



Church of England Men's Society.—A Meeting of men will be held on Monday, May 10th, at 8 p.m., in the Parish School Hall, Crystal Street, (next the Town Hall), for the purpose of inaugurating a branch of this well-known Society which is doing so much to bring men into closer touch with the Church, not only in England, in South Africa and in Canada, but also nearer home in New Zealand and in Queensland. Its rule is a very simple one “To pray to God every day and to do something to help forward the work of the Church.” In face of the prevailing disregard of religious observances and the apathy of many men towards religion such work is as much needed as ever it was in the history of the Church. Such a Society in this Parish might, with God's blessing, be the means of incalculable good if earnest churchmen would rally to its standard. Its motto is the well-known words of the great Saxon King: “Be Strong and Play the Man!” We very earnestly invite men to this meeting that a start may be made in the arrangement for a Winter programme.

Easter Vestry Meetings.

All Saints' Church.—The Annual Vestry Meeting of the Parish Church was held on Monday evening, 26th April, in the School Hall. The Rector presided, and there was a very good attendance of men present, among whom we were glad to see several new faces. The Meeting opened with the singing of the well-known Hymn, "Onward Christian Soldiers," followed by Prayer, after which the Chairman gave an address, making reference to the recent death of the Archbishop, the Pan-Anglican Congress and Lambeth Conference, and to the change in the Clerical Staff of the Parish. Elsewhere in this Paper will be found the names of the Wardens and Office-bearers appointed at the Meeting, and the various accounts presented. Very cordial expressions of thanks were accorded to all those who had helped in the work of the Church during the past year. At the Meeting a resolution was passed expressing a sense of the loss the Church had sustained in the death of the Archbishop and sympathy with his family in their bereavement.

Mission Church.—The Vestry Meeting was held on Monday evening, 19th April, at which there were present the Rector (in the chair) the Curate and Messrs. Brown, Eames, Carlisle, Hilliard, Johnston, Mailey, Norman and Paton. The Churchwardens rendered their Account for the year, showing a credit balance of £9 10 0. The Churchwardens for the previous year were re-appointed, and a voluntary Church Council of advice was elected in place of the Parochial Council under the "Sydney Church Ordinance." It was stated that a member of the Congregation had presented to the Church a new Holy Table with handsome covering, and frontal for festivals, the Meeting expressed its appreciation of the gifts.

Death of the Primate.—By the death of the Archbishop of Sydney the Church in Australia has lost one who held an unique position in her history, and whose memory will long be cherished as one who in unquiet times was essentially a ruler whose administration of patience and peace has steered the Church safely through perils of disruption and disintegration. His funeral was a testimony not only to the high office he held but to the affectionate esteem in which he was regarded amongst those of all ranks. The references to his episcopate and character which have been made in the Public Press and in the pulpits not only of our own church, but of other Denominations both Roman and Protestant manifested the truth of his own words in the message which was so strikingly conveyed to the Church by the Archbishop of Melbourne in the Cathedral last Sunday: "I have no known enemy."

The estimate of the Church in his own diocese is suitably expressed in the resolution of the Standing Committee of the Synod which reads thus:—

"That the standing committee of the diocese of Sydney records its deep sense of the loss sustained by the Church in the death of the Most Reverend William Saumarez Smith, D.D., D.C.L., Archbishop of Sydney, Metropolitan and Primate, a holy and humble man of heart, a faithful chief pastor, just, sympathetic, gentle, patient, charitable in all his dealings with men, and one who by his good example and diligent labours strove to fulfil the duties of the high and important office which, in the providence of God, he held for many years to the honour and glory of His name, and the benefit of His holy Church."

The Diocesan Synod will doubtless be soon called together for the election of the new Archbishop. It is a time for earnest prayer that the Synod may be directed by wise counsels and may be led by the Holy Spirit to choose such a man as may be able to fill the duties of this high office in such a manner and with such a spirit as to foster the increase of religion in this land, to arouse our own Church to greater and more-united efforts and to promote the edification, the up-building, of the body of Christ which is his Church.

