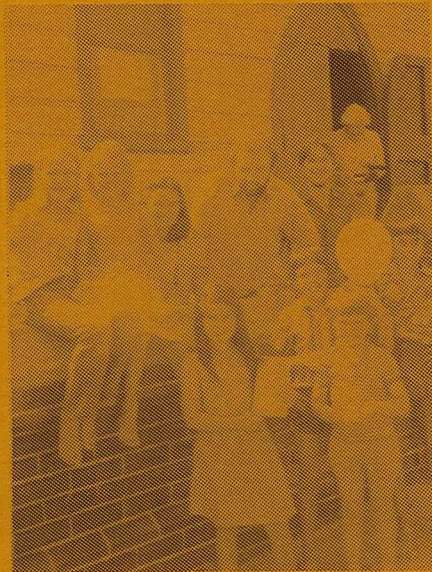

New Minister For St. Matthias

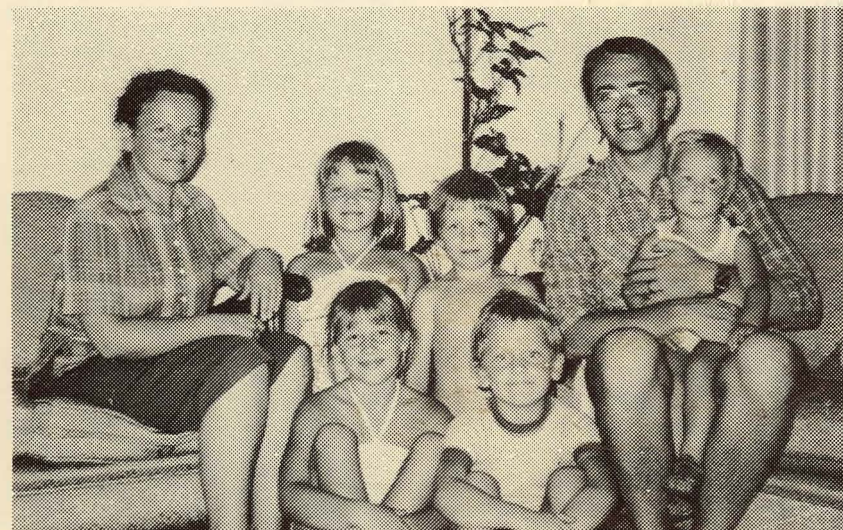

A University Church

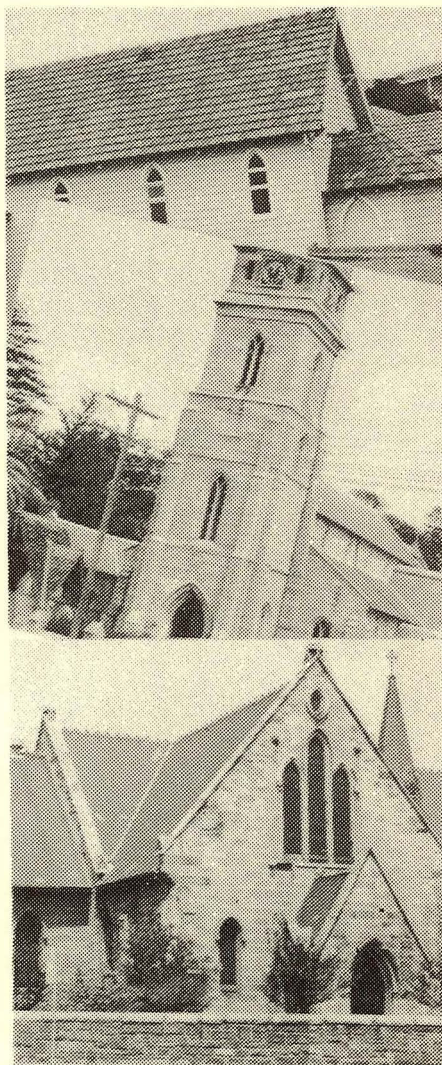
History

Originally the university church was meeting in the building of St. Jude's South Randwick, where it continued to grow until the end of 1977. In 1978 we moved to join the congregation at St. Matthias. The university church was founded by the anglican chaplaincy in order to meet the needs of country and overseas students resident for a short time in the eastern suburbs. It has continued to have a ministry to college students and flat-dwellers as well as extending its work amongst nurses and others who, for reasons of study or employment, have been located in the eastern suburbs.

