THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

28th June, 1947.

Dear People of All Saints',

Next month we shall be observing the Forty-fourth Anniversary of the Consecration of our Parish Church. We hope you will commence **NOW** to get in touch with former parishioners, to give them an invitation to join with us in the special services which are being arranged for the Consecration Festival on **17th August**. As time goes on, it is not so easy to keep the "Back-to-All-Saints" ideal as it was in former years. Many of the older people have passed away; but there still must be numbers of their relatives who could be invited to join in an Act of Dedication, Praise and Thanksgiving by parishioners, past and present, which we endeavour to make so outstanding a feature of this Festival.

If All Saints' Church could speak (and if we use our imagination we will find that our Church does become articulate, for "the very stones cry out"), it says: This is the voice of your Parish Church speaking—"I have been built by the love and devotion of men and women and children, to the glory of God and the good of mankind. I have no utilitarian purpose. People come here to worship God, to join in spiritual fellowship, to renew the sources of inner strength which they need for bearing the burdens of life, to consecrate their joys, to find consolation in their sorrows. I am of yesterday and tomorrow, not merely of to-day. I shall be here a thousand years from now, perhaps ten thousand. I symbolize permanence in the midst of change, I stand for continuity, for the things unseen that are eternal—not for the things that are visible, but temporal and fleeting. I symbolize the revelation of God, who changes not. I stand for law and order, the reflection of the wisdom and goodness of God. Your lives are fleeting; but Christ is 'the same, yesterday, to-day, and for ever.' Only through sharing in His life can your lives be lifted up and made permanent, indeed be made worth keeping permanently and for ever."


As part of our Festival we hope to have our Annual Parish Tea on Wednesday, 20th August, and we shall be happy to hear from parishioners willing to donate a table or a portion thereof, also from those who could help by acting as hostesses at the Tea. We once again seek the co-operation of **all** our people in making the Festival Tea a time of happy social fellowship which it has been for so many years.

On our Festival Sunday—17th August—the boxes now in use will be returned and presented. A special envelope will be issued with the August "Chronicle" for the use of those who have no box. There are but six weeks remaining in which to complete our efforts for the Parish Hall Fund; and we hope that by our gifts in box and envelope the £200 which the Churchwardens need for our Hall debt will be forthcoming. Last year we did not quite reach this objective; let us see if we can do so this year. This appeal concerns **all** parishioners, both young and old, and **all** organisations which use the Parish Hall, and we expect their members to respond to it either individually or corporately.

Most parents naturally desire the best for their children to fit them for life in the material sense; but how much more important it is to see that they are trained in the more lasting things which build character. I ask, therefore, the utmost co-operation of parents and guardians who have the

care of young people who are approaching Confirmation age. Whilst admitting that parents cannot decide the important question of Confirmation **FOR** their children, they **can** do much by their encouragement and support to help their young people to make a wise decision. I would remind those amongst you who are privileged to be godparents, of the solemn charge given you in the Office of Baptism: "Ye are to take care that this child be brought to the Bishop to be Confirmed by him. . . ."

THE RECTOR'S LETTER TO THOSE APPROACHING CONFIRMATION AGE

Dear Girls and Boys,

Next month we shall be forming preparation classes for Confirmation; and I want to have a word with those amongst you who are fourteen, or who are nearing your fourteenth birthday.

Confirmation is approached by special training, preparation and instruction for those who desire to become full members of one branch of Christ's world-wide (or Catholic) Church.

Of course it is possible for a boy or girl to be a Christian without being confirmed. But no boy (or girl) can be a complete, happy and useful Christian without joining himself definitely to the comradeship of other Christians, either in the Church of England—as in your case—or in some other branch of the world-wide Christian Church. It is quite impossible to play football without joining with others; if you want a game you must join a team.

Therefore, special classes are held to help you to be ready to take your place in the Christian "team." These classes lead up to a definite public act in the Service of Confirmation, which admits us to responsible membership of the most wonderful Society in the whole world—Christ's Church; and it is a very great honour and privilege to become a full member of the Christian Church.

Confirmation comes to our aid at a time in our lives when we specially need it. We are growing up, and that means in mind, body and spirit we are obliged to face new temptations, challenges and difficulties, as we try to form a sound character, which is the most important thing in life.

I write to invite you to join the preparation classes. If, after very careful thought and prayer, you decide to do so, please hand to me, before 31st July, your full name and address, your age last birthday, and the date of your Baptism. Classes commence on Tuesday, 5th August, for boys, and on Thursday, 7th August, for girls; both classes being held at the Rectory and commencing at 7.15 p.m. It is most essential that you should attend regularly.
