Church Unity.—We are reminded again, by the World Conference on Faith and Order, that eight days from January 18th to 25th are set apart as a Week of Special Prayer for Unity. The Re-union of Christendom is one of the most urgent problems of the Church, and it is well that we should know what has been done by the Faith and Order Movement. In the year 1910 a great Missionary Conference was held in Edinburgh, at which the vast majority of all Christian denominations were represented, and messages of sympathy were received from Roman Catholic leaders. Immediately after that historic gathering, Bishop Brent, the American Bishop of the Philippines (now of Western New York) attended the Triennial Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church of America, and asked why a World Conference should not be called to discuss how sections of Faith and Order which were

and other Churches.

At the Services in our Churches on Sunday, January 18th, reference will be made to this immensely important subject and at the week evening Services on Wednesday and Thursday, 28th and 29th, special intercessions will be offered that the day may be hastened when the prayer of the great Head of the Church may be answered "that they all may be one, that the world may know that thou hast sent me."

Australlian Board of Missions.—Amongst our special preachers during the Advent Season was the Rev. W. J. B. Scott, Commissioner of the A.B.M. Missionary Thank-Offering for Victory and Peace, whose striking sermon on behalf of the Missionary work of the Church, few who heard it will ever forget. Mr. Scott has since written asking that we shall keep the appeal in mind and make our own parochial effort on behalf of the "Victory Thank-Offering." The circular inset to this paper will bring the matter home to each of us, and will, we hope, bring a liberal response to its appeal. The Clergy and the Wardens of both our Churches will gladly receive donations, or they may be put in the Church plate.

C.E.M.S.—The next meeting will be held in All Saints' Vestry on Monday, January 12th, at 8 p.m., when Mr. P. B. Brady will read a paper on the "English Church Enabling Bill" recently passed by the House of Commons. It is hoped that there will be a good attendance of members.

Returned Soldiers.—The Clergy have paid many visits to the addresses given them by the Chaplain to returned soldiers but have found it extremely difficult to get into touch with the men whom they wish to welcome back to home and Church. Some are in the hospitals, some away on country visits, some have removed to other addresses and others have gone in pursuit of employment while in not a few cases it has been impossible to find anyone at home though repeated visits have been made. The Clergy will be only too glad if friends or comrades of the returned soldiers will tell them of these attempts to reach them and at the same time of the hearty welcome that awaits them if they will make themselves known.

All Saints' Day School.—The Annual Concert was held on Tuesday, December 9th, when the School Hall was crowded with an interested and appreciative audience to listen to the Cantata "Soot and the Fairies" prettily rendered by the Junior Pupils and to the excellent programme of elocutionary and musical items given by the senior scholars and friends.

The Presentation of Prizes took place in the School Hall on Friday Evening, December 19th and was preceded by the usual "breaking up" concert.

The gold medal given annually by A. E. Jaques Esq. for the first prize was awarded to Mina Dilthey. Other special prizes were given for special subjects by the Rector and Mrs. Goddard, Mrs. Horder, Miss A. R. Hogg, and others. Presentations expressive of appreciation and goodwill were made by the pupils to Miss Green, Miss Atkinson and Miss Rose.

At the close of the Evening the Rector caused great regret to the scholars and their parents by his announcement that Miss Green found herself unable, after her serious illness, to further continue to hold the position, which she had held for so many years, of Head-Mistress of All Saints' School. The Churchwardens and Clergy had hoped that after the summer vacation Miss Green would be able still to carry on the good work to which she had given the best of her life but she felt she would not be able to stand the strain of responsibility and therefore they all desired to wish her the enjoyment of well earned rest and leisure with renewed health and strength.

The School will re-open on Tuesday, January 27th, by which time it is hoped that an able successor may be found to take up and carry on the work of head mistress.