Aims

It is the concern of our church to make known the Gospel of Jesus Christ. To this end we have a consistent teaching programme of expository preaching. Chapter by chapter through the Bible, we seek to understand and apply God's Word to our lives.

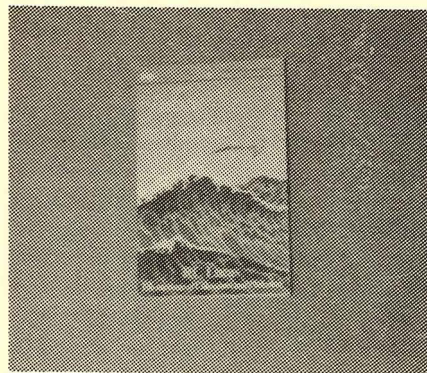
The congregational life has not only been aimed at edifying Christians but also at sharing the Gospel with unbelievers and enquirers. One of the chief directions of our work amongst Christians is to equip them in the ministries that God has given them to undertake. We also hope through our small groups to provide for people's needs for fellowship and personal encouragement.



Aids To Learning

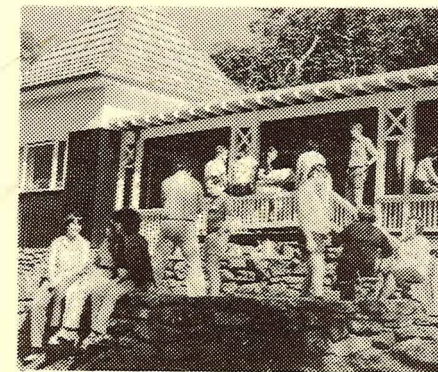
Conferences

During the year we hold several conferences which aim to teach the scriptures and increase our opportunities for fellowship with each other. These weekend conferences are open to all members of our congregation and we do hope that everyone will be able to attend at least one. The dates for the first few conferences are: 19-21 Feb., 12-14 March, 2-4 April, and 23-26 April. These all have a limit of around 50 people. Please apply early so as not to be disappointed.



Creche

Children are welcome in our church meetings. However, as many mothers find themselves distracted by their children, we provide a creche in the church hall during the morning service for small children. There is also amplification into the vestry for mothers who have restless children or who wish to feed children in some degree of privacy.



Bookstall

Please check our range of quality Christian books available from our bookstall. The books are replenished monthly and new titles constantly featured.

Cassettes

At the rear of our building is the cassette library. Cassettes can be borrowed by members who join the library for a nominal fee. Cassettes of individual talks or series may also be purchased through the library.

Prayer and Bible Groups

Since the foundation of the university church we have been gathering in small groups as well as in the weekly meeting. These small groups are called Prayer and Bible groups, for whatever else is contained within their meetings, there is always an emphasis on prayer and they all aim to live under the authority of the Bible.

The groups meet in various members homes, flats or college rooms. All church members are encouraged to become participants in a Prayer and Bible group. Some meet mid-week, while the majority meet on Sunday, either before or after church.

The variety of groups is a reflection of the individual members of each of the groups. However there are some differences between the groups that has been intentional. We are hoping in 1982 to have some groups which will specialize in much more serious Bible and/or doctrinal studies. Other groups will take a particular interest in some form of cross-cultural evangelism while yet others will be seeking training in specific skills of Christian ministry. All the groups however, will maintain their emphasis on being centres of prayer and biblical understanding.

"It's great to be able to dig into the Bible at your own speed with a group of friends."

