THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
27th July, 1942.

Dear People of All Saints':

If our Consecration Festival is to be in any sense worthwhile, and worthy of the thoughts and ideals which prompt us to keep this annual remembrance, we shall need the utmost co-operation and support of all parishioners. I want, therefore, to put the question to each one of you individually: What are you going to do about it? It is customary to observe this Festival as a "Back to All Saints'" Sunday, when we endeavour to get in touch with all former parishioners and invite them to worship with us in their old parish church on that day. First; will you commence to do this now? There are no invitation cards being issued this year, but you can send your friends this paper, specially drawing their attention to page 5. Many of those former parishioners who were keen, loyal churchpeople have passed on; but there must be numbers of their relatives who would welcome an opportunity of renewing their associations with All Saints', Petersham. Second; you can help quite a lot by inviting present parishioners to come, particularly those who do not attend regularly, and those who do not come at all. Third; and above all, you can remember daily the Festival Services in your prayers.

In view of the fact that we still have afternoon service, this year's arrangements will be slightly different. That people can come in the afternoon if they want to, is clearly shown by the splendid congregation we had on a recent Sunday when Bishop Cranswick visited us and gave one of the finest missionary addresses I have ever heard. So we shall expect you to make an effort to be present at the afternoon service on August 16th—the Festival Sunday. Unfortunately some of those who used to attend regularly on Sunday evenings do not now come at all; in spite of the fact that there are always two morning services to which they might come if the afternoon is not convenient. In this connection, I must pay a tribute of appreciation to our Choir. None of us really like the afternoon service, but the Choir members have been very loyal, and have "stuck to it," quite regardless of personal preference. I wish I could say the same of many others. This lack of co-operation in the matter of afternoon service is very discouraging to the clergy who give of their best at all times, and a discouraged ministry is little less than a tragedy. We do not ask to be pampered by our people, but we would like them to remember that we also are human beings. I was struck by a sentence I read in a recent article regarding Sunday services eighteen hundred years ago; it reads: "Worship was a social act, for which no amount of private piety and good behaviour could serve as substitute." Also from the same article, "It did not occur to them to ask that their worship should be 'bright' or 'attractive' or 'helpful.' They were content that it was true, and that, in offering it as they were taught, they were standing in the sight of the Divine Majesty before God's altar in heaven." Unfortunately, many people to-day are endeavouring to make all sorts of things a substitute for worship. Even doing various kinds of war work, most necessary as it admittedly is, is no substitute for corporate worship, and never can be. So far, I see no signs that we are even remotely approaching a state of readiness for, and worthiness of the peace for which we are longing and praying.

The men of the parish are again invited to be present at the 8 o'clock celebration on August 16, and to share the fellowship of the men's Communion Breakfast which follows that service.


Will those who have collecting boxes which were issued some months ago (in lieu of a fete) please return them on the Festival Sunday? For those who have no box, there is issued with this "Chronicle" a special envelope in which you are asked to place your offering, and bring it to church on the same Sunday. As there are fewer boxes allotted this year, more people will require envelopes. Our offerings must not fall below last year's total; we should try rather to exceed it.

We hope to have our Parish Festival Tea and Social Reunion on Wednesday, August 19. Tickets for the Tea are now available and may be had from your District Visitor, from members of the Women's Guild or from the Rectory at a cost of one shilling. We attach a good deal of importance to ticket sales, for it is only in this manner that we can approximate the number of people for whom we shall have to provide. You can help by purchasing your ticket as soon as possible. Even allowing for the many essential calls upon us, we feel that, with your help, we can maintain the high standard of our Festival Tea. We shall be glad to hear from any parishioners who may be willing to donate a table or a portion thereof, and promises of donations in kind will be most welcome.

Confirmation classes will commence this month: Boys on Wednesday, August 26, and girls on Thursday, August 27, both classes being held at the Rectory and commencing at 7.30 p.m. I spoke last month of going to the Cathedral for Confirmation this year, but I have since discovered that there is a Confirmation at St. Augustine's, Stanmore, towards the end of November, at which the Rector is willing that I should present our candidates. I am therefore making application to the Archbishop for permission to do this. I feel it would not only be more convenient, but would be fitting that our candidates should join with those of St. Augustine's which was originally a daughter church of All Saints'. Candidates for Confirmation will please supply the date and place of their Baptism. **Regular attendance** at preparation classes is absolutely essential.

Our sympathies go out to those anxious parents and friends whose loved ones are reported "missing." Doubtless many of those so announced in recent lists are prisoners-of-war. We continue to pray for them both in our corporate and private prayers; and we suggest that all who are anxious might come together to join in the corporate intercession which is offered each Sunday and Wednesday. We reprint a prayer taken from "The Canadian Churchman" which you might care to use.

Missionary News.—The following interesting paragraph has been supplied by Miss Olive Stevens, Federal Secretary, Heralds of the King, A.B.M.:—

Priests of their own: In India every year many thousands of new Christians are baptized. Indian priests are needed to give them the sacraments and to teach them. The Bishop of Assam has a plan to help the people in his diocese in that way. Assam is a land of mountain and jungle. Most of the Christians live in villages miles away from any means of transport or even a good road. The people are poor and need priests who understand how hard their lives are and who will live with them and help them in their Christian life.

As the Bishop travels from village to village he often finds Christian men who are trying to teach others and invites them to come and stay in his home. They come for six weeks, all working and praying and eating together, while the Bishop teaches them more about the Christian Faith. Then they go back to their own villages to teach the other Christians.

Next year they come for another six weeks, and so on, for several years, each time learning something more of the Christian Faith. Some of them are then chosen to be Deacons and later on Priests.

Writing of such an ordination, the Bishop of Assam says—"The chief event of the year has been the ordination of our first voluntary priest, i.e., a man who, while continuing to earn his living by cultivation, is not only the leader of his village in secular matters, but can also minister to them the Bread of Life. This type of clergy is very badly needed."

They will be very poor like their congregations, for they will live on the offerings of the people. But that will make them and their people better able to understand and help each other, and to offer to God their best in worship and service.
