### RECTOR'S LETTER

My dear Friends,

The year is rapidly drawing to a close and it seems amazing that I must talk to you all in this issue of the "Chronicle" about the Patronal Festival of our Church. All Saints' Day of course falls this year on the Monday the 1st of November. The Festival will therefore commence on Sunday, October 31, with special services and on the Monday there will be the usual celebrations of Holy Communion with a Festival Evensong and Film in the Church, and a Concert in the Parish Hall with Films. The Festival will close with Thanksgiving Services on Sunday, 11th November. Before the "Chronicle" goes to press I hope to have the full details of the programme for this period.

The Y.C.I. are sponsoring an evening on the 6th October in the Parish Hall when the Film Unit from the G.P.O. will show a number of interesting films. The members of the Y.C.I. have promised an audience of 100, will you please be one of them, a donation will be welcomed in aid of the Roof Fund.

Those who came to see the Fellowship Revue were rewarded by an excellent evening of entertainment, and I would like to take this opportunity of thanking the members for their hard work, and incidentally making and purchasing materials for props out of their own pockets so that the show could be a financial success. I heard quite recently that the takings so far are over £43 and there is more to come. Congratulations, Fellowshippers, it was a great effort!

In November we are to hold our Fete, November 11, with an official opening at 3 p.m. It is some 17 years since we had a big Fete at All Saints' and we are looking forward to it being a very successful one. I like Fetes because it gives everybody a chance to do something for their Church, and I hope that it will mean that during the day on that occasion we shall see all our parishioners. Will you all help, make something, or give something to the stallholders and then invite your neighbours and friends to come and share the great thrill of seeing our hall crowded with buyers. Gifts may be left at the Rectory, and we will sell anything from a pin to a motor car.

At long last the work has commenced on the Church Roof. The copper guttering has been almost finished and I think that you will agree with me that it reveals expert workmanship; the box gutters are the work of a skilled craftsman and add to the beauty of our Church. The slaters started work today, and I trust that our roof may soon be sound. It is unfortunate that with the commencement of this work we shall need more money to pay for it. The immediate work will cost £1,300 and that still leaves much to be done, the total cost will be £2,700. It is for this reason that we are re-issuing the Roof Fund Boxes again. I do hope that you will have one in your home, for every little helps.

In order to help the Fund I make the following offer: I am willing to give £5 if two hundred others will give five pounds, thus we would have in hand £1,000 and be able to complete the work on the roof and other essential repairs. Amounts may be given to the Rector or sent to the Rectory.

On the 24th of this month at 11 a.m. the Confirmation Service will be held. I trust that the parents and friends of the Confirmees will make a special effort to come. On the Wednesday Evening before the Confirmation date I will hold a Special Preparation Service when the parents and friends of the candidates are invited to be present with them. I do trust that you will make a real effort to be present on this occasion. Members of the congregation are invited also. The Confirmees are starting out on their Christian pilgrimage, and it is for us to encourage them as much as possible. They are about to renew the solemn vows which were promised on their behalf at their Baptism. It is a day of decision for them, when they decide to follow their Lord and Master Jesus Christ as His faithful soldiers and servants. The greatest need of today is something very much

greater than a knowledge about Christianity, intellectually or socially. It is the rediscovery of Christianity as a decisive personal relationship to Jesus Christ, there is nothing so fundamental as this, and the more we think about the crisis in our world today the clearer does this become. As Christians we have no chance at all unless we are in vital contact with Jesus Christ. These candidates are being faced with that truth, will you then pray for them, and help them by a virile Christian witness in your own life. How can we expect them to be enthusiastic about the Faith if we older ones never bother about it. I do hope that as the days go by there will be a greater emphasis on the family worshipping together. If mother and father come with the family to church it will not only strengthen the witness of the Church at Petersham but they will find that greater blessing and happiness will come to their own homes.

May I take this opportunity to express the deepest sympathy of Mrs. Johnson and myself with those who have recently lost loved ones. We pray that God will bless and comfort you all.
