**THE RECTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT, 1970-71**

Presented at the Easter Vestry Meeting, 13th May, 1971

It is with great pleasure that I present this 1971 annual report in the 101st year of the life of All Saints' Parish, Petersham, and in my first year as Rector.

As our Church enters upon the second century of its service to the community in the name of Our Lord Jesus Christ, we look ahead with high hopes for the future in this ever-changing world. We must recognize that the complexion of our immediate community has changed greatly in the past few years, and that this change foretells difficult times in the future for us, with more and more New Australians of other than Anglican Church background moving in as the original inhabitants die or move to other areas.

However, though the times and places are changing, the needs and fears of humanity are not, and we know that our message from God is the answer and the only hope for all mankind. Therefore, we look ahead with resolute determination to carry on His work and to strive for ever new and more practicable ways to accomplish it. We pray that we shall have the help of God in our task, and that we shall be guided by His Holy Spirit in all our doings.

**A Year to Remember**

The year 1970-71 has been a year to remember, with some great moments. The life and work of our Parish moves on actively. On 24th January, 1971, we said farewell to our beloved friend and Rector, the Rev. T. Eric Champion and his family, who for 15 years faithfully served this Parish. It was a sad day, but we rejoice with them in their new work and wish them God Speed in all they do.

With the kind help of the Rev. A. E. C. Gardner and the Rev. John Hebblewhite, we carried on our Divine Services and other activities until we secured the services of our new Rector, the Rev. C. A. Campbell, who came to us from the Parish of Hunter's Hill. On the evening of 5th March, 1971, the new Rector was officially inducted to the cure of souls at All Saints' by the Right Rev. A. J. Dain, Assistant Bishop of Sydney. Afterwards, he received a most heartening reception and welcome in the hall, during which the Parish assured both the Rector and his wife of their full support and prayers for a long and successful ministry in Petersham.

**Historic Service**

Looking back over the year, perhaps the high point was the beautiful and memorable Centenary Commemoration Service on 1st November, 1970, held to inaugurate our Centenary Year. We were honoured to

have His Excellency, Sir Roden Cutler, Governor of New South Wales, present to unveil the Commemorative stone placed in the west end of the Church. The Right Rev. F. O. Hulme-Moir preached the sermon and assisted in the order of service. The Church was packed to overflowing for this historic occasion.

#### Record Fete Result

Another high point was the annual fete, which this year surpassed all previous records in overall earnings. The heartfelt thanks of the Rector, Wardens and Council are extended to all the individuals and groups who, through their self-sacrificing work and dedication brought about this great success.

Apart from providing needed funds for the on-going work of the Parish, a good time was had by all concerned. We are certain that the Blessing of Almighty God rests upon all those who give themselves to the work of the extension of His Kingdom.

#### New Improvements

During the year, we spent a considerable amount of money renewing and refurbishing our buildings. The new Rector and his family are most gratefully reaping the benefits of the foresight of the Rev. Mr. Champion in establishing the Rectory Renewal Fund. Moneys from this source and from the generous gifts of individuals have repainted the inside of the Rectory and put down wall-to-wall carpeting on the main floor. Together with other needed repairs, this work has made our Rectory a pleasant place in which to live and work. Other moneys were spent on repairs and painting of the Church and Parish Hall buildings.

Also during this year, we were happy to see the Columbarium completed, and our deep thanks go to all who made this addition to our establishment possible; especially are we grateful for the volunteered skilled work of the builder.

#### Centenary Endowment Fund

Looking forward to the future financial needs of the Parish, and with an eye to the changing scene in Petersham, men of considerable foresight have brought into being the All Saints' Centenary Endowment Fund, the earnings from which it is hoped will safely carry us over the thin times which, for only a short time we hope, may have to be endured. The fund presently has in it over \$1,000 in cash and over \$5,000 in shares, and we hope it will grow steadily as its proceeds are needed.

We invite all our friends and parishioners to consider this fund and the financial needs of the ministry here in Petersham when making out their wills. Acknowledging that there is a need in every part of society and in every corner of the world to which we must also extend ourselves, this, the on-going preaching of the Christian Gospel, is truly worthy of our prayerful consideration.

#### Personal

It is with deep sorrow that we note the passing to higher service of many of our old friends. We have lost a fine organist and two faithful parish councillors, and half a dozen faithful old parishioners. Though we and their loved ones mourn their passing, we give thanks to God for their victory over death and their good works in our midst, and pray that God will send us new souls to join arms with us in this great work on earth.

We were happy to receive this year as memorial gifts two wooden Offertory Plates and the portable communion set—useful tools in His Service.

#### Annual Statistics

Some statistics of the year's work: there were 25 weddings (37), 66 baptisms (48), 55 funerals (80) and 2,997 acts of Communion

(4,137) this year. Last year's figures are in parenthesis. No confirmation class was convened in 1970. It is encouraging to note that a large number of young people are signing up for the 1971 Confirmation class.

#### Our Lively Groups

Your new Rector is happy to see the lively on-going work of all the parish social and service groups. We notice that the choir, both junior and senior branches, is growing and we look forward to great things in the future. We are happy to hear the lovely music from the organ under the skilled hands of our cheerful new organist.

It is good to see the Senior Parishioners' Club continuing to give its useful service to the elderly. We are grateful for the dedicated work of the Ladies' Guild, the Young Marrieds' and Friends' Club, the Sunday School Mothers' Club, and the Young Churchmen's Institute. The Sunday School Teachers and Superintendents continue to do their essential work. We are happy to have the Bowls Club in our midst. The Young Peoples' Fellowship continues its program and is giving useful service in the care of the lawns and in many other ways.

We should be lost without the services of our dedicated cleaners who also do a very great deal more than clean to be sure. The Rector is most deeply grateful to the men of the Parish Council and is so happy that in his first year he can lean so heavily upon them, and upon the three hard-working Wardens. These men have been a great service and comfort to us all.

Needless to say, we wish to acknowledge and thank the dozens of other people who by their regular and faithful work and attendance upon Divine Services, quietly and surely sustain the Ministry in this place. We know that God who sees in secret, rewards in the open.

#### Our Wonderful Inheritance

Finally, may I ask you all again, as we look ahead, to be faithful to your Christian calling and to be good Missionaries of the Lord. Go out and seek his flock and bring them into the fold where they may be fed with the Eternal Bread of Christ Jesus. Remember that a million dollars is made up of one million **one dollar** notes. So never think that your part, however small, will not count.

We have inherited from the past a truly beautiful Church building, fully equipped, a gracious Rectory, and a sound Hall. Let us go forward then, and build on that good foundation a flourishing community of God's children, who through the weekly preaching, hearing and reading of God's Word, the worship of our Heavenly Father, and the service of our fellow man, may be led in the true way of Christ to inherit in the end those unspeakably rich promises that our God offers to all who will love and serve Him.

May God's Blessing be always with us.

● Parishioners attending the Service on Mothers' Day appreciated the gift of a white flower from the Church Officers.

● **Vestry Meeting:** A good attendance from all walks of parish life, marked the Easter Vestry Meeting on 13th May. Reports from most organisations showed they are holding their own. The Parish Treasurer's Statement showed that we ended the year \$1,064 worse off than when we started, notwithstanding a record Fete result. Smaller offertories, consequent upon smaller congregations over the past year, are the main cause of this decline. A high degree of interest in parish administration was shown by the 14 nominations for the nine elected positions on the Parish Council. One new member, Mr. Paul Levy, and eight re-elected councillors will fill these positions. The Rector also has the right to appoint three members.


