Australian Church Women

ACW came into being in 1965 when Women's Inter-Church Councils from all States and Territories came together to form Australian Church Women, fostering ecumenism and undertaking action on behalf of Church women. Australian Church Women forms a network of committed Christian women, dedicated to encourage fellowship and service across denominational, national and international boundaries.

Fellowship of the Least Coin monies which have been collected with prayer for peace and reconciliation during the past year are brought to World Community Day services by groups and individuals and are dedicated. These funds are then sent to State/Territory Treasurers who forward them to the National Treasurer.

General Offertory from this Service is to be divided equally between Asian Church Women's Conference, with which Australian Church Women is affiliated and supports annually; and the 1997 Special Community Day Project - **Bimbadeen College** in Cootamundra, southern N.S.W.

Bimbadeen is a Christian Training College, (which receives no government funding), providing training in Theology and Agricultural pursuits and has been engaged in training men and women for the work of ministry since 1979. The College accepts students of all denominations from all over Australia. Although Bimbadeen is primarily set up for Aborigines and Torres Strait Islanders, students have included South Pacific Islanders, Indians and Europeans.

Courses Offered include Discipleship, Biblical Studies, Pastoral Studies, and Vocational Training - with emphasis on farm work.

Purpose To provide Biblical Education Programs for Christians to enhance leadership and employment skills and to train and equip the students for the work of ministry.

image of God, called to follow many paths to God.

Voices of Many People (could use four readers)

Aborigine I was born in the bush, I had no house, I lived in a wurly, I had no money. Nature was my bank, I looked after its capital and drew on its interest. Bush tucker was my natural food, I was shown how to follow tracks and challenge the cunning of the animals. I watched the men make dugout canoes, three pronged spears for spearing fish and shovel spears for spearing kangaroo and wallabies. I saw them diving to catch fresh water turtles with their bare hands. I learnt how to tease out fibre from the 'marapan' palm tree and to make string from it and from string make dilly bags and fish nets. From my parents and my group I learnt my 'culture' - how to look out on the country, the bush, my world. My life was filled with beautiful stories, my people could not read, they did not write, they remembered and they told and retold. The extended family was the human side of it

world. It gave us support. We developed as people by interaction within that family. I developed a love for the bush and especially for its quietness. I do believe that in quietness is our very search for God. I began to experience in that quietness the great Spirit, the Father of us all.

European

We came to this Southern Land for many different reasons. Some were forced to come, others were starving, yet others came because of oppressive governments. Still others were lured by tales of gold, and others came for the sheer adventure of settling in a vast open empty land. We brought our European and Eastern ways of thinking, customs, foods and dress with us whether they were suitable or not. All who came, found a strange land, a land of fire, drought and flood. A land where trees did not produce fruit, where grasses could not be harvested for grain. So we set about using the trees, shrubs, grasses and flowers from the Northern Hemisphere. We introduced animals of the north, and only now, 200 years after the first boatloads came, have we realised how much damage we have done to the land, the natural animals and above all to the original people whose home this was and is. But we have survived and established our ways and our culture under the Southern Stars.

Asian/Pacific

Why we are different! We are rich with so many islands, hills, mountains and seas. Our culture is rich in every way - dance, music, food, language and ways. We respect elders and our extended family is always around to help us in our struggles and trials. Some of us might be very poor but our motto is "to share and give to others what we have and can". We love our food and music and we share them. We love our families who look after us, be it extended or not. "Cleanliness is next to Godliness" is another motto we learnt. We are very hospitable - we will give our own bed to our visitors, strangers or friends. We are very friendly and we worship God as often as we can. Some of us do not have freedom of speech, religion or choice.

The Path We Have Come

Fourth Reader We have come to this land "Lucky Australia" we say. A land of such beauty, riches, and vastness we could not believe existed. We get used to this heat in the vast land. We acquire the rich culture in which we share our own. Even our own language we soon forget, we call it "Aussie" style after we get used to it. We raise our families and most of us prefer to stay in this beautiful

land and die here. We call ourselves "Australians" and we feel we belong and love this peaceful land. We thank God for the riches of this land for before we came, some of us did not have food to eat or clean water to drink.
