THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
29th January, 1945.

Dear People of All Saints',

Soon after this letter reaches you, Lent will commence, for Ash Wednesday falls on February 14. Lent is not a popular season; in fact, some people find it somewhat irksome, because it makes certain demands upon them. This season of Lent is a period of approximately six weeks, which the Church wisely sets apart as an opportunity and a challenge to face facts, to see things as they really are, and to commence with ourselves, our own individual lives.

As we approach Ash Wednesday, a study of Isaiah's fifty-eighth chapter will be helpful, particularly verses five to nine: "Is this the kind of fast that I have chosen, the day for a man to afflict his soul, to spread sack-cloth and ashes under him? Wilt thou call this a fast, a day acceptable to the Lord?

"Is not this the kind of fast that I have chosen? To loose the bonds of injustice, and to let the oppressed go free? To deal thy bread to the hungry and to bring the poor that are cast out to thy house? To hide not thy face from thine own flesh and blood.

"Then shall thy light break forth as the morning, and thy healing shall spring forth speedily. Then shalt thou call, and the Lord shall answer." The prophet in this lesson appointed for Ash Wednesday morning, makes a demand for a true sense of proportion in religion. He says to us that the essential test of religion, of religious observances, is that they should be the kind of practices which God thinks are worth performing.

It is in particular a warning against a peculiar danger which has always beset religion, not least the Christian religion. The danger is that of narrowing down the meaning of religion to the performance of purely religious observances, rites and ceremonies, and forgetting it also involves doing God's will in the ordinary affairs of daily life.

Lent is the season traditionally set aside by the Christian Church for the performance of one of these special religious practices, which we call fasting, or abstinence. To many people that means little or nothing. It perhaps brings to your mind rather unpleasant memories of enforced and meaningless privations in childhood—the giving up of some particular kind of food and, perhaps, certain amusements, which seems to you particularly futile; something that makes very little difference one way or the other, and you begin to think the whole idea is just a queer, "churchy" kind of fad. Notice, then, what Isaiah really says. He doesn't dismiss the idea of fasting, of discipline and self-denial, as something in which God is not interested. He reminds us of the **KIND** of discipline and self-denial which God prefers. He says, in effect, "Yes, you'll be a deal better for denying yourself some things: and the things you'd better deny yourself are some of your selfish, callous ways of thinking and living which are an offence against both God and man."

"To loose the bonds of injustice" . . . There is plenty of injustice and oppression to be dealt with in the world, some of which is, no doubt, beyond our power to remove, but some is not. "To deal thy bread to the hungry and to bring the poor that are cast out . . ." Are there, by any chance, among us any who could fulfil this demand, and who are still finding some excuse for not doing so? "To hide not thyself . . ." It is not just a matter of keeping ourselves to ourselves, it goes deeper than that; it includes that tendency which we all know, to shut out from our minds and imaginations the fact of the suffering that there is all around us in human life.

Perhaps these thoughts will help us to see the self-denial and discipline of Lent are not futile, useless things. Any form of self-denial which helps us to forget self and transfer our thoughts to other people and their needs, cannot fail to do a two-fold good.

I trust you will willingly respond to the invitation and accept the opportunities your Church provides for the proper observance of this solemn season.


As is our usual custom at All Saints', our Lenten self-denial offerings will be devoted to the extension of Christ's Kingdom through the two missionary societies of our Church—the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society. Lenten boxes and envelopes will be available on February 11th—the Sunday preceding Ash Wednesday.

On that Sunday we shall have special Harvest Thanksgiving Services, which I commend to your interest and support. It will not, of course, be easy to obtain suitable Harvest gifts this year; but we feel that we can, notwithstanding the scarcity, make an offering worthy of the occasion, if we may have the co-operation of ALL our people. Our gifts go, after the Festival, to the Home of Peace, which is doing a wonderful work in ministering to the sick and suffering.

All our parish organisations are now resuming for another year's work. We hope we may have all our old members again with us this year, and that many other parishioners will join them. Our Guilds, Clubs and Societies would heartily welcome new members, and we commend our Church organisations to all those who feel the need of fellowship in the service of Christ and His Church.

We are indeed glad to hear to-day of the safe arrival of The Duke and Duchess of Gloucester, and we join with thousands of Australians in wishing them a happy sojourn in our land. It is fitting that Australia should welcome them on the day which is being observed as Anniversary Day—a day which should remind us, once again, of the many, many blessings vouchsafed to us during the past.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL.

Ash Wednesday.—On the first day of Lent—February 14—there will be celebrations of Holy Communion at 7 a.m. and 10.30 a.m., and Evening Prayer at 7.45 p.m. We hope you will attend at least one of the Services arranged for Ash Wednesday.

