THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
28th September, 1942.

Dear People of All Saints':

For the past ten years it has been the custom to invite those who were confirmed in previous years to join with those making their first Communion on the Sunday nearest All Saints' Day both as an Act of Remembrance and as an Act of Fellowship. In this eleventh year of my incumbency there is no Confirmation in our own Church; those who are being prepared will be presented at St. Augustine's, Stanmore, on November 29th. I am still, however, desirous of maintaining this Re-union of Confirmees, and I specially ask those who were prepared by me for Confirmation between the years 1932 and 1942 (inclusive) to attend the early celebration on All Saints' Day, November 1st. Including two who were confirmed in other parishes this year, my Confirmation Register tells me this represents 410 people. Of that number, there are very many who are not now with us. Some have married and made their homes in other parishes; many of the boys and some of the girls have joined the forces, and are serving in many different places; some are prisoners-of-war, and two have passed on into the Church Triumphant. Yet there are many who are still sharing our fellowship and doing useful jobs in various Church organisations. I know they will come on All Saints' Day. It is those others, to whom Confirmation meant little or nothing, that they just drifted away, with whom I am keenly desirous of getting in touch, and I ask the co-operation of those who know them. No doubt there is someone confirmed in your year who seldom ever comes to Communion: will you go out after them and invite them to come on All Saints' Day?

The Parish Festival on November the first concerns us **ALL**. Fortunately, All Saints' Day this year falls on a Sunday, when most people can observe it; and we expect all loyal All Saints' people to keep the Festival of their parish Church. As the next issue of the "Chronicle" will be on the day of our Festival, the services arranged for it will be found herein.


I am going to ask your co-operation in giving our Church a present for All Saints' Day. We badly need new, and more, hymn books; and, as it is not now possible to procure "Church Hymns" (our present book), I have the authority of the Wardens and Council to change the hymn books so soon as funds become available. I purpose, therefore, adopting "Hymns Ancient and Modern" (with first and second supplements) for which a substantial grant is given by the publishers. The ordinary congregational hymn book (approximately the same size and type as the one now in use) costs four shillings. If we purchase 160 of these copies we get a grant of 80 books. In view of war conditions, it is uncertain whether this grant will be available very much longer; but it is available **now**; and, therefore, whatever we do, must be done quickly. If you are willing to give to your Church one, two, three or more copies, will you please cut out the form at the end of this paper and send it to me **so soon as you possibly can**. One pound will purchase five books, twelve shillings will buy three, and four shillings, one. Each copy will bear the name of the Church and the donor of the book. If you could not give one copy you might join with a friend in doing so. I will gladly start the scheme by donating the first twenty hymn books. The Choir will, I feel sure, donate from its funds at least a part of the cost of music editions required by choristers. I feel sure we can obtain our new books in this way; but we must "Do it NOW," if we are to have them for our Festival Sunday! If any parishioner desires to purchase an additional copy for his or her own personal use, I will be glad to order such copies when purchasing for the Church, if you will state your requirements.

We hope to have the Children's Festival on Sunday, November 8. In view of brown-out conditions, and the inadvisability of asking small children to come at night, we shall concentrate this year on the eleven

o'clock service for the children, and we expect to have every member of the school present at that service.

In days when it seems that the powers of evil are so strong; it is well to recall the message of the Festival of St. Michael and All Angels (which we commemorate to-morrow) with its assurance of the presence of the forces of good as well as the forces of evil. The real victory is the belief and the holding to that belief, in spite of all that seems to point otherwise, in the ultimate supremacy of the unseen things—love, goodness and truth.

CENEF.—September was a busy month for our branch of CENEF. At the beginning of the month we set out to augment what money we had in hand and so provide a bed for the extension to the Men's Hostel at the rear of the Cathedral. Our friends responded splendidly and at our last meeting we found that the sum of £10, which is the money needed for a bed, was over-subscribed. "Thank you," everybody. Then on September 25, it was All Saints' turn for the CENEF Stall in the Cathedral grounds, held every Friday, our takings for the day were £11/1/6. Again, "Thank you" to those who helped stock the stall. We are very much hampered in our work by not being able to get wool, except through the Lord Mayor's Comforts Fund. Previously we have bought the wool we have used, and have been able to distribute it as we liked, preferably to our own Church boys. The hand-soccer contest with Enmore Juniors proved the honours equal; one of their teams defeating us, and one of our teams defeating them, strangely enough with exactly similar scores, 8—nil! Two seniors, Gordon Archer and John Dunn, are assisting the Rector with the Juniors on Tuesday afternoons.

Sympathy.—Our deepest sympathy to the members of the Beard family (formerly of Bright Street) in the loss of their mother. The sympathy of many people in this parish and district will be with Miss Lois Beard, the well-known and talented elocution teacher, who has so often helped us here, and whose annual pupils' concert was of such a high standard.

We remember, too, Mrs. Brady, of Temple Street, and her family, in their sudden bereavement, and Mr. and Mrs. Morton (and family), of Bright Street, in the loss of their youngest son.

Percy Dobson Brady will be greatly missed from this parish and district. He was invariably bright and optimistic, seldom, if ever, discouraged, and his one ideal in life was service. Never happier than when doing something for somebody, P.D.B. set a great example in Church and civic life. For years he was leader of the Junior C.E.B.S. in this parish, and still found time to work amongst boys outside it. Many of the Senior C.E.B.S. members remember him in their earlier C.E.B.S. days with much gratitude, as their secretary has testified in this issue. Right up to the

last he was keenly interested and active in N.E.S. work. He loved his Church, and only a few hours before he Passed Over he enjoyed with us the fellowship of Sunday evening worship, joining, with his customary heartiness, in the service of praise.

It is sad to record that one of P. D. Brady's former C.E.B.S. boys—Warren Campbell Morton—was killed in action in New Guinea on August 31st. Warren was brought up in this Church and parish—it seems so short a time ago that he was a small boy in the Sunday School, then a chorister with a remarkably good solo voice, a keen member of C.E.B.S. who was later confirmed here in 1938. He was a boy full of life and energy, one who simply had to be "up and doing" at a time like this. In the midst of our sorrow we cannot help being proud of him; giving his life at the age of 18 that others might live. "Greater love hath no man than this" . . . May his sorrowing parents, brothers and sister, and all who are sad have, in special measure, the comfort and consolation which can come only from God.

The Y.C.I.—A very interesting debate was held at the meeting of the Y.C.I. on September 25, when Mr. C. E. Tanner moved that "that the average Australian is not fully alive to his responsibility to the war." Mr. Harold Jones led the opposition. The matter was discussed from many angles, including black markets, financial response, sport, horse racing, liquor consumption, church influence, and political leadership. The division gave the victory to the opposition by a very narrow margin.

At the meeting on September 10, opportunity was taken to bid farewell to the Rev. R. A. B. Nicholls, the Deputy-president, and wish him well in his mission work in New Guinea.

It is a pleasure to report that Mr. C. E. Griffiths, who was a member of the Institute many years ago has re-joined the organisation. At a recent meeting he said that it was amazing to find that an organisation could last so long, and still find something to give to members who were in it formerly. That is not the case elsewhere, he said, especially in sporting bodies. To go back to an old football or cricket club is to find a different atmosphere from what you knew formerly. The Y.C.I., on the other hand, has preserved its spirit of comradeship over the years, and bestows it on new or old members with mutual pleasure.—D.B.H., Press Ed.
