THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

28th July, 1950.

Dear People of All Saints',

The idea of service has always been closely associated with religion, and even now derives its inspiration directly or indirectly from the Church. Take away religion with its worthy conception of God and its high conception of man, and you take away the incentive to serve. If the history of service rendered to the community were to be written, you would find it was an essential part of the history of the Christian Church. The Church is here to serve the community, both directly through its regular services, and indirectly through the men and women it inspires.

In spite of the indifference of many people to churches, there is still a considerable body of people in this country familiar through their upbringing with at least something of the Christian tradition. People to-day are feeling the need of fellowship, and they can be more easily influenced through community than in any other way. There is something about an attractive community that grips. This month our thoughts are directed particularly towards the local community or fellowship—the Church—which we call All Saints', Petersham. Memory does "hold the door" as we look back through it and remember the vision and faith of those who built our Church, those whose lives of devotion have hallowed it, and whose gifts have enriched it. Therefore, we call you together to join in a united Act of Thanksgiving and Dedication on Sunday, August 20th, which is the Consecration Festival of our parish Church. Christian fellowship surely is life together on Christ's terms; love, not suspicion; humility, not pride; generosity of judgment, not fault-finding; readiness to serve, not letting other people do all the work—these are the marks of Christian fellowship, and, in stressing them, we shall further enrich our great heritage, and hand it on to those who shall follow us, even greater than we found it.

As time goes by, it becomes more difficult to preserve the "Back-to-All Saints'" character of our Festival. Many who loved to come back to their old parish church have passed on; yet we believe there are still some who would be glad of the opportunity to worship with us on that day. Three things you can do to help: first, remember the Festival Services in your daily prayers; second, send any former parishioners you know a copy of this paper, and draw their attention to the invitation on page six; third, invite all present parishioners to come, especially those who do not attend regularly and those who do not come at all.

We ask that each box-holder will bring his or her box and present it personally on August 20th; but if this is not possible, will you please send your box by some friend, or leave it at the Rectory **before** the Festival? An envelope for your special offering is inserted in this issue for the convenience of those who have no box. If we have the co-operation of **ALL** our people, we shall attain our objective of £200 for our Parish Hall Fund.

With your help, we shall maintain the high standard of our Parish Festival Tea on August 23rd. Donations from parishioners who may be willing to give a table or a portion thereof, and gifts in kind will be very welcome. Tickets (costing two shillings, admitting you to both the Tea and Social Reunion) are now available, and may be purchased from your District Visitor, from members of the Women's Guild, and from the Rectory. The **early** purchase of these tickets will be appreciated, for it is by ticket-sales that the organisers estimate the numbers for whom it will be necessary to make provision.


By the time you read this letter, Confirmation Classes will have commenced. Regularity in attendance is required of all candidates, who must be ready and willing to put their preparation before all other engagements. Confirmation will be administered on Sunday morning, October 29th, and the candidates will make their first Communion on Sunday, November 5th—our Patronal Festival.

Mr. W. J. Cooke has done me the honour of accepting my nomination as Rector's Warden and succeeds Mr. E. C. King, whose memory will be revered so long as there is an All Saints', Petersham. Mr. Cooke has grown up in this parish and has served efficiently in many ways, particularly in the Choir. He was People's Warden from October, 1940, to April, 1943, when his duties with the R.A.A.F. took him away from Sydney. In accepting the responsibility of his new office he has the good wishes and the full co-operation of his fellow-wardens, the Parish Council and his many friends at All Saints'.

I am grateful to the Rev. A. H. Venn for his ministry, to the Rectors of Enmore and Stanmore, and to those who so kindly undertook additional work and responsibility during my absence on holidays.

Gifts of white flowers (particularly arum lilies) for the Consecration Festival will be most welcome, and should be left at the Church no later than Saturday morning, August 19th.

Although one of Sydney's numerous blackouts descended upon us during the afternoon, it did not detract from our enjoyment of an acceptable afternoon tea, kindly provided by Miss Hayes and the members of her group. We also thank Miss O'Neill for presiding at the organ. On August 10 we meet at 8 p.m. to make final arrangements for the Parish Tea and to transact other business. The second meeting for August will be the Tea itself, when all hands will be required "on deck" in order to maintain the high standard which Guild members and their helpers have established in the organisation of this annual social event in our church life.—V. Big Brother Movement.—The Church of England Youth Department writes:—"Mr. Holley, of the Big Brother Movement, was in touch with the Church of England Youth Department and is anxious that we should provide Anglican Big Brothers for British young people coming to Australia under the Movement. Our immediate need is 16 men who will act as Big Brothers and Mr. Holley has asked me to contact you regarding the responsibility of a Big Brother. The Big Brother has no legal or financial responsibilities and really his main job is to make the young Britisher feel at home in this new country of his adoption. He would invite his ward to stay with him one week-end and then to take an interest in his welfare, but not necessarily to feel bound in any regard." Special Vestry Meeting.—A Special Vestry Meeting was held on Monday, July 31st. Lacking a nomination, no appointment could be made to the Parish Council in place of Mr. W. J. Cooke, who has accepted nomination as Rector's Warden. Mr. W. Sopwith, Jnr., was elected Synod Representative, and Mr. R. F. Atkinson, Parochial Nominator, in succession to our late Churchwarden, Mr. E. C. King, who held both offices.

The Envelope System.—Through continued wet weather this Church, like many others, suffered financially during the months of June and July. This prompts us to urge again the adoption of the Envelope System of giving. Each week the parishioner puts aside his gift for God's work, and the Church does not suffer financially through his absence. This simple method is a helpful reminder that we should "make up" our offerings when prevented by bad weather, or any other cause, from attending Church. The Envelope Secretary, Mr. A. J. Harris, will gladly supply you with the necessary envelopes, if you leave your name and address with him, or with any other Church officer.

United Nations' Appeal for Children.—The following is a portion of a letter received from the Chairman of the U.N. Appeal for Children:

"In the 1948 United Nations' Appeal for Children, the Churches in N.S.W. co-operated fully and by their giving helped to raise the outstanding sum of £150,000.

"At the moment, a second Appeal for the world's war-stricken, starving children is under way and we are confident that the Churches will want to do their utmost to assist.

"7,000,000 children must receive one meal daily—often their only food. 100,000,000 children are being tested and inoculated against T.B. Streptomycin is being supplied to children with Tubercular Meningitis. Penicillin to children with Yaws.

"Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these . . . ye have done it unto Me."

"Will you help the suffering children by bringing their needs before the members of your congregation and before the end of August?"

His Grace the Archbishop commends this appeal to all Church people. If you would care to help, please send your gift to the Rector or Churchwardens.
