THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

26th June, 1953.

Dear People of All Saints',

Will parents and guardians of those approaching Confirmation age please see that they have an opportunity of reading the letter addressed to them regarding the formation of Preparation Classes early next month? Will they also draw attention to the importance of Confirmation and help the young people to make a wise decision. From time to time I meet adults in this parish, who, for some reason or other, have never been confirmed. I would suggest that you seriously consider the matter and take the opportunity which is now offering. No one is "too old"! Possibly you feel somewhat diffident about attending a young people's preparation class. If so, I am ready and willing to arrange an adult class if the numbers warrant it. It is a pity to let this opportunity go, year by year, without doing something about it. I will do all I can to help anyone who is interested, and I will be glad if any adult will come and talk things over. Please "do it now," for it is unwise to defer so important a decision, one which can afford you so much real strength for daily living.


We are approaching the Fiftieth Anniversary—The Jubilee—of the Consecration of our Parish Church. This must be a special occasion in our Church life, and I first ask your co-operation in getting in touch with former parishioners to invite them to join with us in the Jubilee Services, which are being arranged for the Festival on August 16. His Excellency the Governor, Sir John Northcott, has graciously accepted my invitation to worship with us on that Sunday morning; and the Very Reverend E. A. Pitt, Dean of Sydney, has consented to preach in the evening. It is not so easy to preserve the "Back-to-All-Saints" character of this Festival, for many of the older people have passed on; yet there must be some who would welcome the opportunity of sharing in an Act of Dedication, Praise and Thanksgiving, with which all parishioners, past and present, will endeavour to mark the Jubilee Festival.

The Annual Parish Tea on Wednesday, August 19, will mark the social side of the Festival. We shall be glad to hear from parishioners willing to donate a table or a portion thereof, and from those who can assist by acting as hostesses at the Tea. Here again we want to make a special effort for the Jubilee Tea, and we ask the co-operation of all our people in making it a time of happy fellowship and reunion.

Normally, we would be returning our boxes on August 16, but as boxes are already in use for our Jubilee Fund, we are asking that you will use the envelopes provided this month and next for the Parish Hall debt. This appeal concerns us all and we expect not only individuals, but all organisations which use the Hall will respond to it. The Jubilee Boxes are for church renovation (primarily for a new roof) over and above our annual commitments; but the special envelope offerings are for the purpose of reducing our Parish Hall debt and meeting the interest thereon, for which we need £200.

I am sorry to have to write and talk so much about money this year: it just happens to be our Jubilee Year when we want to do something "special" to commemorate it; but I don't want to give money any higher "priority" than it should have! Thank you for your ready response to our appeals.

THE RECTOR'S LETTER TO THOSE APPROACHING CONFIRMATION AGE

Dear Girls and Boys,

Open your Prayer Book at the "Public Baptism of Infants": turn to the last page and read the last short paragraph. You will notice that Godparents are instructed to "take care that this child be brought to the Bishop to be confirmed by him. . . ." Confirmation is the second step in Baptism, and is closely connected with it. At your Baptism your Godparents made certain promises for you, because you were too young to promise anything for yourself. Now you are being asked to confirm your Baptismal promises, making them firm or strong by putting your own names to them. It is like signing a document which someone else, a lawyer perhaps, has drawn up beforehand. But there is another side to Confirmation; we not only confirm the Vows which somebody made for us years ago, but **we are confirmed**. We are given special strength by God's Holy Spirit because without His special strength we cannot possibly keep the Vows.

The promise you will make at your Confirmation is about how you are going to live. Perhaps you have not thought much about that so far; for as a child one takes life very much as it comes, and doesn't bother much as to what it's all about. But time is going by very rapidly and you are growing up, in mind as well as in body. You can't just drift along, without any idea where you're going, or even where you want to go. Sooner or later, you have to make up your mind about life; what you think life is for, and what you're going to do with it. And that's exactly what we do when we are preparing for Confirmation. We face up to such questions as these: (1) How much does religion matter? (2) Should God play a part in my life? (3) Are there any things I'd like to develop in myself; and are there any things already there that I'd like to get rid of? (4) What is my aim in life; to get all I can out of it, or to put something into it?

I really don't see how a girl or boy can go through life without answering questions like these. I know lots of people don't answer them in so many words—but they have to live somehow, and **the way they live is really the answer they give** to them, without thinking them out.

If you are 14 years of age, or if you will be 14 by the end of October, I invite you to join the preparation classes, which will commence on Tuesday, August 4, for boys, and on Thursday, August 6, for girls; both classes commencing at quarter past seven.

I hope your parents will advise you in this important matter; but remember, no one but **YOU** can make the decision about Confirmation. If you wish to be prepared for Confirmation will you please hand me before July 31, your full name and address, your age last birthday, and the date of your Baptism. If you join the classes, as I hope you will, it is most important that you should **attend regularly**.

Hoping to have the privilege of preparing you for the Sacred Rite of Confirmation, and with all good wishes,

Missions.—Most of us do something for the extension of Christ's Kingdom, particularly by our self-denial gifts during Lent. But this is just for six weeks out of fifty-two! What about the other forty-six weeks? The Missionary work of the Church goes on all the time, facing increasing costs, and the A.B.M. and C.M.S. need our help the whole year through. The Archbishop has drawn our attention to the "vast mass of unevangelised people in the islands and territories to the North of Australia, and of the competition from the forces of Communism for the controlling influence in their way of life." Through removals from the parish and through other causes we have lost some of the few **regular**, right-through-the-year contributors to Missions; the call comes to fill in the gaps. There are two ways in which you might help: (a) The Women's Guild Special Missionary Appeal for £100 for C.M.S. work in the Diocese of Borneo; (b) by becoming a **regular** helper through the Missionary Boxes, which are called in each quarter. Let the Rector know if you want an A.B.M. or a C.M.S. Box. Oh! yes!! We know we have a Jubilee Fund and that there are so many other appeals! But these parochial needs will NOT suffer because we give to Missions. Over a long experience, the writer has yet to meet **anyone** who neglected the needs of his (or her) parish, because he believes that Jesus meant what He said, when He commanded His followers to "Go into all the world and preach the Gospel!"

1952 Missionary Appeal.—The Rector has recently received the following letter of thanks from the Rev. L. Greensides, of the Mission House, Wailoku, Suva, to whom our special Mission Gifts were sent last year, to help rebuild the Mission Station after a devastating hurricane:—"Dear Brother, I want to write and thank you for the very generous gift, which the A.B.M. forwarded to me from you. The draft (£101/11/-) realised £89/17/4 in Fijian currency, and this is to be a "memorial" to Ethel Vivien Adams". I have sent an official receipt to Canon Warren, of the A.B.M. but I felt I must write and thank you personally. We are indeed grateful for this magnificent help, which to us means so much. I am sorry I have not been able to acknowledge the gift earlier than this, but I have just returned from a tour of the other island of Vanua Levu. This is our cool season and admirable weather for tramping around. With many grateful thanks and kind regards."
