# The 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Moore College





Thomas Moore made a bequest in his will for the establishment of a college 'for the education of boys and youths of the protestant persuasion in the principles of Christian knowledge'. Thus Moore College was born in 1856 – a college to secure sound Christian education in the colony of Sydney. From small beginnings Moore College has blossomed today into a superb theological institution with twenty faculty members and more than three hundred full-time men and women students. Over this time Moore College has trained people for gospel ministry all over the world as well as clergy for the Diocese of Sydney. People all around the world give thanks to God because they heard the gospel from someone trained at Moore College. It is impossible to estimate the dimensions of the blessing from God in this wider domain. However, when we focus on the local scene in the Diocese of Sydney it is easier to estimate what God has done. Moore College has trained the vast majority of clergy in the Diocese and so Moore College has had and will continue to have a strategic part, under God, in building this Diocese with its ever-growing number of churches. Within these churches many, many people have come to know Christ and grow in him through the preaching and teaching and pastoral ministry of Moore's graduates. # 'I taught it but they didn't learn it?'

Following a couple of days in September spent by the faculty these are words we are not likely to hear around college for some time (at least not out loud).



In a special two-day conference held during Term 3 the faculty had an opportunity to gather together for a couple of days to think at length and depth about the business that lies at the educational heart of Moore College – teaching and learning. Our content, the knowledge of God, deserves the best possible educational process and the mini-conference we attended together was organised to this end.

Experts from the Institute of Teaching and Learning at Sydney University came and led us through a variety of exercises and information sessions to help us think through some of the thorny issues of what, why and how we teach and assess the students. All of this was conducted in the light of an emphasis that pushed us to continually ask, 'What are the students we teach actually learning?' Special emphasis was given to the role of students' perceptions of workload and expectations of courses and how these can affect their approach to learning. The presentation of some research and participation in an exercise reminded us that we as a faculty would like to see students take a deeper approach to learning. We were asked to consider how, and whether, our planning and implementation of the curriculum often drives students to take a shallow approach.

It was a terrific time not the least because we had some time to have conversations that the normal frenetic pace at college does not always make possible. We were also exposed to some state-of-the-art educational theory and research, forcing hard questions concerning the shape and structure of the curriculum, the nature and place of assessment, the relationship between teaching and learning and ways to continue to develop ourselves professionally as a faculty.

A highlight was the opportunity we had to see one another teach during this time. We were invited to give three-minute classes, focussed on student learning, on topics of personal interest. Unsurprisingly many went over time! But interest was high as topics addressed included learning the Macarena (a dance), how to cook a chicken and vegetable stir fry, the intricacies of the Rugby League finals system, and three facts that could save your life. Next time you meet a faculty member you might like to catch up on these and other topics of interest – and it should only take three minutes (approx!).


It was a great opportunity to think about a wide range of issues as we grapple with the curriculum and its shape in preparation for a process of accreditation next year. The students benefited from two clear days to catch up on work and reading and will continue to benefit into the future as the stimulating thinking from this time gradually works its way into our practice.

## *Col Adamson* SECOND YEAR

Col Adamson is in second year at Moore College. Prior to College, Col held a stable, flexible and satisfying job, being a Senior Engineer for John Hart – a Holden Racing Team Technology partner where he specialised in the training of clients who invested in robotics, measuring equipment and computer-controlled metal-cutting machine tools. He has lectured with TAFE in metrology and robotics and was Deputy Director of music at St John's Cathedral Parramatta from 1988 – 2000.

During this time Col was an elder at Northmead Anglican Church. Although this was a lay position, he negotiated working fewer hours in order to focus on ministry there. From 1995 he studied through Moore College External Studies, completing the Diploma of Biblical Studies in 2000.

Col has continued his involvement in leadership at Northmead Anglican Church in music, small groups, evangelism (Lifeworks), leading Sunday meetings and preaching. From 2000, he has also been involved with Ambassadors for Christ.

Col is married to Sally and they have three children, Kate (almost 20), Sarah (18), and Tim (15). They are all involved with ministry at Northmead Anglican Church.

Coming to Moore College was brought on by the judgement of the leadership at Northmead that considered Col was suited to involvement in the next church plant. 'For me, going to College was putting legs on the diocesan mission. I was already putting in about 25 hours per week in Christian ministry, so to add a church plant to that wasn't going to happen without some drastic changes', Col said.

I grew up in a rather traditional Chinese family in Singapore that practiced ancestral worship and was influenced by Buddhism and Taoism. By God's grace, I became a Christian while I was in my final year of undergraduate studies in London. My burden remains for my family and friends to come to know Christ. I spent the past five years working for the central bank/monetary authority and my home church is Adam Road Presbyterian Centre (ARPC). It is through ARPC that I came to know about Moore College. I have always wanted to take some time off from work and became convinced over time that pursuing MBA was not a wise way of spending the time and money. As always I am thankful for my time at Moore: in the relationships, the study and most of all the foundation for future growth in Christ.

