THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory, 26th June, 1944.

Dear People of All Saints',—

Writing for the July "Chronicle" reminds me that the time is drawing close when we shall commence our preparation classes for Confirmation. Once again I ask the co-operation of the parents and godparents of our young people. Obviously you cannot decide this most serious question for them, but you can, and, I hope you will, give them every possible encouragement and support as they approach this most important period in their lives. You, as parents, naturally want the best for your children in those things which fit them for life in the material sense, and you should be just as keen, in fact, even more so, to see that they are trained in the more lasting spiritual things. If you yourself have not been confirmed, why not grasp the opportunity now offered you? Should you be in the least diffident about attending a young people's class, I would be happy to arrange an adult preparation class should the numbers warrant it.

To the candidates themselves I would issue a word of warning. It is this: Unless you are prepared to be **reasonably regular Communicants** after your Confirmation, I would rather you did not present yourself for preparation. It is most disappointing to spend weeks of preparation on people who come to their Communion two or three times and then, without any reason, join the "drifters." It is worth remembering that once we commence drifting we drift **down-stream, not up!** Elsewhere in this issue you will note the date on which your classes commence. If you wish to join them, please let me have, before July 31st, your full name and address, your age last birthday, and the date of your Baptism. The Confirmation Service will be on Sunday morning, October 22nd; as a general rule, candidates should be fourteen years of age on or before that date. If you are not quite 14, and you wish to be prepared for Confirmation, I would like to have your name as soon as possible, as permission must be obtained from the Archbishop to admit you to the classes.

On August 20th we hope to observe the 41st Anniversary of the Consecration of All Saints'. It is not too soon to commence getting in touch with former parishioners to invite them to be with us at one or more of the special services being arranged for the consecration festival. We know all the difficulties of rationing, but we still hope to hold the Annual Festival Tea on Wednesday, August 23rd. We would, therefore, be glad to hear from those who would be willing to donate a table or portion thereof, and also from those who are willing to act as hostesses that evening.

On our Festival Sunday—August 20th—the boxes in use (in lieu of a fete) will be returned and presented. There now remain but six weeks in which to conclude our efforts for the Parish Hall Fund. A special envelope will be provided in the August "Chronicle" for those who have no box; and we ask **all parishioners** to join in making this annual effort for our Parish Hall a great success.

A great many people to-day cherish glowing hopes of a more Christian order of society in the days ahead. Speeches from platforms, talks on the air, writings in books and newspapers, are full of plans for a new order. I am afraid many of us are only too ready to believe that it can all be had for the asking. We don't realise what a complete revolution is involved. George Barclay, in "The Bible Speaks to Our Day," points out in a chapter on "Reconstruction," where we must commence. Basing

portion of his talk on the prophet Haggai's first two chapters, he says: "The first message which Haggai brought from the Lord to the people was that their values were all wrong; they had been giving priority to the material needs of the community, and it had not been a success. Believing that economics was of more urgent importance than religion, they had failed even to make a success of their economics. Putting first things second had not worked well. It is the old lesson in new circumstances. Spiritual things cannot be neglected without misfortune; life goes wrong if God is left out. Man cannot live by economics alone; he needs, really needs, God. Haggai is not content to say that man needs God as well as economics; he goes a little further than that, saying that if a community neglects God it will not even make a success of its economics. The second message which the Lord sent by His prophet was a call to the people to make a start at once with the building of the Temple, which they had too long neglected . . . For, without a church, without a centre of worship, without some means by which people can express and develop their relation to God, God is not really honoured. The Bible knows little of the idea of a religion without a church . . ."

We realise how inadequate the church of to-day is for the tasks that lie before it. The call comes to each one of us to help build it up, and we cannot build it up from the outside! You must come in, and help to strengthen it from the inside if you really want a Christian social order after the war.

We continue to pray for our Empire and her Allies in this time of terrific struggle. We would like to see more people joining us Sunday by Sunday, and day by day. There are short periods of guided intercession on Tuesdays and Fridays at 12 noon, subject, of course, to the exigencies of the parish. The church is open daily for private prayer and meditation.
