

MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

My Dear Friends,

I take this opportunity of expressing my sincere appreciation of the wonderful result of the 1970 Fete. Every stall showed an increase and the total is far above our expectations. The exact figure is not known to me as I write, but I am thrilled to think that each Fete during my period as Rector of All Saints' increased in total figures, and that the last one was the best of all.

If I remember correctly, the first one in 1956 was about £460, or \$920. This year, the figure was far in excess of that.

It is amazing how success can come when there is inspiration and co-operation amongst the workers. I desire to thank not only the stallholders and the Fete Committee but also all who contributed in any way.

You all know that I shall be leaving this Parish at the end of January and I will be inducted as Rector of St. Hilda's, Katoomba on Friday, 5th February. ALL RECORDS BROKEN

Results of our Greatest Fete

The thanks of the Church go out to all parishioners and friends of all Saints' who helped in any way to raise the record sum of \$4542 at our Fete on 21st November. This amount is \$717 higher than the previous record total, set only last year.

These continually increasing figures are without doubt due to the many devoted workers who toil, not only on the day of the Fete, but through the whole year, making goods and preparations for the great day.

The proceeds are required to enable the general Church funds to meet our regular operational and maintenance expenses. In times of rising expenditure, our normal income is no longer adequate to meet the demands upon the Church, and we must rely on the Fete to help us maintain the Anglican witness in Petersham.

From the total below, we have to deduct overhead expenses such as hire of merry-go-round, bands, performing dogs, tents, advertising and insurance, while a certain proportion must be sent, as in the case of all parish income, to the Diocesan authorities.

"Carols by Candlelight"



What has been called the "Church's Christmas Present to the Parish" will be offered on Sunday evening, 20th December at 7 p.m. This is, of course, the popular "Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols" or "Carols by Candlelight".

The candlelit church provides a most appropriate atmosphere for the singing of the popular old Carols, and the lessons will be read by parishioners representing the widest range of our organisations. You will enjoy taking part, so please join us. Candles will be available at the Church for a nominal sum.

Watchnight Service:

Give thanks for the benefits of the year past, and seek God's guidance and blessing for the year ahead at the special New Year's Eve Watchnight Service, Thursday, 31st December at 11.30 p.m. The Rector will deliver a short address and celebrate Holy Communion.

Memorials Dedicated:

On Sunday, 1st November, at the 8 a.m. Service, the Rector dedicated two wooden offertory plates in memory of Mr. Jack Edward Gorman and Mr. William Charles Whiting, Parish Councillors and staunch workers for All Saints', who had passed on in the last twelve months. The plates, which were used for the first time at the Centenary Service later that day, were donated by the members of the Indoor Bowls Club, of which Messrs. Whiting and Gorman had been successive Presidents.

History of the Parish: A new history of the Parish has been issued in conjunction with the centenary of our church building. Copies are available from the Rectory, or from Mr. E. Quelch, at \$1.00 each, which covers the cost of printing.

The history makes most interesting reading, covering the 110 years of Anglican worship in Petersham since the first service was held in 1860. There is also a full history of our memorials, including the 28 that have been placed in the Church during the past 10 years since the previous history was written.

Rector's Farewell Service:

The last Sunday Services to be conducted at All Saints' by our present Rector, the Rev. T. E. Champion will be on Sunday, 24th January, 1971. Mr. Champion will preach his farewell sermon at 7 p.m. Evensong, and it is hoped that a large congregation will be in attendance in appreciation of his 15 years' highly popular ministry in this Parish.

CENTENARY COMMEMORATION SERVICE

The special Commemoration Service to inaugurate the Centenary year was held at 3 p.m. on Sunday, 1st November, 1970, (All Saints' Day). The Church was filled to capacity for this important service.