St Andrew's Hall is a process. It is an evening about God's mission and his goodness to Moore College over 150 years.





The planned lectures are:


1. Lactantius on Anger – by Richard Gibson

## WHO AM I?

Born in England, I arrived as Ship's Carpenter on the *Britannia*, which brought supplies to the Colony of NSW, on the way to catch some seals. My competence at ship-building was proved in Dusky Bay, New Zealand, and earned me a reputation that saw me appointed Master Ship-Builder in the King's Dockyard in Sydney, a post I held for some thirteen years. I gradually acquired land for myself, first at Petersham, then near Liverpool, eventually becoming one of the major landholders in Sydney. I bought some of the first Merinos to arrive in the colony, but also bred cattle and horses. I had a soft spot for animals, and when my dog was poisoned, I just couldn't understand why they would do this heartless thing. I married an ex-convict, whose son I adored. I once broke my leg when my carriage turned over. I was an expert in timber, and I had the job of taking timber from anywhere in the colony if it seemed suitable 'for naval purposes'. I served on the bench for a number of trials, and after I moved to Liverpool (which I had a big hand in building), served for many years as a magistrate. I acted as executor for many people's wills, once getting myself into trouble in a famous case where the children of the deceased disputed my right to sell their father's land to pay his debts. When they won, it was costly to me until I received compensation from the Government. My wife and I were founding shareholders of the Bank of NSW. I used my money for good purposes, being involved with orphans, the Benevolent Society, the Bible Society, the Church Missionary Society, as well as helping the building of churches for the Church of England, the Methodists, and even the Roman Catholics. My money was left to the Church of England.

## Library

The Moore College Library has played an integral part in the teaching, learning and research activities of the College over the past one hundred and fifty years. From its humble beginnings in 1856, the collection has grown to some two hundred and ten thousand volumes housed in two locations. The main collection of largely undergraduate material is located on the second floor of the Library, while the Australiana and archive collections are housed with other research material in a closed stack building.

Seven library staff provide high quality information services to students, faculty, visiting scholars and the general public in addition to acquiring and processing material. In 2006 we will develop our information literacy programme.

Registered users of the Library have 24/7 access to the ATLA and Religion and Philosophy Collection electronic databases which provide relevant citations and some full text journal articles. Certain material on student reading lists is available from the catalogue as part of an electronic reserve service. The Library is also used and regarded highly by biblical scholars and historians of other institutions and by those undertaking private research.

## A Request for our 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

The Library is seeking to build on its holdings of the works in the *Corpus Christianorum Latina* and *Graeca* series. Rev Dr Robert Doyle, Director of Postgraduate Studies, says of this series, 'The beliefs and practices of today's Christian church rest on two traditions, the biblical tradition, which is normative, and two thousand years of interpretation of that tradition. Foundational to the history of interpretation are the writings of the Church fathers and the creeds they produced. Today those creeds are under critical and at times hostile review. What is at stake is the creedal confession concerning the person of Christ, truly God and truly man, and the nature of the Trinity. Changing these beliefs will produce a religion different from the one the Christian church has confessed for two millennia. The *Corpus Christianorum* is the premier collection of the writings of the Church fathers. It is the most accurate edition in their original languages, and the best available tool to investigate what the Church fathers taught and why they shaped the creeds the way they did.' # A New Lease of Life Peter Bolt

Former Vice Principal Donald Robinson

Donald Robinson was the Vice Principal of Moore College from 1959 to 1973, before he became the Bishop of Parramatta and then the Archbishop of Sydney from 1982 to 1993. Combining the roles of New Testament scholar and churchman, his pen has been active throughout his life, to this present day. With his blessing, his writings are currently being collected together. This collection will contain not only those articles previously published, but also a great number of articles that were written for a variety of teaching contexts, but were never formally published. Although he is renowned for his biblical insight amongst those whom he taught at Moore College, especially for the biblical theology of which he was a pioneer, his published articles have also been quietly influential over many years in quarters far and

wide. His careful attention to the relationship between the Jews and the Gentiles, as well as the New Testament notion of 'church' is especially noteworthy.


It is the hope of the editors of this collection that this new publication will extend this influence amongst an even wider group, and amongst new generations of Christian readers. The range of the articles is immense: from studies in the Old and New Testaments and biblical theology to those on theology, liturgy, and Australian church history. The breadth of the collection somewhat diminishes its appeal for some publishers (who tend to like a neat, crisp diet, rather than a rich smorgasbord), but it is hoped that this difficulty will soon be overcome and that the volume(s) will be launched as part of the Moore College Sesquicentenary in 2006.


