

THE RECTOR'S LETTER

People of All Saints'

Here is a Parable from nature which applies to us all individually, and to the Parish of All Saints', Petersham. We might call it the parable of the lone tree. Many thousands of tourists visit Rotorua, New Zealand, every year to see the thermal areas there, and to take pictures of the geysers and hot coloured pools and other wonders of nature. These are wonderful and terrifying sights and the moist, sulphurous air hangs heavy over the land. One day one of the tourists tired of photographing the marked exhibits and travelling the appointed routes with the crowds, and so roaming off by himself, he climbed to the top of a small peak. There he came upon a dead tree standing alone on the rocky summit, silhouetted against a background of dark threatening clouds that often form over the lush valleys and hills of the North Island.

The picture of this lone dead tree with its gnarled, stumpy branches, leafless and stark, was in a collection he showed to his friends when he returned to his home. They all agreed that it was the most desolate-looking scene they could imagine. One of them, noticing the menacing clouds, even commented that the old tree probably went down in the coming storm and was not out of its misery.

But the man who took the picture would not agree that it was the scene of gloom. "It is inspiring", he insisted. To be sure, it was no "tree planted by the rivers of water". But neither is it like the chaff which is driven away by the wind. For this tree had curled its roots around the rocks among which it was seeded, and it stood its ground defying the tempest of the storm.

You may have seen just such a tree somewhere yourself. Once it was a tiny sapling. If only someone had transplanted it then to a more favourable surrounding and covered its roots deeply with rich, moist earth! But nobody did. The little tree wasted no time pitying itself. It put down its roots as best it could and grew where it was. Making full use of what encouragement the rocky soil gave, it kept lifting its head to the sky. And the taller it grew, the more exposed it became to the elements. And the more it was buffeted, the stronger its fibres became. Its crooked arms bore witness to many a wrestling match it won with the worst that nature threw against it.

We imagine that if the lush pine trees in the forest below could talk to us, they might say that they have drawn courage and faith from seeing that sturdy sentinel standing-up to the storm.

The scene to be sure looks desolate because the tree is dead, but it also is an inspiring scene because the tree bears many marks of the brave life that it lived. What we learn is about what counts in life. The fact that a person must struggle through life and finally die is not the important thing, but the way we meet the struggle. It's not what life hands us, but the way we live that life that counts. It's not what we might have done with what we wish we had, but what we actually did with what we received, that really matters.

God apparently wants certain trees and certain human lives to be planted not in lush, easy, green valleys but on rocky, windswept heights. Nowhere does He promise us uninterrupted ease in life. Some seem to be called to ride a stormy sea through life. If this perhaps describes us then what we need is not transplanting, but grace and grit to face the gale. What we need is the courage of an unbending faith in our God. Since he has called us to this life, what we need to do is roll up our sleeves, clench our fists, and dig in our heels and bravely face come what may.

For we know that our God is faithful, that He who established us on this course of life is able to see us safely to its conclusion, and in that knowledge we can live victoriously, though we seem to lose the battle.

All parishioners past and present are cordially invited to join in the Services and special events to be held this month to mark the 68th Consecration Festival at All Saints'.


Sunday 15th: Consecration Festival Services—





Muston, recently appointed as Coadjutor Bishop of Melbourne. B.C.A. supporters are invited to the 1971 Rally at the Chapter House on Friday, 6th August, at 8 p.m. The Archbishop of Sydney will speak and show films of his recent tour of B.C.A. work in North-west Australia.

● **Fellowship Work:** A large work force of Fellowship members conducted a clean-up on Friday evening, 2nd July, extending as far as the Y.C.I. room, where they cleaned up some of the darker corners. They also completed a well-built wheelbarrow, which they will use to collect garden refuse from the church grounds; we are grateful to the Fellowship for their attention to the lawns and grounds, and also for the other work mentioned.