His Excellency, Sir Roden Cutler, V.C., K.C.M.G., K.C.V.O., C.B.E., Kt. St. J., Governor of New South Wales, attended by Captain Martin and accompanied by Lady Cutler was received by the Rector and Mrs. Champion. Members of the Greeting Party presented to His Excellency and Lady Cutler were Mr. P. N. Ryan, M.L.A., Mr. D. B. Hunter, M.L.A., and Mrs. Ann Parcell, the Honourable Rae Else-Mitchell, Justice of the Supreme Court and President of the Royal Australian Historical Society, Mr. F. M. Daly, M.H.R. and Mrs. Daly, His Honour Judge Furnell, Alderman T. C. Foster, Mayor of Marrickville and Mrs. Foster, Mr. W. Sopwith (Church Warden) and Mrs. Sopwith, Mr. E. Quelch (Church Warden) and Mrs. Quelch, Mr. W. Williams (Church Warden) and Mrs. Williams.

After signing the Visitors' Book, His Excellency the Governor, Lady Cutler, and other members of the Vice-Regal party accompanied by Mrs. Champion were escorted by the Rector to their seats in the church. On taking their places, the National Anthem was played and the Rector returned to the Choir awaiting him at the main porch.

The Service then commenced with the Processional Hymn, "The Church's One Foundation". Then followed the Exhortation, General Confession, The Absolution and Lord's Prayer, the Versicles and Responses. The 23rd Psalm, to the tune Crimmond, was sung. The Lesson appointed for the occasion, "The First Epistle of Peter", Chapter 2, Verses 1-10, was read impressively by His Excellency the Governor, and was followed by the Magnificat.

During the singing of the first two verses of the hymn, "Praise my soul, the King of Heaven" the Rector, accompanied by the Church Wardens conducted His Excellency the Governor and the Right Reverend F. O. Hulme-Moir, Th.L., E.D., Assistant Bishop of Sydney, to the west end of the Church, where the Rector petitioned His Excellency to unveil the Commemorative Stone to mark the centenary of this spiritual edifice.

His Excellency then performed this act with the words, "Reverend Sir, it is now my pleasure to unveil this Commemorative Stone placed here to mark one hundred years of Christian worship in this Church".

Following the unveiling, the Commemorative Stone was dedicated by the Right Reverend F. O. Hulme-Moir, after which His Excellency and the Lord Bishop were conducted in procession to their respective seats.

The service proceeded with the Apostles' Creed and prayers for the Royal Family, following which the Anthem "And the Glory of the Lord" from the Messiah, was beautifully rendered by the Organist, Mr. Keith Allen and the Choir, which had been supplemented by some 30 former members of All Saints' Choir.

The sermon given by the Lord Bishop was followed by the Offertory Hymn, "For all the Saints".

During the singing of the Recessional Hymn, "O Happy Band of Pilgrims", His Excellency, the Governor, Lady Cutler, and the Vice-Regal party were escorted from the Church by the Rector, Mrs. Champion, and members of the Greeting Party.

The service was broadcast to those outside through the Carillon and was well received.

The Afternoon Tea in the Parish Hall following the Service was enjoyed by some 450 past and present parishioners and was the occasion of many happy reunions.

Although it is not possible to mention personally all those who helped to make this part of the day's celebrations such a success, the Rector, Mrs. Champion, and the members of the Centenary Steering Committee wish to thank the members of the Young Marrieds' Club for arranging such a delightful function and for helping to make this supplementary to our Church Service such a success.

To all the ladies and gentlemen of the other organisations who so graciously assisted them and acted as hosts to our guests, labouring so diligently throughout in various ways, we give our sincere thanks.

May we hope that this Commemoration Service and the other Services that will be held in All Saints' during the ensuing year will be the means of encouraging all Anglicans, especially our own parishioners, to dedicate themselves to the service of their Lord and Master, Jesus Christ.

May each of these Services be a stimulus to our determination to perpetuate the teachings of the Christian Faith for the benefit of this and future generations.

Fellowship:




