***"Jesus our Living Hope"*** Recently, I attended a conference at which we were really challenged about the role of the church into the twenty-first century. We were reminded that in this era of post-modernity, people say that there are no absolute truths and that what is truth for each person *IS* truth. We were reminded that the world is struggling in its individualism and loneliness and that frustration and hopelessness are rife. Even so, there is a great spiritual hunger; but the search leads to spiritualists, psychics and astrologers, not to the place which is supposed to have the answer, the church! We are not seen as communities offering hope and reflecting wholeness and health.

People can look on us and see brokenness, internal strife and much "politic-ing" and can say, "I don't need the church, it's no different from the rest of society." I believe that the challenge has been thrown out. What ARE we about? What is it that will make the church attractive and appealing to the community at large? It seems to me that it is not the music or the style of worship or even the gifted preacher that will draw people to the Kingdom. Rather it will be that as we offer true community, as we heal our brokenness and as we respect and affirm our diversity and as we,

individually, more truly reflect the Christ of compassion, that people will understand that Jesus is, indeed, our Living Hope and in him is to be found LIFE. May we reflect that hope in our living and truly be ambassadors of reconciliation to a helpless and hopeless world. God bless you as you express YOUR hope in your local church and through A.C.W.

Extracts of a message from Mrs. Nancy Lin, Chairperson ICFLC written for 'FLC Moves and Touches', 2000

"With much anticipation and excitement we have finally stepped into the year 2000. Now, at the beginning of the new millennium, we need to ask ourselves, do we have real peace in our lives? We just need to turn on the television or to pick up a newspaper and we have our answer. As an individual participant of the Fellowship of the Least Coin, we may feel powerless. We may even wonder, 'Did my prayer for peace, justice and reconciliation make any difference in this world of commotion?' Individually, we are crying because we are being victimized by violence, economic inequality, social injustice, deep rooted traditions, and so on. Individually we can do only so little, but, when we are in solidarity and work more closely together, we will cry no more, I am often amazed by how strong and powerful, coupled with our prayers the least coins we offer can be. A Christian woman in a remote area may spend her entire life in the same village or community and never get a chance to see another place. But the least coin she offers after prayer is able to travel half way round the world to help someone in need, the this someone might even be regarded as

an enemy by her people. Through the movement of the FLC, we are able to connect prayer and action together. Through the family of the FLC, we are able to extend our strength to far-off lands. This is our way to implement our prayers for peace into reality. May we put our hope and strength into carrying on the work of the FLC in the name of our Living Lord Jesus Christ. God bless you."

## **'PILGRIMAGE TO THE HEART'**

At least nine and possibly a dozen Presidents, Archbishops and other church leaders will take part in the journey, which begins after a weekend of events in Canberra, on Sunday 4<sup>th</sup> June 2000. They will arrive in Yulara, near Uluru on Saturday, 10<sup>th</sup> June.

All the Heads of Churches at present are male, so the organising committee is aiming for two-thirds of the young people to be female. So far there have been only 4 young adults appointed and of that number, 3 of them are young women.

There will also be 2 indigenous people on the journey and they are hoping one will be a woman. Because the Heads of Churches come from many States of Australia, they will be nominating young people from many States, also.

As well as the official representatives, there will be a number of support people on the journey.

It is possible that the person who will lead the music for the trip will also be a woman. Mrs Jill Tabbart, former President of the Uniting Church has been chosen as the Medical Officer. Jill is a

practising doctor of medicine. Her contribution to the Pilgrimage will be enormous.

The thirty-fourth Annual General Meeting of the ACT Unit is scheduled for Friday 25<sup>th</sup> February when Annual Reports will be presented and Office Bearers for the year 2000 elected. Any ACW member visiting Canberra at this time is also most welcome to attend; the venue is the Canberra Baptist Church Centre, Currie Crescent, Kingston at 10 a.m.

Traditionally the ACT Unit of ACW is responsible for the organisation of annual World Day of Prayer services throughout Canberra, therefore plans are well in hand for the two services to be held on Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> March. ## SOUTH AUSTRALIA.

**New President:** Mrs Eva Cooper, representing the Catholic Community, was installed by Catholic Archbishop Leonard Faulkner as President of the South Australian Unit at the Annual General Meeting and Dedication of Officers in November 1999. Eva has had experience in leadership with Catholic Women's League, and a number of her supporters and friends were present at the Meeting. We look forward to two years of growth and togetherness under her leadership.

**Community Concern Morning Teas:** Uniquely a South Australian project, these take place over the winter period, and are intended as a combined outreach to a lesser known and supported organisation, not Church of Government supported. They provide an amount of approximately \$2000 for a special project, in turn allowing exposure to more groups, as speakers from the organisation are often invited to speak at Fellowship meetings. The recipient for 2000 is Operation Flinders, consisting of retired Policemen and Army personnel, who take young, troubled teenage offenders needing self-esteem and team spirit for some days into the country on a planned trek, to help them to be motivated. Recipient for 1999, Cystic Fibrosis Association of S.A. was presented with a cheque for \$2,700 at the A.G.M.

**February Unit Meeting:** Mrs. Claire Lunnay, qualified Clinical Psychologist and manager of SA Baptist Community Services Counselling Centres, was speaker at our first Unit meeting for this year. She encouraged her listeners by assuring us that not one of us is perfect, but God is more interested in our commitment and attitude than our 'doing'. She quoted the late Mother Theresa, who said "God does not call us to be successful, but to be faithful." By quoting St. Paul in Galatians 6:9 - "do not become weary in well-doing", Claire reminded us that we need a balance in our lives to be effective in our life and ministry, or we can suffer
