

RECTOR'S MONTHLY MESSAGE

THE CHURCH? — or CHRIST!

Anyone who takes the trouble to understand Christ will not fail to be attracted to Him. He appeals to all that is best in us.

The great mistake made by many within and outside the church is to see Him only as a great example—and to strive to follow His steps. It's a mistake because we're attempting on a purely human level, a task which demands superhuman powers. No wonder we get frustrated in the unequal battle and eventually abandon the quest. Large numbers of people have this experience—and wonder why! The reason is that mere effort of will doesn't go deep enough to reach the roots of our problems. It's like trying to lift yourself off the ground by pulling at your own shoe strings!

Too many who've set out to follow Christ have never found the release from inner struggle that He offers. They've tried to live a life which they don't possess. Their spiritual experience has never reached their unconscious instincts and motives.

We aren't really possessed by Christ until His Spirit enters into the deepest and darkest places in our lives. When He's in control there, He cleanses our motives, purifies our instincts and becomes a creative centre of a new quality of living.

We don't slavishly try to copy Christ. We ask Him to take control of our inner thinking, and we find ourselves doing His will and thinking His thoughts. When following Christ is a heart-breaking struggle we know we're trying to do by ourselves what He is longing to do in us and for us. He came not to make impossible demands—but to give us abundant life.

GOD LEADS A PRETTY SHELTERED LIFE

At the end of time, billions of people were scattered on a great plain before God's throne. Some of the groups near the front talked heatedly—not with cringing shame, but with belligerence.

"Can God judge us? How can he know about suffering?" snapped a pert young brunette. She ripped open a sleeve to reveal a tattooed number from a Nazi concentration camp. "We endured terror . . . beating . . . torture . . . death!"

In another group a Black man lowered his collar. "What about this?" he demanded, showing an ugly rope burn. "Lynched for no crime but being black!"

In another crowd, a pregnant schoolgirl with sullen eyes. "Why should I suffer?" she murmured. "It wasn't my fault."

Far out across the plain were hundreds of such groups. Each had a complaint against God for the evil and suffering he permitted in his world. How lucky God was to live in heaven where all was sweetness and light, where there was no weeping or fear, no hunger or hatred. Indeed, what did God know about what man had been forced to endure in this world? For God leads a pretty sheltered life, they said.

So each of these groups sent out a leader, chosen because he had suffered the most. There was a Jew, a Black, an illegitimate, a person from Hiroshima, a thalidomide child. In the centre of the plain they consulted each other. At last they were ready to present their case. It was rather clever: before God could be qualified to be their judge, he

must endure what they had endured. Their decision was that God should be sentenced to live on earth—as a man!

But because he was God, they set certain safeguards to be sure he could not use his divine powers to help himself.

Let him be born a Jew.

Let the legitimacy of his birth be doubted.

Let him champion a cause so just, but so radical that it brings down upon him the hate, condemnation, and eliminating efforts of every major traditional and established religious authority.

Let him try to describe what no man has ever seen, tasted, heard or smelled . . . let him try to communicate God to men.

Let him be betrayed by his closest friends.

Let him be indicted on false charges, tried before a prejudiced jury, and convicted before a cowardly judge. Let him be tortured.

At the last, let him see what it means to be terribly alone.

Then let him die. Let him die so that there can be no doubting it.

Let there be a great host of witnesses to verify it.

As each leader-announced his portion of the sentence, loud murmurs of approval went up from the great throng of people. When the last had finished pronouncing sentence, there was a long silence. No one uttered another word. No one moved. For all suddenly knew . . .

God had already served his sentence.

CHRISTIAN FM STATION FOR SYDNEY

2CBA—FM—103

The Australian Broadcasting Tribunal has announced the granting of three FM Licences to Sydney-based stations.

One of the three is to be a Christian Station—2CBA, based in Lyons Road, Five Dock.

Commenting on what kind of station, Christian Broadcasting Association (CBA) chairman, the Rev. Vernon Turner emphasised that the station would not necessarily be making "a lot of religious noises".

"We have welcomed public broadcasting as a means of demonstrating Christian social concern." He added: "CBA takes very seriously the words of Jesus spoken long ago when he said, 'I have come to give you a full life'. We will do all in our power to help listeners to our radio station to understand and experience this 'full life'."

The station has adopted a 'quality of life' format.

Programmes will include:

EARLY MORNINGS—Bible study, Community service Information, World News, Job Exchange.

MORNINGS — Leisure time planning for women, Pre-Schoolers feature, Dietry tips, Music for hospitals.

AFTERNOONS—World News, Programmes for lonely people and shut-ins, Know your neighbour (promoting understanding between old and new Australians).

EVENINGS — People and events, Family liesure programmes, Devotional, Youth Shows.

MIDNIGHT TO DAWN—Drama, Counsellor, Bible Study for beginners.

All music will be in full stereo. '2CBA—FM expects to be on air by the end of December.
