RECTOR'S REPORT TO ANNUAL VESTRY MEETING

Firstly, a word of thanks to everyone who has helped forward the spread of the Gospel in 1984. Without prayer, and worship, and giving, nothing would be accomplished.

As Rector of the Parish I depend on these prayers. Those who come to hear the Gospel at services depend on our worship. The Parish Council and Church Wardens depend on gifts of time, money and experience to meet the cost of maintaining a living ministry here in Petersham.

It is gratifying to discover that financially we have ended 1984 with a surplus of \$991.81 in our General Fund. We thank the Lord of His goodness.

A look at offertories over the twelve months shows an increase of 8% over last year, but when we compare attendances at services we see again a drop of something like 11% over the previous year. This is a matter of great concern for the past three years the numbers attending services have been dropping at the rate of 10% per year.

Coupled with this fall in attendances is the fact that we are not holding those new folk who come to live in the area. Some are just passing through but others are buying houses and establishing their homes. It is a serious question: why are they not continuing to worship with us?

We must take a long hard look at our mode of worship, the structure of our services, our Sunday School, and the type of activities we have for younger families.

Who is going to support All Saints', Petersham in five, ten or twenty years time? The answer is, those who are now moving into the area and the teenagers in our Sunday School.

These people must be our priority. We will need funds to set up a youth activities and programmes for younger couples coming into the parish.

I believe we have at present a very real opportunity to do something along these lines. Two years planned effort by a part or full time worker spending time among such people could bring into the church younger people we need to ensure the continuation of All Saints' Church as a separate vital parish unit.

Use of the property given us by the late May Ruhle could well be used as the accommodation for such a worker and the re-direction of funds such as the present Bus Fund could help

finance such work. This appears to me as a way forward.

We must meet the challenge present at this stage of the parish's life. It would seem that with faith, vision and imagination All Saint's, Petersham could look forward to a very bright future.

The question is: have we the faith, vision and imagination

God has a plan for this parish; this plan will come to pass and we are challenged to be part of that future.

SUNDAY SCHOOL ANNUAL REPORT — 1984

In 1984 the Sunday School had 13 pupils on the roll and the Kindergarten 15 pupils.

During the year we said goodbye to three teachers Felicity and Ian McLure and Joan Stokes. Once again we were short of teachers in the Senior Sunday School and Kindergarten. As a result, all the High School pupils attended the morning service instead of Sunday School in the Second Term.

To highlight the problem in the Sunday School a letter was sent to the parents during the August/September holidays. In the letter the following points were made:

1. A need for teachers in the Kindergarten and Senior Sunday School.
2. Because of the lack of teachers the High School group would be remaining in the church instead of attending the Sunday School.
3. There would be only one class for the Primary School pupils in the Sunday School.
4. There are more children in the Kindergarten than can be coped with by the existing number of teachers.
5. Parents be asked to help with classes in the Kindergarten.
6. The Sunday School and Kindergarten will resume on 16th September, 1984.
7. Children welcome to all services.
8. At Family Services parents are asked to bring their children to church, and sit together as a family unit.

Twenty of these letters were sent.

At the beginning of the Third Term Mrs. Woolcott offered to teach in the Sunday School to enable the High School pupils to return to classes. Our thanks to Mrs. Woolcott for teaching this second class.