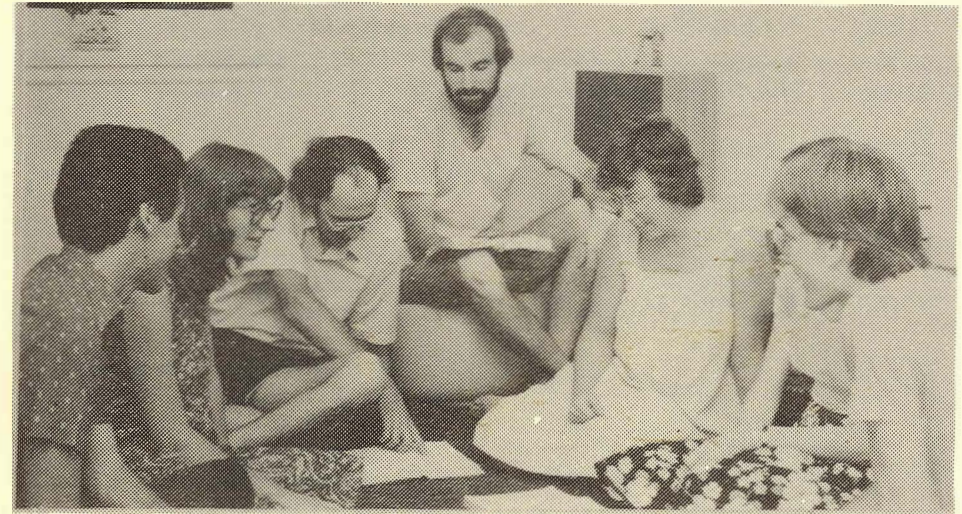
"It's hard at first but by the end of the year you feel as if the group has become like a family."

Training in Ministry

One of our chief concerns is to train people in the ministry of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Both on the campus and around the church we offer courses to help people in ministry. Some of these courses are about Personal Evangelism — how to share your faith with others, or how to follow-up new Christians and help establish them in the faith of Jesus, or how to do investigative Bible study with enquirers.

Colin Marshall and Jill Williams have particular responsibility for the training of people in Christian ministry. They organise ministry groups on the campus at New South Wales University. Over 150 students are engaged in gaining these skills of Christian ministry. They also organise courses that are run through the Prayer and Bible groups of our church to help people in their ministries.

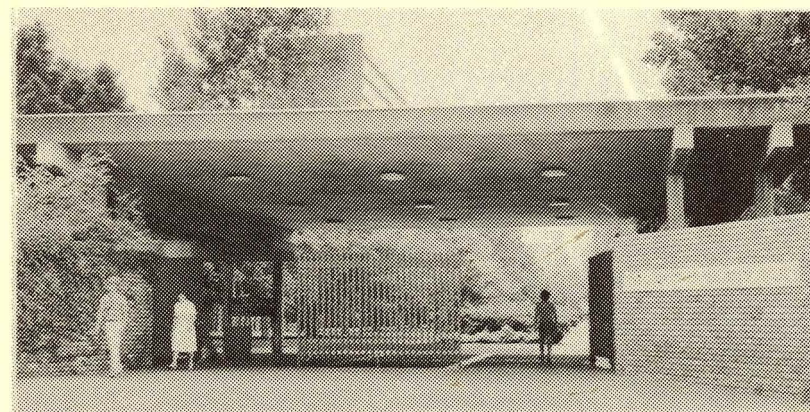


Short-Term Training Scheme

Many of our members are considering full-time Christian ministry. Each year we employ some members of our congregation who are interested in full-time Christian ministry in our short-term training scheme. In this coming year we will be employing **Michael Blake, Stephen Hooper, Rosemary Mason, David Miles** and **Richard Gibson** on this scheme.



We aim over a two-year period to provide these members with experience and training in Christian ministry before they undertake their theological studies at Moore College. During this period of time these members work on our staff: leading Bible study groups, conferences, ministry training courses; being involved in the organising and running of our services and meetings; as well as being engaged in personal ministry around the colleges, the campus and the church.



Teaching the Bible on a Secular Campus

Since 1975 Phillip Jensen has been conducting lunch time Bible studies on the campus of New South Wales University. Commencing with fourteen people studying the first epistle of Peter, the campus Bible studies have grown to well over 300 students coming weekly.

The studies basically work through a chapter of the Bible each week. The same study is repeated on four different lunchtimes. On Tuesday, Thursday and Friday the Matthews 'C' or 'D' lecture theatre is used, while the Murphy lecture theatre in the Chemistry building is used on Wednesdays to reach people on the lower campus. Outlines of the studies are provided each week and each study is tape-recorded.

Over the years a tape library has developed and a bookstall has been

established so that people can be encouraged to study the Scriptures.

Ministry Groups

In conjunction with the campus Bible studies, there have been established a series of ministry training groups.

