

## 2003 SCHOLARSHIPS

The Winifred Kiek Trustees decided to award three women from Australia with the Scholarship in 2003. They are Monique Crabtree from Northam, Western Australia, Gaye Inall from Queensland and Susan Liersch from New South Wales.

### Monique Crabtree

Monique is married and has four children. She lives in Northam, Western Australia, a country town 100kms east of Perth. Monique and her family worship at the Churches of Christ in Northam.

Monique's studies have given her experience in Science, Business and School Religious Education, she has also worked as Secretary at a High School and was a co-leader in Study Tours to both North America and South Africa/South America.

Working part time intermittently since the arrival of her children, Monique has also undertaken further studies, particularly in the area of Religious Education. She is currently studying full time for Ministry at Tabor College, Perth, and wishes to continue the Bachelor of Ministry Degree (3-5 years).

Monique has been active in leadership roles in her local church. She is Secretary of the Ladies Fellowship and has taught Sunday School, Scripture and been involved in Bible Study groups. Her aim is to work full time in a local church, especially in Pastoral Care and Preaching.

### Gaye Inall

Gaye Inall is from Queensland. She was born profoundly deaf and uses Australian Sign Language. She is 39 years old. She has a BA in Teaching – 1993, and a BA in Education – 1997. In both courses she took a Major in Deaf Education. Gaye has studied one year of Education for Ministry (EFM). This course is licensed to the Diocese of Brisbane from the University of Swane in the United States of America.

Gay's occupation is teacher of the deaf. She reads and writes in English, teaches in the Queensland State Education system to deaf students 13-18 years old and has had experience in advising the teachers of infants. She also teaches Deaf History, Language and Culture, and of being proud to be deaf, and how to live in a world built for those with perfect hearing.

Gaye takes an active role in the Parish of St Matthews Anglican Church, Holland Park. She has a Liturgical Assistance License, being able to assist the priest as Server and in the administration of Holy Communion. She can officiate at Services and preach the Word of God in the Parish. She runs two Signing Choirs, one for adults and the other for children. Gaye helps to run the Anglican Deaf Ministry Centre, which she helped to set up, and to train clergy on how to work with deaf people to meet their diverse needs.

The Scholarship will help cover Interpreting Fees, Course Fees text books and her travel. Gaye seeks to better meet the needs of deaf people and has shown great courage. Her long term vision is to be skilled in Theology to be able to communicate her faith in an authentic knowledgeable way to other members of the deaf community.

### Susan Liersch

Susan Liersch is married with three children and is an Occupational Therapist. She has worked in hospitals in New South Wales and Queensland, and has had a clerical placement in the United States of America. Her work experiences have been in the areas of Psychiatry (adults and adolescence), Pediatrics, General, Occupational and Drug Rehabilitation.

Susan currently works with Everyman's Welfare Service, a Christian undenominational group which is accredited by the Australian Defence Forces (ADF). She works in support of soldiers and their families at the Army Recruit Training Centre at Kapooka, New South Wales.

Susan takes a special interest in working with ADF cadets aged 12-14 years both male and female.

Recently she commenced working 8 hours per week as a youth worker with St Paul's Anglican Church in Turvey Tops, Wagga Wagga.

Susan wishes to improve her counselling skills and gain a greater understanding of family dynamics

### THE WINIFRED KIEK SCHOLARSHIP (WKS)

This Scholarship is available to Christian women from multi cultural Australia, Pacific Island Nations and member countries of Asian Church Women's Conference who already have basic training in a chosen field of work.

It provides the opportunity for further theological training to better equip the scholar to provide leadership in her own country, church and community. The scholarship covers fares, tuition fees and accommodation and is awarded annually

When it is deemed more appropriate, the Scholarship Funds may be used for designated educational or charitable projects for women through the National Council of Churches of Australia World Christian Service.

### REVEREND WINIFRED KIEK, M.A., B.D.

In 1927 Winifred Kiek was the first woman to be ordained in Australia in the (then) Congregational Church (now Uniting Church). She was a pioneer in working for a National Committee of all State Women's Inter-Church Councils which led to the formation of Australian Church Women, of which she was a Life Member.

Winifred worked for peace in local, state, national and international organisations, attending many world conferences.

Because of her concern for women in third world countries at the time, she was influential in the founding of the Winifred Kiek Scholarship, which has now been awarded every year since 1965