Personal.—It is with regret we learn of the approaching retirement of Miss Herring, Warden of the A.B.M. Training Hostel. Miss Herring has rendered outstanding service to the Church in the training of candidates for work in various mission-fields, both during the earlier days of the Hostel in the parish of Epping, and later in this parish. In accepting her resignation from the end of the first term in 1945, the Board placed on record an appreciation of her long and faithful service, mentioning particularly her influence "being of the richest benefit to the Church and furthering considerably the missionary cause."

We shall miss the Warden from the fellowship of All Saints' Church, where she has made many friends who send her not only their best wishes, but also the assurance that they will continue to take an interest in, and endeavour to help the work which is so dear to her heart. Miss Herring's successor is to be Miss Margaret Young, of the New Zealand Board of

Missions, who has been for some years Principal of the Diocesan Girls' School in the Diocese of Dornakal. Many will wish to remember the retiring and incoming Wardens in their prayers, together with the important work of the A.B.M. Training Hostel.

New Guinea.—The Treasurer has received the following letter from the Assistant Secretary (for N.S.W.) of the Australian Board of Missions:

"Your letter of the 21st December went to Head Office, at 14 Spring Street, and was delayed in coming down to the N.S.W. Office at 375 George Street, so would ask you to excuse the delay in our reply.

The Sunday School.—The attendances in January have not been quite up to standard owing to the school holidays, but we hope to see the figures rise again this month.

We are very grateful to Miss Belfield for the gift of two collection plate mats to replace the old ones that had become quite shabby.

The next quarterly meeting of the staff will be held on Wednesday, the 7th February, at 8.30 p.m., in the Guild Room. A good attendance of teachers is desired.

We regret the loss, through removal from the Parish, of one of our keenest teachers, Miss P. L. Jones, who has received her appointment (many miles from Petersham) from the Education Department. We need two volunteers for our Teaching Staff—one to take Miss Jones' place in the Primary department, and another for the Senior School.—D. E. Muldoon, Hon. Secretary.

Women's Guild.—The first meeting of the Guild for 1945 will be held on Thursday, February 8, in the Guild Room, at 8 p.m. As a prelude to our Harvest Festival on Sunday, February 11, the meeting will be our annual Gift Evening for the Home of Peace, as all our gifts from the Festival are given to this cause. We know it is not easy to obtain gifts in kind these days, but we are sure all parishioners will do their utmost to make the gifts for the Home even better and greater than usual. There will be a special speaker at the meeting, which will conclude with social intercourse and supper. We hope to have a large attendance, and we ask YOU to accept this as a special invitation to yourself. In these days of service, this is one way in which ALL can serve. Gifts, such as non-perishable fruit and vegetables, and groceries (not sugar) will be most acceptable.

Children's Library Movement.—Yes, we have made a start. The shelves are all ready in the Guild Room, enough to accommodate many hundreds of books. Will all you good people who read this do your best about getting more books for us? The young people may have some they can spare out of their store. The books must be fairly modern and in good condition. This movement, for which the C.S.O.M. is responsible, is quite unsectarian, and applies to all children of Petersham. Your friends attending other churches in the community would, I am sure, help with books or magazines. The Guild Room is, of course, going to be totally inadequate for all our schemes, but it is a start. Our idea is to put up a plain building, of the bungalow type of several rooms, in our grounds. It will cost, at least, £1,000, which I am sure could be easily raised in Petersham. Don't gasp! What about ten people giving £100 each. I don't know whether you have £100 or 100 pence to give away, but if you have, GIVE IT. It will be a marvellous investment. Our Lord placed "a little child" in the midst. We expect increased membership when classes resume on **Monday** evening, February 12th.

Congratulations to our young people upon their successes in Intermediate, Leaving and University Examinations. Our good wishes go with them as they continue their studies at School or University or go out into the business world. The Rector is happy to supply the references which many young people require at this time; but he would like it understood that he cannot supply a reference or sign papers for anyone he does not know. It is obviously unfair to ask anyone to sign a document certifying your integrity, unless you are **personally known** to the writer of the certificate.

C.E.F.—Fellowship met for its last meeting in 1944, at a combined Social Evening arranged by Miss Muldoon and the Secretary. A very hearty welcome is extended to any young Communicants of our Church to join our Fellowship. Those who are not yet confirmed, but would care to join us, can become associates. If you are approaching Confirmation age, we suggest you contact the Secretary. A full programme, based on Fellowship "Four-Square" ideals, is offered to all young people, consisting of devotionals, discussions, hikes, picture and games nights, book reviews, etc. Present "Fellowshippers" should invite others who perhaps are holding back because they "haven't been asked to join!" We are reverting to our old original meeting nights, i.e., 2nd and 4th **Tuesday** in each month, and look forward to a good attendance on February 13.