Mid Year Conference

Each July, during the Mid Year Break, we conduct a Mid Year Conference for members of the lunchtime Bible study. The conference is a 5-day study programme. Many students have found this a challenging experience as they seek to grapple with the text of the Scriptures for themselves. The studies at the conference usually revolve around major concerns for people who are trying to find God's will for their career, their marriage, their ministry, their life. Last year some 190 students came away to Galston Gorge with us to study God's Word. This year we have booked the Stanwell Tops sites which will hold nearly 300. We are hopeful that Dick Lucas will be with us for some of the time for this year's Mid Year Conference.

The Import Industry

Each year we gain many new members in our congregation. You may be one of them. Often people from Christian backgrounds have moved into the city, and are looking for a new church. It is our aim and hope to be a friendly and welcoming congregation where people can easily find spiritual help and encouragement in their walk with God. In a congregation our size it is not always easy for us to meet the needs of newcomers quickly. However, if you care to leave your name and address on one of our newcomer's cards, we would be glad to welcome you and help you find your way into our family.

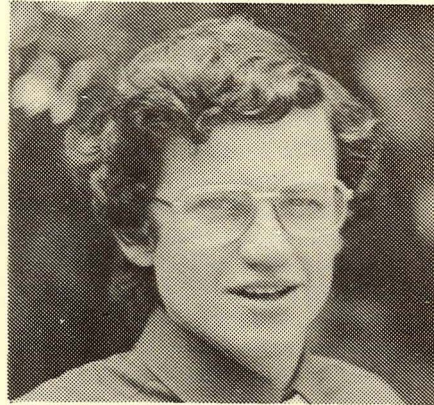
Many of our newcomers are not only newcomers to the church but also to the faith in Jesus Christ. They come from many and varied backgrounds with little and sometimes almost no knowledge of the Scriptures. We are particularly concerned to help people who are enquiring about the Christian faith or

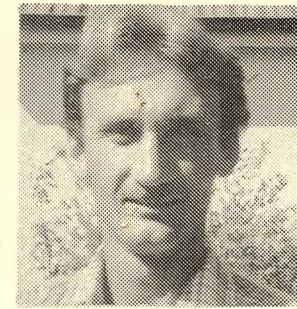
who have only recently become Christians. We offer to meet with people personally and privately, to answer their questions and to help them seek to serve the Lord Jesus.

Two other members of our congregation are commencing work with us in this coming year; **David Miles** will be working part-time for the first half of the year, and full-time in the second half; **James Davidson** has offered his services to us to work in our short-term ministry scheme without cost to us.

Dealing with a large congregation of students and young graduates, means that we have a church which is constantly losing its members.

Peter will be working as a catechist at St. Martin's Georges Hall. Barbara intends to undertake the one year Bible and Missionary Course in Moore College. Three other members of our congregation are planning on doing the one year Bible and Missionary Course. They are **Howard Spencer**, **Louise Howard** and **Jenni Payne**.

We must continue to pray for these members of our congregation as they further equip themselves for the ministry of God's Word. It is important that they rightly understand God's Word and that God would guide them into the fields of service that He has prepared for them.

A Minor Incident Leads to a Major Change

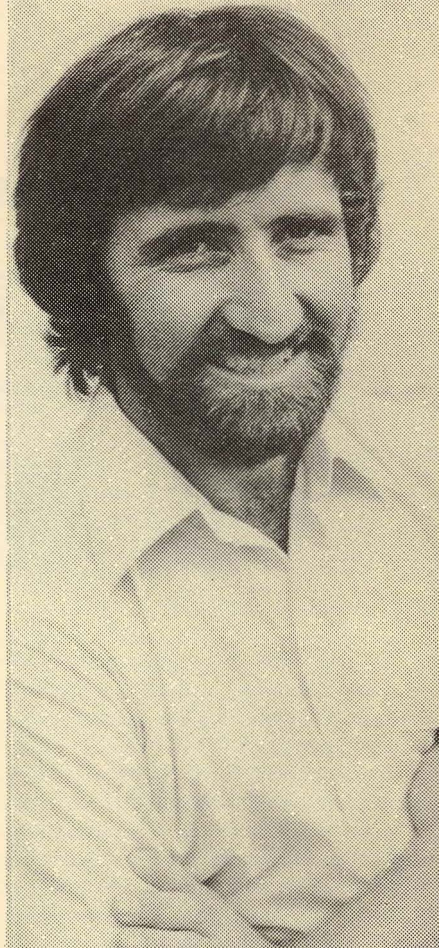
Before coming to university my church attendance was regular; once every Sunday.

