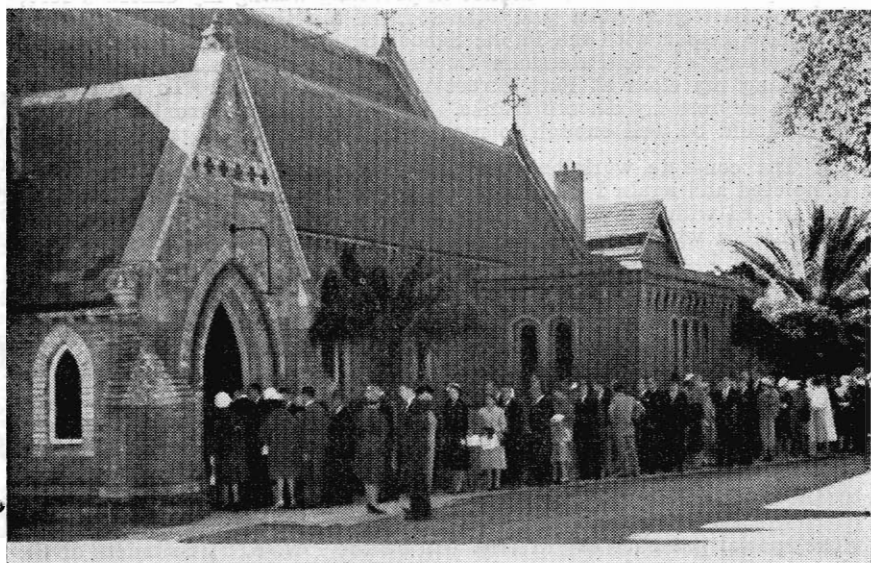

My Dear Friends,

TABLE TENNIS

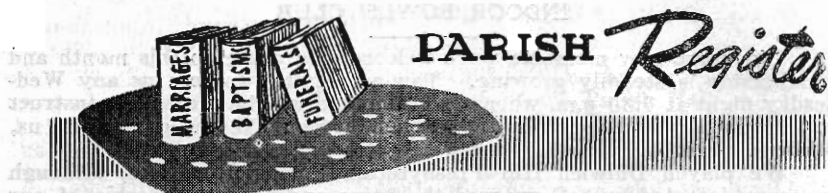
