Dear Friends,

The month of June comes round again. I always turn my thoughts to the tax-man—June 30th, end of the financial year—time to prepare the tax return.

For many businessmen it is a time to balance their books. A time to calculate how profitable the year's trading has been.

Three things come to mind in thinking about the end of the financial year. The first, quite practical. Most of us give small or large gifts to various organisations or charities. The best organisations to support are Christian organisations. We can always be sure the money is used to help the needy and that it is not spent on organisational expenses. Money is given to such societies as the Home Mission Society, the Bush Church Aid Society is effectively used. Many such Christian organisations are registered charities. It is a way to make your dollar go further in more senses than one.

The second point I would make. Are you surprised how much you have spent on entertainment, how much on papers and magazines, how much on clothes, etc., etc.?

How does your giving for the welfare of others or the work of the church compare with your spending on purely personal things?

It is a time to take stock of such things. The Jewish people in Old Testament times were encouraged to give a tenth of their income to help others. Many today observe this standard. We certainly ought to budget in some regular fashion.

Lastly, taxation time causes many to stop and look to see

if they have enough to meet their obligations to the Government. "Have I sufficient to meet my taxes?"

To many, it is like a mini-day of judgement. However when we meet the Lord face to face, all our good deeds and all our wealth will be of no importance.

Heaven is free to all those who here on earth have given themselves to the Lord and trust in His death on the Cross as full payment for their sin.

Hope the tax-man treats you kindly. I can promise God will if you come to Him through Christ Jesus the Saviour.

PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

THE ARCHBISHOP'S WINTER APPEAL

For want of a helping hand

Jenny looked and felt different from the other girls at school. She didn't have anything that looked right. Her tatty clothes set her apart and there was no money to buy the books and equipment she needed for school. She felt like giving up and started missing school.

Jenny lives with her grandmother. When the local minister heard of Jenny's continued absence from school he called on the grandmother and offered help.

There simply wasn't enough money to go round after food was bought and bills paid. In Jenny's case the problem was easily solved when the rector was able to step in and lend a helping hand and provide funds to get through this difficult time.

For want of a job

In some Sydney areas worst hit by the recession, three out of every 10 working people have lost their jobs through no fault of their own. Many have become "unemployable", having outdated skills now no longer useful.

The Winter Appeal has helped finance a retraining centre which has given new skills to many, offering new hope to families.

For want of a break

Life at the Browning's is very hard. Things started to turn sour when Mr. Browning lost his job. His income stopped but the bills kept coming. Things got worse when his wife left him, alone, with the three young children. What the local minister finally uncovered was a sad household under pressure, ready to give up.

With help from the Winter Appeal, counselling, food, money and job assistance were provided. Negotiations were made with debt collectors to lift the financial burden.

Mr. Browning is now back in the work force. His family is being cared for and the finances are under control.

Donations received through the Winter Appeal are distributed to the most urgent areas of need within the Sydney

Diocese. These include welfare work among children and adolescents, family counselling, social work among refugees and isolated ethnic groups, youth camps for underprivileged children, job training programmes and grants to clergy who uncover serious needs within their parishes.

Appeal donations are carefully used on your behalf by the Archbishop through the clergy and Anglican caring agencies.

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NEWCASTLE PARISHES PREPARE FOR ADMISSION OF CHILDREN TO COMMUNION

Anglican Encounter, the magazine of Newcastle Diocese recently carried the following report:

Many parishes during Lent will consider seriously when and how they will begin admitting children to communion before confirmation. This has been the object of discussion in the diocese for many years. Last year, Diocesan Synod on the recommendation of a committee which had examined the issue, gave permission for it to happen.

It is anticipated that children of 7 and over who come to church with their family, should be admitted to communion if they and their family wish it. Preparation for this event would take place in the child's home with the family participating. When the child is ready, he or she will be welcomed and received into the communicating life of the parish.

Archdeacon Peter Rushton is looking forward to admitting children to communion in the parish of Maitland. "Theologically", he said, "my attitude is based on the fact that Baptism is the admission to full membership of the church, and therefore, a baptised person is eligible to receive Holy Communion".

The archdeacon stated that it is important that children be able to participate completely in the worship of the church. "We don't give enough credence to children's understanding", he said. "They probably understand better the mystery of the Eucharist, than many adults because their minds are not clouded by such things as disbelief. Whether they understand all the words is irrelevant. God works through the sacrament and that goes beyond words. A priest is aware of the children in his congregation who are ready for this step. Giving children tickets etc. is no substitute for the real thing and children know it."

The Revd. Paul Robertson of Scone would also like to introduce younger children to communion. He said, "children by Baptism are members of the community of the redeemed. In a way they are living examples of justification by faith because of their reliance on God's grace." Also, he said, this step will enable children within the life of the church to realise their full membership of the church.

Paul Robertson said he would also like to see confirmation delayed so that it became an adult public affirmation of faith rather than a puberty rite of graduation out of the church.

He said however he would not like to introduce until there was a general consensus in the parish. He would like to see more discussion on a deanery level as well.

The Revd. Trevor Smith, education consultant in the diocese, has prepared material for parishes to read, and also material for groups to study during Lent. He hopes that parishes which propose to admit younger children to communion, will use the material fully, to allow all members of the parish to understand and participate and take more seriously the nature of the younger members of the congregation.
