THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
26th February, 1940.

Dear People of All Saints',

Although Lent came early, and there was little time for preparation, our Harvest Festival Services were very successful, and we record our thanks to ALL who helped to make them so. Owing to the continued dry spell, flowers are scarce, but Mrs. Morris and her helpers, notwithstanding the difficulties, managed to decorate the Church beautifully for the Festival. An excellent Harvest Offering (including the gifts from the girls and boys of the Sunday School) was kindly taken to the Home of Peace by Mr. McFadyen, and has since been appreciatively acknowledged by the Matron, with grateful thanks for all your gifts. In the evening of the Festival we were fortunate in having Canon E. Howard Lee (always a welcome visitor to All Saints') as preacher, and we thank him for his helpful address.

"Time marches on," and by the time you read this letter we shall be more than half-way through the season of Lent. I want to pass on to you some arresting and challenging words of the Bishop of Armidale in a recent letter to his diocese, quoted in the "Church Standard" (16/2/1940). The Bishop writes:—

"We are fighting a righteous war. I see this written again and again, and for my part I believe it.

"But, and here comes in a doubt I cannot quell, are we capable of fighting a righteous war as a righteous people? That I gravely doubt. To apply the words of the Bishop of Bradford to ourselves: 'Australia has not forsaken God, but she does not look like a country who thinks it worth while to pay Him any public acknowledgment. A nation of whom the great majority never pay God the tribute of public worship is well on the road to forgetting Him altogether.'

"Frankly, my heart aches over my fellow countrymen. The only people who can bring good out of evil, a lasting peace out of a world war, are people filled with the Spirit of God. You cannot gather figs of thistles—though we are trying so to do in the manner of our living.

"... When you think of Jesus Christ spending the 40 days of which our Lenten season is the memorial, apart with God, that He might be God-possessed and save the world; when you see Him going to public worship every Sabbath day and up at sunrise every morning for prayer—well, you realise that our scanty prayer and irregular worship are a mockery, almost a blasphemy, and that any hope of our being a people inspired to save our world for peace is an empty hope.

"How did Australia spend last Sunday? How many Ministers of the Crown spent time giving themselves to God in the fellowship of worship? Where were our leading men of commerce and industry or on the land? Where were our youth in whom lies so much of the hope of the future? Did one-tenth of the community yield itself to God at all in thought and prayer?

"But still we say our cause is righteous, we must win the war. We may do so; we are rich enough in this world's goods to last until our foes are starving, but we are not Godlike enough to win a peace. And unless we can see this war end with a peace that has brought the nation into harmony, it were not worth fighting at all.

"What a challenge lies here to every one with the very faintest Christian loyalty! God needs your life as a way to a better world."

When you read these words, I hope you will turn back and read them through again, slowly; and when they have become so firmly fixed in your mind, so that you cannot forget them, I would suggest that you pass them on for your neighbours and friends to read, since they challenge us all. I would put them into every Australian home, particularly those where our God-given freedom is taken for granted, and where seldom, if ever, is there a thought for the Giver, or a desire to come together to publicly acknowledge Him in all our undertakings.

I would draw your attention to the services being arranged for Holy Week and Easter (set out on page 11), and particularly ask that you will keep Holy Week (which commences on Palm Sunday, March 17) free from social engagements, in order that you may spend at least a part of each day in meditation and worship. There will, of course, be no meetings of clubs and societies during Holy Week. Their members are invited to attend the services, particularly upon the evening of the regular club night. Our young people will, I am sure, understand that the proper observance of this sacred week concerns **them** equally with the more senior parishioners.


Because men use Good Friday—the most sacred day in the whole year—for purposes which we cannot do other than deplore, and against which we ought never cease to protest, it is necessary to remind people once again that the **ONLY REASON** why Good Friday is a holiday is because our Lord was crucified for us on that day. Your Church makes ample provision for all parishioners to spend this most sacred day quietly and thoughtfully in corporate acts of Penitence, and Thankfulness. Surely the times in which we live call us to greater thoughtfulness, and I ask you all most earnestly to make use of the opportunities provided throughout Holy Week, that we may prepare ourselves to enter into communion with our Risen Lord on Easter morning. There will be three celebrations on Easter Day—seven o'clock, a quarter past eight, and at the eleven o'clock service.

I do hope each one is doing his or her utmost for the extension of Christ's Kingdom by Lenten gifts to the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society, especially in view of the great need of increased support from Australia, to which prominence has been given through announcements in Church and in the February "Chronicle." Please return your box or envelope on Easter Day, together with your Easter offerings. If you expect to be absent from the parish for Easter, perhaps you could hand in your box before going away, or send it by some friend?

I am hoping that Mr. D. A. Ridley, of Moore College, will be ordained on Sunday, March 3rd, and will come here as my colleague after his Ordination. I am sure you will make him feel that in doing so he is coming amongst friends who will help him in his work in every possible way, but especially by their prayers.

Notwithstanding the anxieties of these days, we can still wish you all a holy, happy Easter, for Christ's Kingdom is the one reality, that is deeper than all the deep discord and evil of our time.

MATTERS MAINLY PAROCHIAL.

Music on Palm Sunday and Good Friday.—The occasional cantata *Olivet to Calvary* (Maunder) will be sung by the Choir on **Palm Sunday** at Evensong, when the special soloists will be **Mr. Paul Kain** (Tenor) and **Mr. Don McMichael** (Baritone).

On **Good Friday** evening at 8 p.m. *The Crucifixion* (Stainer) will be sung by an augmented choir, and the soloists will be **Mr. Raymond Beatty** (Bass) and **Mr. Lance Jeffree** (Tenor).

The solemn and beautiful music of these two well known meditations upon the sacred incidents of our Lord's life leading to the Sacrifice on Calvary, should not only attract many, but will carry into the hearts and minds of all the eternal appeal and arresting challenge of the events of the First Good Friday.

Congregational Hymn Practice.—The usual Congregational Hymn Practice will be held at 6.45 p.m. on Sunday, 10th March, when the following hymns for Evensong will be practised: 596, "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross" (Rockingham); 136, "Sing My Tongue the Glorious Battle" (Pange Lingua); 141, "O Sacred Head Sore Wounded" (Passion Chorale).

Women's Guild.—The main activities for the month were the meetings held on February 7 and February 22, both of which were very well attended. The former was a business meeting, and amongst other things it was decided that each member trade with 2/-, and the profits made to be paid in at the Annual Meeting, which is to be held on March 28. Parish Hall Fund.—At the last Parish Council Meeting it was unanimously decided to again use boxes in lieu of a fete for our Parish Hall Fund. Roper River Disaster.—The recent severe floods and cyclone in North Australia have destroyed the Roper River Mission Station. Miraculously the lives of all the staff and native population were saved. The launch "Holly" is a total wreck and beyond salvage, the members of the staff and crew clinging all night to a partly submerged tree, when the boat was swept to destruction from her moorings.

The Church Missionary Society has decided that the work must go on, and plans are in hand for re-building the Mission—in that approximate area, but on a new site. The total cost of rebuilding is estimated at £5,500, including the replacing of the boat.