While in sixth form, I remember visiting a family with a friend of mine. They were having tea, and started talking to us about Jesus, and invited my friend and I to face up to Jesus, and commit our lives to him. My friend left; I said "yes", but was unwilling to submit to Jesus then. I knew what they said was true and realised that I didn't know Jesus at all, despite my years of church attendance.

Arriving in the big smoke one of my first steps was to stop attending Mass regularly. Still knowing I wasn't right with God, I'd occasionally stop swearing and getting drunk, and head off to church. It didn't work and I knew it.

Eventually I met a christian family who gave me a Bible and some books, which I started to read. They also fed me now and then, and turning up one Sunday night (about tea time) I found myself giving their daughter a lift to church.

Walking into the building, I was struck by the eager faces; people were actually interested in what the Bible had to say. The next week I went again and that night committed by life to God, to trust Jesus and live his way.



Since then I've learnt a lot about Jesus, and how God has worked in history, and how he makes sinful people his friends through faith in his Son.

Since then church hasn't just been the hour and a half each Sunday. It's a whole new friendship with God and other people. Meeting with christian friends, apart from Sundays has been a part of my life (and not just at tea time!). It has been good to encourage fellow believers, and be encouraged by their lives.

Dick Lucas Visit 1982

In August 1982 we have the enormous privilege of having the Rev. Dick Lucas as guest speaker for an evangelistic mission on our campus and in our church. Dick has been the rector of St Helen's Bishopsgate London for more than 15 years.

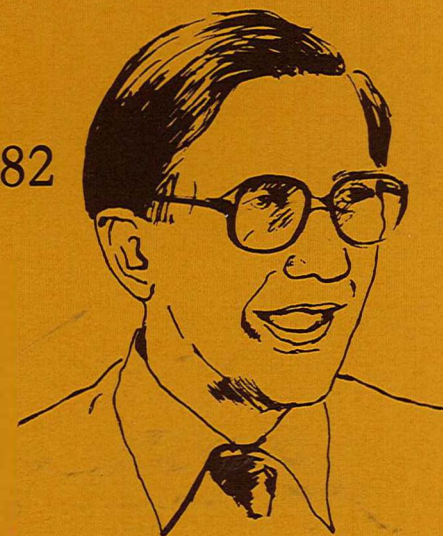
In 1975-6 one of our churchwardens, Robert Tong, was a parishioner at St Helen's, and he says this about the church and Dick Lucas's ministry:

"Dick Lucas is a very clear preacher, and is thoroughly Biblical. He uses illustrations carefully, and he is easy to follow and easy to listen to. He's much easier to follow than John Stott, for instance.

"One of the most interesting things about St Helen's and Dick Lucas's ministry is the mid-week service catering for businessmen. This is a lunchtime service, and began about 15 years ago. On Wednesdays at lunch-time, he gets about 500 to 600 people, mostly men. There is a short service, then a 15-minute sermon, then they eat lunch in the church and go back to work."

The church also has a strong ministry to students in the nearby teaching hospitals. Dick is a gifted preacher and evangelist whose previous visits to Australia have been greatly used by God for the benefit of Christian people. His commentary on Colossians, "Fullness and Freedom" will be used in Bible studies during the first half of this year.

Dick will speak at our August Houseparty (30 July - 1 August) at Stanwell Tops. We have booked all four sites in order to cater for more than 300



members.

We are planning to hold lunchtime meetings on Tuesday 3 August to Friday 6 August in Mathews 'A' lecture theatre at UNSW. We are also planning to hold evening meetings in the Clancy auditorium on the same nights. We will be holding evangelistic services in church on the evenings of 1 and 8 August and on the morning of 8 August. We hope that we will be able to use the first half of this year in prayerful preparation for this major evangelistic opportunity.

Budget News

It appears that God has blessed us again in that we have been able to meet our budget for 1981.

In 1982 our total budget is for \$147,800 of which we are hoping \$132,600 to come in the form of offertory in the plate. We intend to continue the policy of inviting visitors to ignore the offertory plates and by asking our members to remember to act responsibly. To meet our bills we need \$2,650 in the plate each week.
