THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

Dear People of All Saints,—

29th August, 1938.

Nine times out of ten the old saying, "Wet Friday Wet Sunday," comes true; and when it began to rain on the Friday before our Consecration Festival I was afraid we were "for it," as, indeed, the Sunday proved we were! It rained almost incessantly, and it is not easy to smile and be cheerful, when one has planned and worked for weeks for a certain special occasion, to watch one's congregation being relentlessly washed away! Right deep down we did feel grateful for the much-needed rain, but most of us, with a kind of human perversity, would have preferred to see it come any other time! Still, in spite of the very wet weather, we have much for which to be truly thankful. First, the gift of the bounteous rain itself; second, the number of people who did come to join in our services (and numbers of past parishioners came from far); and third, the amazing fact that even on such a day we received £102/2/9 Special Offertory. On the Sunday following, a further £34/17/8 was offered, making a total of £137/0/5 to date.

There are still 28 boxes outstanding and there must be some parishioners who have had no opportunity (because of illness and bad weather) of using the special envelope issued with last month's "Chronicle;" so we ought to attain the one-hundred-and-fifty mark before the appeal is finalised. Will those who have not yet returned their boxes, or used their envelopes please do so as soon as possible. The Churchwardens join with me in thanking all, who, by their enthusiastic co-operation, have made the above result possible. I am sure you will all agree after a second year's trial, that this is by far the best method of tackling the requirements of our Parish Hall debt.

We gratefully record our appreciation of the encouraging messages of Mr. Russell Roxburgh, who spoke to the men at the Communion Breakfast, and of Canon Howard Lea, who was the special preacher at Evensong. We thank also our Organist and Choirmembers who responded loyally and rendered the services well, in circumstances which affected the choir numerically, and thus threw greater responsibility upon those present.

The Festival Tea was once again a great success and a splendid time of fellowship and reunion. Our guests included His Grace The Archbishop, Revd. G. P. M. Ware, Revd., F. H. and Mrs. Meyer, Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Solomon, Alderman J. and Mrs. Johnson, and Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Willmott. Apologies were received from Revd. David and Mrs. Creighton and Revd. H. J. H. and Mrs. Lofts.

At the conclusion of the Tea, His Grace in a happy speech expressed his pleasure in being with us, and recalled his first visit to All Saints' in 1931, when, as Bishop of Western China, he came one week night to thank those who had helped the work in that great diocese. Since then he had visited All Saints' for Confirmations and other services, but this was the first time he had met the parishioners in a purely social way. His Grace congratulated those responsible for the organising of the Tea, and wished us "Good Luck in the name of the Lord."

At the music recital, preceding Evensong, Miss Isobel Brown and Mr. Don McMichael were associated with Mr. Kerrigan, and afterwards in the parish hall these two acceptable vocalists were heard in a short concert programme, assisted by Mr. Fred Cross, entertainer. The evening concluded with short speeches from The Mayor, Mr. T. A. Willmott, Mr. E. C. King, and Mr. Pattison. The Member for Petersham, Mr. Eric Solomon, who had another engagement to fulfil also spoke after the Tea.

Looking back over the 1938 Festival, I feel we have much cause for Thanksgiving to God.

During August weather conditions and an abnormal amount of sickness have taken toll of our congregations, but I trust you will do **your** part in building them up again. To-day we find ourselves in the midst of a desperate struggle against the forces of materialism, apathy and indifference. Thousands are saying, if not in so many words, they are saying by their deeds (and actions speak, we are told, louder than words) that the Church is played out, and that the Lord Jesus Christ has had His day. It is a time when every man who reverences Christ must take his place among His followers and stand firm in the Faith. We do a great wrong if we are weakening the Church's witness by standing aloof from its ranks.
