THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
28th January, 1952.

Dear People of All Saints',

The end of the holiday period marks the resumption of our Parish organisations which are now arranging their programmes for the year. We hope we may have all present members with us again, and we should be glad to see many others joining them. Single-handed we may not be able to achieve very much, but working with others, sharing common interests, loyalties and activities, we can be really effective. After all, our religion began as a fellowship, that of Christ and His friends, and has continued all through the centuries to be a Communion or Fellowship bound together not just by a common interest as in a club, but by a common life. It is no easy thing to apply Christianity in the home, at work and in society. It will mean daring, heroism and sacrifice, and what the world will probably call failure. If all who are working for the Kingdom of God will get together and work together, under the inspiration of friendship with the Living God, then things will happen. Everyone feels the need of fellowship of some kind and a hearty welcome is extended to join our guilds and clubs which could be greatly strengthened in their plans and objectives for this year by the addition of new members. Perhaps this means **YOU**?

We would remind you of our Harvest Thanksgiving Services on Quinquagesima Sunday, **February 24**. We hope we may have, once again, the interest and support of all our people. This year, in view of shortages and rising costs, it may not be so easy to make our Harvest offerings, but if we **all** do what we can I have no doubt we shall have a worthy Thank-Offering, and one which will be of great practical assistance to the Home of Peace which continues, year in and year out, its wonderful work of ministry to the sick and suffering.


Once again we approach the solemn Season of Lent. May I continue to emphasise that "solemn" is not the same thing as "gloomy," as so many people seem to imagine! Lent is a time when we try to achieve a clearer knowledge of ourselves; it never has been a popular season, but it is, nevertheless, an essential part of our Christian life. Lent calls us to examine ourselves to see whether we are really alive to the menace of everything that leaves God out of life. The well-known words of our daily Lenten prayer: "Create and make in us new and contrite hearts," still remain fundamental. The self-denials and disciplines of Lent are not the futile, useless things that some people think. It is fitting, too, that we should prepare ourselves for the commemoration of our Lord's Passion and death, that we may the more truly share the joy of Easter. The form which fasting takes does not greatly matter, provided we are genuinely submitting ourselves to self-discipline. Each one trying to be loyal to Christ and His Church will make his or her own rules for the proper observance of the Lenten Season. Particularly would I suggest that we give more time to our private prayer, Bible-reading and worship, allowing nothing to interfere with our attendance at Holy Communion and the other services of the Church. Opportunities are given you for meditation and worship at the mid-week services as well as those held on Sundays. Above all, we should remember that above the call of the Church is the call of Christ Himself: "If anyone wishes to follow Me, let him deny himself. . . ."

Today we are called to use every power God has given us to strive to bring the world into the knowledge of the things which belong to its peace. Here is something we can **all** do for peace. We can support the missionary programme of Christ's Church as we have never done before. By money saved in our Lenten discipline we could provide the sinews

of Christ's holy and non-violent warfare against error, superstition, enslavement, disease and all other evils. All our Lenten self-denial offerings will be used for the extension of Christ's Kingdom through the two great Missionary Societies of our Church—the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society. Lenten Boxes and envelopes will be ready on the Sunday before Ash Wednesday, i.e., on February 24th. It is just a year since the Mount Lamington disaster in New Guinea, when, on January 21, 1951, "Mount Lamington erupted horizontally in the direction of some of the most thickly-populated country in Papua, killing instantly the entire European population of Higaturu Government station and Sangara Anglican Mission Station, as well as 3,000 sons and daughters of Papua." All Saints' is linked with Sangara, for Margaret de Bibra, that brilliant girl and fine Christian, who was in charge of the educational work, was trained at the House of The Epiphany, in this Parish, and helped in our Sunday School during portion of that period. I hope that some of our Lenten gifts will go to help the work of reconstruction in that devastated area. Having in mind the great opportunities facing our missionary societies, and realising how they are handicapped by costs still rising fantastically, we are prompted to ask for increased Lenten offerings this year.

The following is portion of a letter received from The Australian Commission for Interchurch Aid of The Australian Council for the World Council of Churches:—

"The Australian Council for the World Council of Churches asks church men and women throughout Australia to give practical help to the devastated churches of Europe and Asia.

"Heads of Churches in all states and the responsible bodies of nearly all Australian churches have warmly endorsed this Appeal.

"There is no need for us to tell you of the needs we must attempt to meet. Churches, ministers, dwellings, schools, colleges, orphanages, homes, community centres and hospitals have been destroyed. Bibles, hymn books, libraries, printing presses and furniture must be replaced. Clergy and ministers, sisters and deaconesses, nurses and teachers have been imprisoned, starved, persecuted and killed.

"This means that our privileged churches in Australia are able to make their faith real for their friends across the sea by giving towards the work of rebuilding, equipping and restaffing the less fortunate members of our world family of Christian communions. We do this because we believe a renewal of their witness is God's will for the world.

"Already the Australian churches have made some contribution. £16,000 was raised in Australia during 1950. This is the beginning of a continuing programme in which we must all join according to our resources.

"We, therefore, ask you to present this Appeal to your own people. We know of the many pressing local needs that must be met by their

giving, but we feel confident you believe with us that a church which gives to those in desperate need elsewhere grows proportionately at home according to the inward and spiritual law of Jesus Christ."

The above has the authority of our own Archbishop (President of the Australian Council) and other heads of the Churches. The Rector is willing to act as collector for this appeal until such time as someone is found to take it over. He feels that the best results will be obtained, not by a few people giving a lot, but by many people giving what they can, and giving it **regularly** each month. Take and read the literature you will find in the Church porch.
