

## THE RECTOR'S LETTER

As from All Saints' Rectory,  
21st May, 1945.

Dear People of All Saints'

The matter uppermost in all minds during this month past, has been the cessation of hostilities in Europe, officially announced by England's Prime Minister at 11 p.m. on Tuesday, May 8th. The Service held at All Saints' the following evening was particularly well attended, and proved most inspiring. Although we realise there still remains much to be done, we felt the need for coming together to rejoice with the people of England and with all free peoples, that, under the guiding hand of God, we had been brought so far along the road to Victory.

In thinking of Victory we are not thinking merely in terms of dynasties and empires, or of political systems; we are wondering how ordinary men and women are going to live together in the years to come—whether our dreams of peace and security and freedom are to be fulfilled or to prove a mockery. Also, and most of all, our hearts are full of remembrance of our own loved ones, members of our families and of the circle of our friends, indeed, remembrance of ALL brave men who made "V-Day" possible, particularly those who will not return.


No doubt you have often thought of Victory and of what its reward will be. Many are looking forward to a rest—the freedom from constant anxiety, the release from endless tasks of watching and waiting. Personally, I can't see THAT sort of reward coming. It will be a world, broken, dispirited, famished and aimless. The reward of Victory will be new tasks, rebuilding, bringing back hope, removing suspicion, renewing trust, the priceless opportunity of showing to men and women everywhere that the labour and suffering are not in vain, that their sorrow may be and shall be turned into joy. For all people, and particularly for Christian people, all this involves some hard thinking, plain speaking, and courageous action in the days ahead.

Particularly should we remember that we are, ourselves, part of the ruin we plan to rebuild. The desolation of the world is the reflection of ourselves in the mirror of history; the reflection of our habits, our ignorance and our perversity. If we try to put ourselves OUTSIDE the problem, if we imagine that in our own strength we can rebuild our shattered world, we shall only perpetrate again the fateful error which rendered us so powerless during the twenty years prior to the present war. At home we have to face the moral evils which were undoubtedly there before the war, but which are now blatantly obvious and are increasing—excessive drinking, immorality, selfishness, lawlessness, and the neglect of spiritual things. There is so much re-building of character to be done in our own land, if we hope to make any worthy contribution to world peace. If we want to be "left alone," if we seek to avoid the stress of these times, if we do not feel called upon to seize its opportunities, if we do not feel challenged to go "flat out" in our efforts to be worthy of victory, we can never hope to have a new world in which the destiny of mankind is freedom, justice and

peace. When we grasp the magnitude of the task, present and future, we shall soon come to realise our insufficiency. We turn gratefully, then, to Him Who has promised that His Grace is sufficient for us.

We shall soon be thinking of preparation for Confirmation. Classes will be formed during the first week in August, and I would be glad to have the names and addresses, not later than the end of July, of those who wish to attend them. It is necessary for Confirmation candidates to supply the date of their Baptism. If you intend to present yourself for Confirmation, please obtain this information NOW; so that you may be able to supply the particulars of your Baptism at the first preparation class. If there are any adult parishioners who are diffident about attending a young people's preparation class, I shall be glad to form an adult class should the numbers warrant it.

**Women's Guild.**—The Parish Hall presented a gay sight on Thursday, May 24, Empire Day, when the Guild held its annual Women's Luncheon. It being May 24, we went all Empire-ish with our decorations. Mrs. Morris obtained a set of the Allied Nations' flags, which looked wonderful hanging from "ye old oaken beams," and Mrs. Reilly with Mrs. Sinclair did a wonderful job on the stage and at the tables with smaller flags and red, white and blue flowers. Our good friend, Mrs. Messer, went to the trouble of tinting some of the flowers, so that we could have the "blue" touch. We had an attendance of 150 women and ONE man. The ladies are to be congratulated on the splendid menu, of which everyone spoke in the highest terms. Mrs. E. Cranswick presided in her usual gracious manner, and Miss Herring gave a most challenging address, taking as her theme, the education of the native women in the Pacific. We are very grateful to her, as she was called upon almost at the last moment to be the guest speaker, as Miss Margaret Young, who was to have been the speaker, could not arrive from New Zealand in time, as to quote her words in a letter, she had been "off-planned" owing to "priority regulations." (At these luncheons we have, during the last two years, launched our appeal for £100 annually towards the R. & A. Fund for New Guinea. The response this year has been most gratifying—the first quarter of the third £100 being well in sight. It was a great time for such an appeal—EMPIRE DAY—and truly as an empire we want to help these peoples in the Pacific to rebuild all that they have lost, and then to ADVANCE. So do what you can, good people, won't you? The Fund closes at the end of November, and the monies received are presented at a special service on Advent Sunday, December 2). The musical programme was most enjoyable, Mrs. Thompson and Mrs. C. Heesh singing delightfully. Mrs. Day and Miss Sutherland kindly acted as accompanists. We were pleased to have Miss

Conolly, of the Central Council of the Women's Auxiliary of A.B.M. as one of our guests, and she proposed a vote of thanks to the singers. Telegrams bearing good wishes for the luncheon and the Appeal were received from the Rector, who is enjoying a well-earned holiday, and from Canon Bell, secretary of A.B.M. for the Province of N.S.W., and Miss King Kemp, assistant secretary. So ended another happy gathering.

**Y.C.I.**—Members of the Y.C.I. were distressed to learn that news was received from Tasmania on May 27th, of the sudden passing of Eric Francis Kinnings. Eric Kinnings, or "Bing" as he was affectionately called, joined the Y.C.I. in February, 1914. For years he was Editor of the Manuscript Journal and Press and Literature Superintendent. He served, too, as a visiting representative, and for years occupied the executive post of Hon. Treasurer. In 1929, he was unanimously elected Vice-President of the Institute, which post he held until his passing. Mr. Kinnings was transferred by his firm to Tasmania, and, although this curtailed his active membership, he still retained a keen interest in Y.C.I. matters, and on his visits to Sydney attended the meetings. The story of Eric Kinnings' membership of the Y.C.I. is not fully told in the relation of the offices he held. He was a leader in everything: its work and its fun, its high debating standard, its social activities and the affairs of the Church of which it is a part. His enthusiasm was unfettered, and his personality and brightness always charmed, and always made life better for those associated with him. Wherever Y.C.I. members meet, stories will be told of "Bing,"—of his generosity, of his love of cricket, and of his humour and zest and energy. Those stories will be told because of the goodwill and high respect in which he was held, and in acknowledgment of the part he played in the work of the Institute. Eric Kinnings will always live in the memory of those who had the privilege of knowing him.
