THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

27th October, 1941.

Dear People of All Saints',

Yesterday Bishop Hilliard administered the Sacred Rite of Confirmation to sixty-three candidates (49 from this parish and 14 from the parish of St. John, Balmain North). This beautiful and impressive service should ever remain in the minds of those who were then admitted into full membership of the Church of England. The Bishop (who was himself confirmed here on All Saints' Day 38 years ago) based his inspiring address on St. John's message to the Church in Smyrna (Revelation 2:10): "Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life," which passage, I hope, has been marked by the confirmees in the manner suggested in their preparation. As the Church extends to these young people the right hand of fellowship, so, the Bishop said, the hand suggests five ways which will help them to be faithful—1. Prayer (morning and evening), 2. Attending Church (every Sunday), 3. Daily Bible-reading, 4. Holy Communion (regular attendance), and 5. Service.

Thinking of the Confirmation Service this morning prompted me to look up my Confirmation Register to see how the young people who were confirmed twelve months ago have got on during the past year. What I found depressed me exceedingly. Of the 35 candidates who were confirmed in 1940, seven no longer live in this parish. Of the remaining twenty-eight, I find only ten are regular communicants (one would have been regular, but for many months spent in hospital). Of the seventeen others, three attend now and again, whilst fourteen have not attended Communion, so far as I know, for many, many months. It makes one wonder whether all the time and energy put into the three months' preparation were really worth while, and it seems to suggest that their preparation meant little or nothing to those who can so soon forget it, and their confirmation, at which they made three definite promises.


Is it any wonder that I commend, with the utmost earnestness, those young people who were confirmed yesterday to the unceasing prayer and care of their parents and elders? Whether the confirmees remain "faithful" to their vows will no doubt depend largely upon the measure of sincerity and earnestness which they put into their preparation; but it will also depend, far more than you realise, upon the **example** of their parents and the more senior members amongst their relatives and friends. Parents! What kind of a lead are **YOU** giving to your boy, your girl, in matters religious, during these critical days, when our enemies quite openly boast of their determination to overthrow the Christian Faith, and make no secret of the fact that they are out to destroy the freedom and beauty and joy of life—the precious fruits of ages of sacrifice and struggle—the very things for which Christ stood and for which His Church stands to-day?

W. J. Brown, writing in "The Listener" (10/7/1941), says: "If there is to be any sort of social order in the world, if there is to be any kind of civilization, any kind of stable international relations whatever, we must kill this philosophy of lies and deception which Nazism has made into a permanent instrument of policy. That is why I have insisted so often that basically this war is not a political war, not even an economic war, but primarily a **religious** war. That is the lesson for us all. . . . The British people have learnt their lesson. And so I speak for them when I say that for us this is not a war for or against any social system. It is a war against lying, treachery, perjury, murder—all the things which would dissolve the foundations of any social or international system whatever. Till this evil thing be destroyed, there is no hope for mankind, in any country, or continent, whatever its social order may be. . . ."

By the time this letter reaches many of you, our Patronal Festival Services on Sunday, November 2nd, will be over; but there should be time to remind you of the Choral Evensong on Wednesday, November 5th, and to express the hope that, as it is a part of our Festival, many people will endeavour to be present.

We are asked to observe Sunday, November 16, as a special Day of Prayer. I hope that all our people will arrange to be in Church at least **once** on that Sunday. Prayer is not something that is narrowly selfish, and concerned chiefly with our own interests; it is meant not to save us from the common ills of life, but to make us strong to meet them.
