**Advent.**—We earnestly invite the parishioners and the congregations at both All Saints' and St. Augustine's Churches to mark this season of Advent by more regular attendance at the services provided, and by a more real effort to help or lead others also to come to hear the Word of God, and to pray. The Advent Season has a double message: first, it reminds us of the Second Coming of our Lord, and of the judgement which each one of us must come; secondly it is a season of preparation for the right observance of the great holy day, Christmas Day, on which we celebrate the wondrous fact that "the Word became flesh", and that He Who will hereafter be our Judge came first "to save His people from their sins".

**Christmas.**—May all the readers of this paper know the happiness of a bright and joyous Christmas!

There will be many forms of PREPARATIONS for keeping Christmas as a holiday, and it can hardly be necessary to urge upon Christians the need for PREPARATION to keep it as a very sacred season to be marked by a thankful participation in holy worship, more especially in the Holy Communion the great "Thanksgiving Service".—We therefore urge that no Sunday in this Advent Season should find any of us absent (without real reason) from at least one service during the day. Most of us could surely revert to the old custom of attending two services so long as we do not find that by so doing we deprive others of their opportunity.

The domestic and social observance of Christmas has so largely altered of recent years that now the home GATHERINGS and family parties of the past have been exchanged for trips and picnics and a general SCATTERING of families and friends. It becomes most important that under these modern conditions Christians and Church-people endeavour to retain the religious observance of the season, and, whether at home after the old fashion or away from home seeking refreshment and recreation, should endeavour to make such preparation that they may be able to

"Come and worship,

Worship Christ the new born King."

It will need much moral courage to spend Christmas aright in a crowded health resort or in a secluded camp, and Christian men and women must prepare earnestly if they would bear their witness (even silently) under such conditions. We trust that those of our people who spend Christmas away from home may let their light so shine before men that they may see their good works and glorify their Father which is in heaven.

The Friday and Saturday after Christmas Day being S. Stephen's and S. John's Days there will be Holy Communion each morning: on Friday at 11 o'clock and on Saturday at 7.30, thus affording a convenient opportunity for those who by reason of infirmity or unavoidable circumstances are unable otherwise to attend.

**Christmas Decorations.**—Those who are kindly willing to assist in the decoration of the Churches are asked to meet on Christmas Eve at half-past-two. Gifts of flowers and greenery will be gladly received, and helpers welcomed at each Church.

**Sunday Schools.**—The new School-year begins with the Advent Season when scholars are promoted according to age, and often have to change teachers in consequence of such promotion. We would urge upon parents to counsel their children to recognise that such separations are inevitable, and that change of teachers need not mean losing an old friend, but rather gaining a new one also.

The teachers' meeting for preparation of the lessons is again to be held on Wednesday evenings (after the service in the Parish Church) when it is hoped that all the teachers who possibly can will make a real effort to attend regularly. Not only does this secure a careful study of the lessons but affords an opportunity for teachers to meet one another, and for conference as to the best methods of making their work effective.

**All Saints' Sunday and Day Schools.**—On Tuesday 16th December the Annual Presentation of Prizes will take place in the Petersham Town Hall at a-quarter-to-eight. Parents and parishioners interested in the Schools will be cordially welcomed. A new departure is being made this year in bringing the Day and Sunday Schools thus together at the one prize-giving which, the teachers trust, will further promote interest in the important part which the Schools play in the organization of the Church. In addition to the actual prize-giving the children will be invited to Tea in the School Hall at half-past six, and a varied entertainment will be given by scholars and friends during the evening.

**All Saints' Day School Concert.**—The Annual Concert in aid of the School and Prize Fund will be held in the Town Hall on Tuesday 9th December at 7.45 p.m. The programme includes the Cantata: "Daisy Darling's Dream" by the juniors, and "The Queen of the Seasons" by the senior scholars. Admission: one-shilling, children half-price.

**Church of England Men's Society.**—The next meeting will be held on Monday 8th December in All Saints' School Hall at 8 o'clock. The Clergy and members will gladly welcome to this meeting any men of the parish or new-comers who would accept this invitation. We often hear it said that Church-people are cold and reserved, and do not care to associate with any but their own little cliques. The Committee of the C.E.M.S. desire to break down such a condition if it exists, and wish now to assure their fellow-Churchmen of a cordial welcome if they will only come. No one need feel a stranger unless he desires to do so.

**The Archbishop of Sydney** preached at All Saints' Church at the Evening Service on the last Sunday in the Christian year. His Grace's sermon was most interesting and appropriate; the exposition of the parable of the man without the wedding garment, as denoting the need for correspondence between profession and reality in the Christian life, showed that it was just as much needed to-day as in the days when the parable was told. We were glad to see what for these days is an unusually large congregation, but we refrain from publishing the reflections suggested by the comparison between the number of persons present in the Church and the number of coins found in the collection plates.

**All Saints' Church.**—THE DEDICATION FESTIVAL SERVICES marking the forty-third anniversary of the opening and dedication of the Church were held on All Saints' Day and on the Sunday following; the Choral Festival being held on Wednesday 5th November. Our thanks are offered to the special preachers who came to give us their messages of encouragement and exhortation: Rev. H. Bryant, and the Precentor of St. Andrew's.

ORGAN RECITAL.—In connection with the Dedication Festival the Organist gave a Recital, of which the following notice has been kindly sent by the Organist of a neighbouring parish who was present.

"Congratulations to Mr. A. C. Lenton on the fine Recital given on Tuesday evening 11th November! In a wonderful manner Mr. Lenton showed his mastery over the Organ, and amply proved himself as promising to become one of the finest of Australian Organists.

"The programme was a most exacting one. Especially interesting was his interpretation of Bach's Great Fugue in G Minor, and Merkel's Sonata in D Minor, two veritable gems in organ literature.

"The Choir added interest to the programme in rendering Bruce Steane's Anthem: 'The Lord is my Strength'.

"Parishioners should avail themselves the opportunity of hearing these fine Recitals, and thus encourage their Organist and Choir in their efforts to provide a feast of music."

The next Recital will take place on Monday 22nd December when the programme will consist of selections of Christmas pieces.
