a short time, and 21 percent who believed it can be broken only after a fairly long time and under extreme provocation. 55 percent thought that there should be more Family Court Judges appointed for divorce case hearings. (McNair Gallup Poll release 5/11/77).

Alcoholism

The most recent ABS survey found that 200,000 Australians are "heavy drinkers", ie, consume more than seven middies of beer (or the equivalent in wine or spirits) per day. (National Times 16-21/1/78).

I LOVE IDI AMIN

There is a new power today at work in the Christian church in Uganda. It is a power that can bear up under the unpredictable whims and the savage persecution of one of the most notorious dictators of our time, Idi Amin. It is a power that answers threats with reason, torture with endurance, execution with love. It is the power of the living God, released as it has been released perhaps nowhere else on the earth at the present time. Festo Kivengere, one of Uganda's eighteen Anglican bishops, documents the growth of this power, tracing the steadily increasing confrontation between the Christian church and the government of Idi Amin. He gives an eyewitness account of the climax of that confrontation—the assassination of Janani Luwum, the Anglican Archbishop of Uganda, on February 19, 1977. He relates his own flight from the country two days later under cover of darkness. **I LOVE IDI AMIN** is the dramatic story of how God is using pain and suffering to build a new man and a new church for His Glory.

KNOW YOUR GOD

The name of God,

God has a name. He has many titles of course, but He also has a name. And names in the Bible are not empty epithets, mere verbal tags for convenience in labeling. They mean something.

God's name in the Old Testament is Yahweh. At least that what we think it is. Because it is so Holy, the Hebrews paraphrased it by Adonai, literally 'my Lord', so in most English versions it appears as 'the Lord'. The vowels of Adonai with the consonants Y H W H produced the hybrid 'Jehovah'.

God's name has a meaning. It seems to be derived from the Hebrew verb 'to be', or at least from a close relative of it meaning 'to become'. In Moses' encounter with God at the burning bush this is explained.

Moses was doubtful. He didn't want to act the heroic deliverer, even after God's assurance. In any case, who was this God who was sending him to do the impossible? Perhaps he had a vague idea himself, but he knew the sceptical Israelites would not credit it.

He therefore asked, 'If they ask me, "What is his name?" What shall I say to them.'

God's answer seems, to us at least, to make matters ten times worse. He said to Moses, "I am who I am. (Exodus 3: 14, 15).

'I am', 'Yahweh', 'I am who I am': what does it all add up to? Is God then 'He who is', the static, impassive, absolute being around whom everything revolves?

If the Old Testament was in Greek, that might be the meaning, but it is Hebrew, and in Hebrew the verb 'to be' is dynamic.

'To be' in Hebrew means an active, dynamic presence and that is just what Moses needed. Not just the assurance that God existed, but that He was *there*, present, beside him, to carry out his purpose of deliverance. To Moses perhaps the answer meant far more than any English translation can mean to us; it contained reassurance enough for the doubt of Moses and the scepticism of his people. It meant the real presence of The Living God.

And this is our God. He has not changed.

MAN IN MEDIA

Sunday, June 11th is Mass Media Sunday. Church people throughout Australia are being asked to think about the Mass Media's role and to pray for Church agencies which seek to spread the Good News about Jesus Christ by use of the Media. In particular they are being asked to think about themselves as consumers of what the Media offers.

Do the Media manipulate us or do they follow us?

The evidence is that Media habits actually **follow** rather than dictate community standards. For example:

- We receive 18,000 advertising impulses a day but reject almost all of them. We are therefore teaching ourselves to be selective. Does that sound like manipulation.
- We are better educated than ever before. There is no evidence that the current crop of Australian eighteen year-olds, the first whole generation wholly reared in the television age, are morons.
- There is no research evidence which proves that the Media changes basic behaviour patterns. Media changes brand choice, leisure activities, but not life-style.

Christian people should give priority therefore to appealing to people to upgrade what they desire rather than appealing to TV stations etc. to lift standards.