Holy Communion.—Early Celebration.—On and after May 2nd the time of the Early Celebration of the Holy Communion will be 8 a.m. instead of 7.30 a.m. at the Parish Church, and will continue at that hour throughout the winter. At the Mission Church the Celebration on May 16th, at 8 a.m.

Rogation Days.—The three days before Ascension are called Rogation Days, and have always been set apart by the Church for Special Prayer and Preparation for the Festival of the Ascension.

Ascension Day.—This is one of the chief festivals of the Christian Year, and Church calls upon us to observe it accordingly. There will be three services at the Parish Church, as follows:—

- 7.30 a.m. Holy Communion (plain)
- 11 a.m. Matins and Holy Communion.
- 7.30 p.m. Choral Evensong.

THE FESTIVAL OF THE ASCENSION comes forty days after Easter, and will fall on Thursday, May 20th. The Church observance of Ascension Day is becoming again, after a long period of carelessness, more and more General. The fact of its falling on a week day, as it must always do, makes it impossible for some, and difficult for many to attend the Services of the Church, but it is worth while making a serious effort to be, if possible, at the Holy Communion on the day of our Lord's Ascension into Heaven, and to help to make the other Services on that day as worthy of the Festival as we can.

Whitsuntide.—The great Festival of Whitsunday, ten days after the Ascension, commemorates the descent of the Holy Ghost upon the Apostles to abide in the Church for ever, according to the promise of Christ. Monday and Tuesday in Whitsun week are also specially marked by the Church, and the Prayer Book provides for a celebration of the Holy Communion on those days. The Wednesday, Friday and Saturday in Whitsun week are Ember Days, when prayer is wont to be made on behalf of those who are to be ordained to Holy Orders on the Feast of Trinity, the following Sunday. It is right that churchmen should specially mark Whitsunday, for it is the great and only Festival of the year kept in honour of the Third Person in the Holy Trinity—the Holy Spirit.

There will be two celebrations of the Holy Communion at the Parish Church at 8 a.m. and after Matins, and also a celebration at the Mission Church at 11 a.m.

A Special Service of Preparation for Whitsuntide Communion will be held in All Saints' Church on Wednesday, May 26th at 7.45 p.m.

All Saints' Choir.—Owing to removals and other causes there are several vacancies in the Church Choir. The Rector and Choirmaster would be glad of volunteers for this work who are male communicants and have some idea of music, and would be able to attend the practices and services regularly. There is also room for three or four boys. Anyone willing to help will be gladly welcomed by the Clergy or Choirmaster in the Church Vestry at the practice, on any Thursday evening between 7.15 and 7.45.

On Saturday, 24th April, at the invitation of Messrs. Newlands Brothers, the Choristers had an enjoyable outing in their launch, "The Empire." A very pleasant afternoon was spent at Clarke Island, where afternoon tea was provided by Mrs. G. E. Bateman, assisted by Misses Anderson and Wood. Rev. W. A. Fletcher and the Choirmaster thanked those who had done so much to make the afternoon's outing such a pleasant one.

Mission Church Sunday School.—The Distribution of Prizes took place on Friday, April 23rd, in the School Hall. The Rector presided and presented the the Rewards amongst which was a special prize to a girl who had obtained second place in the Junior Division of the Diocessian Examination. The Rev. W. A. Fletcher and the Superintendent spoke encouraging words to the Scholars and asked for more real co-operation on the part of the Parents.

Holy Baptism is administered in the parish Church every Wednesday evening at 7.15 and on the second Sunday in each month at 4.15 p.m. If these times are inconvenient the service will be held on *any* Sunday afternoon, if notice be given before hand. The rule of the Church, as prescribed in the Prayer Book, is that for every male child there shall betwo Godfathers and one Godmother, and for every female, one Godfather and two Godmothers. Parents are allowed to stand as sponsors for their own children, and by thus doing add to their relation of natural parentage that of suretyship to the Church for the spiritual welfare of the child. In all cases the attendance of the father at the service is desired. There is no fee or charge for baptism, but is free to all. At the Churaching or thanksgiving service (which need not of necessity be held at the same time as baptism) it is customary for the mother to make a voluntary thank-offering.
