THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
28th October, 1946.

Dear People of All Saints',

With deep regret we learned our Archbishop had to enter hospital a week ago for a major operation. We are thankful to say he has come safely through the ordeal, and the latest report is that his condition is satisfactory. We shall continue to pray for his speedy and complete restoration to health and strength.

In consequence of the Archbishop's illness our Confirmation Service had to be transferred to October 28th—the Feast of St. Simon and St. Jude—when thirty-seven candidates were presented to Bishop Hilliard for Confirmation. The simplicity and beauty of the Confirmation Service are always impressive, and this year were no less so; when the Bishop based his address to the candidates on 2 Timothy 3:14: "**Continue** thou in the things which thou hast learned . . ."

Now commences the testing time for these young people and I commend them to you, trusting you will remember them in your daily prayers, and help them in every possible way to be true to the vows they have made. They have been taught that we are not only individuals, but members of a Church, a Body, a Society. Notwithstanding its faults and failures, we should be proud of the ever-growing Church in all the world, with its heroes and leaders, thinkers and practical men and women. They need our co-operation, which we can give by taking our part in the worship and life of our Parish Church, by **thinking** things out, and preparing for personal service, in Church and State, and, above all, by the spirit of **SERVICE** in our **daily life**—in these ways we help our Church to grow. For all this, we need to keep fresh and vital our own contact with the Holy Spirit and with Christ our Leader, underlining those words that the Bishop uses when he lays his hands on each one in Confirmation, that we "may daily increase in Thy Holy Spirit more and more . . ."

December 1st—the first Sunday in Advent—marks the commencement of another Church year, and, for us, concludes our fourth missionary appeal. On that Sunday we hope to be able to say that we have another hundred pounds to offer the Australian Board of Missions—this time for the support of a missionary who is preparing to go to Japan. One or two people have told me quite frankly that they wouldn't give me a penny for the Japanese! That is an understandable reaction after the experiences of the past six years, but I'm sure it is a wrong one. Japanese and Australians are geographically very close to each other; the world is getting smaller and smaller, and we have to live together. There are cruel Australians as well as cruel Japanese and, when we endeavour to wipe our hands of a person or a nation because of his or its villainy, we are merely being vindictive and revengeful, and not caring one bit that that person should cease from being a villain; which doesn't square with what we, as Christians, profess to believe. In Quentin Reynold's book, "Officially Dead," he tells the story of Captain C. D. Smith, who says, "No one living knows more about the barbarous cruelties practised by the Japs than I do . . . but I still say—and this may sound like treason—I find it impossible to hate the Japanese as a people. I know some good ones." The worst thing that we can do, from Christ's point of view, is to pursue the policy of washing our hands of anybody; and He **did** say, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel." If you have not already done so, will you make your response on December 1st?

As a member of the Executive of the Christian Social Order Movement, I ask your support for the effort which is being made for the Movement's funds on Tuesday, November 19th, in our Parish Hall. I have one hundred tickets to dispose of and, if you will help me, I won't have to send any back!

It was a real pleasure to welcome our old friend, the Revd. A. L. Whitehorn (a former Vice-Principal of Moore College), who was the Celebrant here on Sunday morning, October 13th. Mr. Whitehorn was in London during the worst years of the war, when his church and vicarage were destroyed by bombing and many of his parishioners were killed. He is at present in New Zealand, but I hope he will preach at All Saints' on his return.
