THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
26th August, 1953.

Dear People of All Saints',

August 16 marked a memorable milestone in the history of our Parish Church, for on that day we commemorated the Jubilee of its Consecration. Unfortunately the evening congregation was reduced by the rainy and cold conditions which developed after morning service; but we have much for which we may be thankful, as we look back upon our Jubilee Festival Services.

We are very grateful to Her Majesty The Queen's Representative—His Excellency the Governor—for honouring our Church and Parish with his presence on this memorable occasion, and we appreciate his courtesy in sparing the time in his exceptionally busy public life to share in our worship.

Having been welcomed by the Rector, Mrs. Adams, and the Churchwardens, His Excellency (attended by Captain Arnott) inspected the Guard of Honour mounted by the Fort Street High School Cadet Unit (under Captain D. O'Sullivan), and greeted the Balmain Police Boys' Band (in charge of Drum-Major Williams). We thank both units for their co-operation. On entering the Church, the Governor visited the Stone of Remembrance, which, together with the Book of Remembrance, he unveiled on November 20th, 1949.

We record our thanks to Mr. Eagar and the choir members, whose good work throughout the day added greatly to the inspiration of the Services. The occasional preacher at Evensong was the Very Reverend E. A. Pitt, Dean of Sydney, who paid us his first visit, and whom we thank for his message. We are indebted to Miss E. Olofsson and Mrs. Adams for the artistic arrangement of the flowers and to those who helped by bringing additional floral gifts for the Festival.

The Wardens join me in thanking **ALL** parishioners and friends who responded to the special appeal which stands at £121. This is a good deal less than last year; no doubt because of the Special Jubilee Fund. We should like to make it clear that the special offerings on our Jubilee Sunday are for the Parish Hall Debt, the ordinary annual appeal (in lieu of a fete) to pay our interest bill, and, if possible, to reduce that debt; whilst the Jubilee Fund is a special effort to mark the Jubilee Year, and to help with **Church** renovation, particularly the major need for re-roofing. The Churchwardens would be glad to receive any outstanding envelopes issued last month.

Many appreciative comments have been made concerning the Jubilee Tea; some say it was "the best we have ever had," which, in a long succession of similar successful functions, is high praise indeed! The Hall certainly presented an attractive picture, with its thirteen tables laden with good things, and decorated with many shades of Iceland poppies (the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Bullman), which Mrs. Morris again kindly arranged in her usual artistic way. We were happy to have as our guest, the Rector of St. James' Croydon, and Rural Dean of Petersham—the Rev. J. R. Le Huray—who brought greetings from this Deanery, and whose only kindly criticism was that we do not charge sufficient for the excellent meal provided. An enjoyable musical recital, in which Mr. Eagar was assisted by Mrs. Frank Gunner, preceded Evensong, after which an attractive concert programme was presented by Miss Rosalind Chater, Mrs. B. Sayers, Mrs. F. Gunner, Miss Margaret Moore, Mr. William Gates, Mr. Walter Jagger, with Mr. Eagar as accompanist, and last, but not least, the mystifying "Weirdo," who was in excellent form!

The Evening concluded when Mr. L. C. Calver expressed the Wardens' thanks and the Rector added his appreciation to **ALL** who, by their willing co-operation and generous gifts, helped to make the Jubilee Festival the success it undoubtedly was.

The permanent value of our Jubilee will be found not only in

thanksgiving for the blessings of the past—great as they have been—but in realising that membership of Christ's Church is not an isolated affair, not an individual thing alone. It is to be lived out, to grow, to blossom and to bear fruit in the Church's fellowship; for first and foremost, the Church is a fellowship, in which every individual member has a contribution to make. Let us go forward to the tasks ahead, remembering the three vital, outstanding facts about our Church membership:

- (1) It is based on strong, personal convictions.
- (2) It is expressed in fellowship.
- (3) It is made manifest in Service.

We draw your attention to the Sunday School report in which mention is made of the Youth Service being arranged for September 27th and we hope the parents will be sufficiently interested to come with their children.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL

Confirmation, 1953.—In addition to the usual preparation classes for boys and girls on Tuesday and Thursday evenings, respectively, an adult class has been formed, which meets on Wednesday evenings at the Rectory at 7.45 p.m. Any adult desiring to be prepared for Confirmation should inform the Rector and make arrangements to join the class at once.

Diocese of Borneo.—We have now but three months in which to raise the £100 for C.M.S. work in the Diocese of Borneo. These Special Missionary Appeals are sponsored by the Women's Guild in memory of its late president, who commenced them five years before her death. We hope we may have the co-operation of our parishioners and friends, as in previous years. We acknowledge, with thanks, 10/- from Miss Payne and £1 from Mrs. Slee, which brings the total to £13/12/-. Please send your gift, marked "Borneo," to the Women's Guild Secretary or hand it to the Rector or Wardens. The Sunday School is organising a Missionary Evening for Wednesday, October 14th, for this Fund, when a missionary play will be presented by the little folk from the Kindergarten, and the C.M.S. will show a "Jungle Doctor" film. Please note the date.

Women's Guild.—During August the final Dance and Card Evening for the Jubilee Fund was held but was poorly attended, especially by dancers, and the sum of only £5/11/- was added by this effort to the Fund. Members then turned their attention to the Parish Tea, and, in conjunction with other parishioners, acted as hostesses at the thirteen tables. The Tea was a great success and was much enjoyed by those attending.

For September the Guild Meetings are: Thursday, 10th September, Important Business Meeting; Monday, 14th September, Home of Peace Sewing Day; Thursday, 24th September, Sale of Work. We repeat the notice about the Sale, as we want to stock a Work Stall, Cake and Groceries Stall, Refreshments, and Surprise Packets, these last to be valued at 1/- and 2/-. The Guild appeals to every reader for help in this undertaking, the proceeds of which will go to our Quota for the Parish Hall Fund, and the balance to the Jubilee Fund. Gifts for the stalls may be left at the Rectory or handed to any Guild member. As we are arranging an interesting programme, which will include a display by the Physical Culture Club, a charge of a silver coin will be made for admission to the Sale. We ask every parishioner to help by gifts, and by attendance on 24th September, at 7.45 p.m.

The Guild would welcome new members, as there is work for many more than we can muster.—V. LUCAS, Secretary.
