THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory, 25th February, 1946.

Dear People of All Saints',

It may seem like boasting (but it isn't, for you know I am not given to bragging!) to say that I don't know of any other parish in the diocese whose people give so willingly and generously to the Annual Harvest Festival appeal. Once again we had a wonderfully generous response, which included a great number of gifts brought by the girls and boys of all departments of our Sunday School (Senior, Primary and Kindergarten) who offered them at the Children's Festival Service, and made a very substantial addition to the gifts already received. We are most grateful to **ALL** our parishioners and friends for their kindly co-operation in making our Harvest Festival a day of real thanksgiving, which it undoubtedly was. Especially do we thank Mrs. Morris, Mrs. Yarrington and Miss Adams for the very effective Harvest decorations; we always rely upon Mrs. Morris to secure the necessary "harvest touches", and she has never failed us yet; also we appreciate the good work of the choir throughout the day, and we thank Mr. A. J. Harris and Mr. Sopwith for the transport of our gifts to the Home of Peace, where they are so greatly appreciated, as you may see from the acting Matron's letter which appears elsewhere in this issue.

We were pleased to have the N.S.W. secretary of the A.B.M. (Revd. A. J. A. Fraser) with us as the occasional preacher at our Harvest Festival. We are reminded how great is our cause for thanksgiving here in Australia, and such a festival should be a reminder and an incentive to do all we can for our friends in Britain, who will need all the food we can send them for some time to come.

As you know, the season of Lent commences on Ash Wednesday, March 6th. Our Lenten offerings received through the special boxes and envelopes are always given to the two great missionary societies of the Church—the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society. Boxes and envelopes are now available both in Church and Sunday School, and the recent response to the appeal for New Guinea encourages me to hope that we shall increase our gifts this Lent for the Extension of Christ's Kingdom. The opportunities facing the Missionary Societies in this post-war period are tremendous, and they are a definite challenge to us all. If you have not yet received your Lenten box or envelope, please ask for one when you come to Church; if you cannot attend Church, ask your District Visitor to procure one for you.

I trust you will willingly respond to the invitation and accept the opportunities your Church provides for the proper observance of the solemn season of Lent.

I have been interested in the letters appearing in the daily press under the heading of "Empty Church Pews". One writer stresses the necessity for the Church to train youth leaders, and, whilst admitting that this is a vital necessity, I am wondering if such a method would be really effective in filling the empty pews. Personally, I feel we need more leadership in the home. The advocate for trained youth leaders would perhaps be surprised if he went through the rolls of the youth groups in any parish, and discovered how small is the percentage of the parents of our young people who attend Church. Even with the most highly trained leaders in the world you won't get very far unless there is some friendly ally in the home. Moreover, the responsibility for the full pew is yours as well as that of your rector. How many laymen ever use the opportunities for Evangelism daily afforded by their various professions, crafts and occupations? There is a story told of the famous C. H. Spurgeon:—

A young man came to him and asked to be given some church work to do. "What is your profession?" asked Spurgeon. "I am an engine-driver," said the man. "Is the stoker a Christian?" "No," replied the engine driver. "Very well, there is your church work."

I know it is much easier to talk about politics or sport than about religion, but still, there it is; and it is no use talking about empty pews unless you are prepared to do your part.

We welcome to All Saints' the students who will shortly be arriving at the A.B.M. Hostel to commence their training as missionary candidates, and we wish them every happiness in their preparation for the great vocation to which they have been called.

Harvest Festival Gifts.—The Rector has received the following letter of thanks and appreciation from the Acting-Matron of The Home of Peace :—

"Once again it was a pleasure to receive a good supply of gifts donated to our Home by your parishioners as a result of their Harvest Thanksgiving Service held last Sunday. I do want you to thank them on our behalf for their kindly remembrance of us in forwarding so many very welcome gifts. Such practical gifts as these have always proved a great help to us in maintaining this Hospital, especially in these days of higher prices. The fruit and vegetables are very welcome, while the groceries are most useful and help to keep our monthly budget down.

"Thank you also for the money, £1/10/- (one pound, ten shillings), which was handed in with the goods. As the money was made up by two gifts, £1 from the Staff of the Kindergarten, and 10/- from Mrs. Atkinson, two receipts have been issued accordingly.

"Once again I would ask you to thank your parishioners for remembering the Home and patients here, and sharing with us in their thanksgiving to Almighty God for His care and protection during the year that has passed."
