##### **TALITHA KUMI WELFARE CENTRE – PROJECT FOR WORLD COMMUNITY DAY.**

The Women of the Diocese of Raiwind envisaged a Centre for minority women who experience various forms of violence. These women are so vulnerable that they hardly know how to protect their dignity, and are often abused and raped by their own family members. They can be subjected to various forms of violence, such as abduction, sexual abuse, bonded slavery, domestic violence and police torture. Services to empower women and enable them to live with dignity and respect include Health, Economic Empowerment, Education facilities and Legal Aid.

The Talitha Kumi Welfare Centre was opened on 1<sup>st</sup> September 2000, at Modern Colony, Nasrat Road, Kot Lakhpat, Lahore. The

Mission Statement is "Women, Rise in Faith, Live with Dignity and lead into the 21<sup>st</sup> Century with Courage and Hope."

Pakistan is Australia's Prayer Partner until 2002, and Ms Shunila Ruth, Pakistan's national representative to ACWC, has expressed appreciation, in a recent email, of the 'bond of sisterhood with the Australian Church Women'.

Our prayerful offerings will be most meaningful in October.

#### **PROFILE OF MARGARET NAPIER**

**Born 4<sup>th</sup> November 1937**

**Died 5<sup>th</sup> July 2001**

Australian Church Women has been blessed by having had Margaret Napier as a member for so many years. Margaret represented ACW so well in so many roles – on the State scene she served as President, Vice President and Treasurer – on the National level she was Secretary when Western Australia last held National Office and on the International scene she represented ACW as a delegate on the Asian Women's Christian Conference. As Australia's representative she represented us at two ACWC

Conferences and at ACWC Executive meetings in various Asian countries, where she formed many enduring friendships with the delegates she met on those occasions.

Margaret was a very talented and artistic lady, particularly in cake icing and flower arranging. We remember the lovely fruit cake she made and decorated when Fellowship of the Least Coin celebrated its 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary and the beautifully executed FLC badge produced on the top of the cake.

Apart from the ACW involvement, Margaret was a dedicated member of her local Anglican Church in Como where she taught Sunday School, sang in the women's choir and arranged the floral decorations for weddings and other functions. The Mothers' Union was also an important part of Margaret's life. She joined Mothers' Union Australia in 1965 and took leadership roles from 1982-1987 and remained involved until her death.

For six years she also served on the South Perth Council. Margaret was also a great sports woman who loved her tennis and her golf and in those areas she also gave her time generously in helping in the administration of her clubs.

Above all, Margaret was a devoted wife to her husband, Doug, and a loving mother to her children, Robyn, Garry, and Colin and their families, and a wonderful grandmother to seven grandchildren.

Indeed of Margaret it can be said – "Well done good and faithful servant."
