## A WHITSUNDAY MESSAGE

"The truth shall set you free." John 8-32

Truth is something for which all sincere people seek. There seems to be deep in the heart of man a longing for something which he cannot always describe, something which will give him satisfaction and peace. It is a kind of hunger just as now and again we may get a sudden longing for some kind of food or drink. In the same way I observe that men and women have this longing for truth. They may have been brought up in any one of the recognised Church and Sunday Schools, they may have received the best of Christian teaching in their homes and yet they are like blind people groping for a hand-rail upon which to lean. The natural thing is for such people to seek truth in some other Church or place, other than where they have been brought up. I have known cases where the Anglican has sought it at the Methodist or Baptist Church, the Methodist has sought it at the Anglican Church or the Presbyterian has sought it at the Independent Mission. When they find the truth "away from home" the natural tendency is for them to imagine that at last they have found a Church or a place which has a higher revelation than the one where they have been brought up. In most cases such is not the case at all, but their earnest seeking has been rewarded by God and the light of truth has dawned upon their soul "away from home". Truth is like a diamond with many facets. We may be shown two or three of these, but somehow it is a different presentation we are seeking—a different facet that will bring peace to our soul. Truth is something independent of rite or ritual, providing we belong to a Church which holds the bible to be the inspired Word of God, and Jesus Christ as the only Saviour of men. Deep down in the natural man's nature is the feeling he has lost something—he was made for better things. In reality "the fall of man" is something he is conscious of, without being able to describe it. Now how can he regain that something he has lost? Where can he find it? That is his personal problem. He looks at the various Churches many of whom say they are the only ones with the truth. He drinks at their well and passes on unsatisfied. Like a butterfly he flits from flower to flower getting a little here, a little there, and then when his taste has been improved by his varied experiences and the contribution of each resting place, he suddenly finds a place which he imagines fulfills his soul's deepest desire. In each Church he met the same Jesus Christ, there was the same Holy Spirit, but the truth was presented in a different way. One finds his need met in one place, another finds his need met in another place, but what all fail to realise is, in reality it is not so much the place that matters, but just getting that glimpse of the Revealer of Truth that we are seeking, that brings satisfaction.

If the Anglican, the Methodist, the Presbyterian, the Congregationalist and the Baptist could only realise it is not a "thing" they seek but a "person", what a difference it would make. Jesus said "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life, and no man cometh unto the Father but by me."

This is the era of the Holy Spirit in which He works and pleads with wayward men to believe in Jesus Christ as the only Saviour of men. His work is to introduce us to Jesus Christ or reveal Him unto us that He may meet our deepest need. Truth is ever before us, but unfortunately we have not the power of vision to discern it. The Ministers of God's Word may point out the direction, but we must journey

on with courage and fortitude until we see before us the door of hope and enter in. Jesus Christ is truly the "Bread of Life" and the "Water of Life" and he who comes to Him with his need must find that He can meet that need no matter how great it may be. Jesus said "Seek and ye shall find, knock and it shall be opened unto you." We must do our own "seeking and knocking". No one else can do it for us. Jesus said "when the Comforter is come He will guide you into all truth." Again, remember it is the truth which sets us free.

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### VISITING PREACHERS

On Sunday evening of 29th April we were privileged to have as our preacher the Rev. Dr. Fox, of Melanesia. Dr. Fox, who is on his way to England to publish his history of the Diocese of Melanesia, is known as the veteran missionary of Melanesia. We greatly enjoyed his message and hope we have the privilege of having him again on his return.

On Sunday, 6th May, our special preacher was the Rev. B. L. Vaughan, who is to take charge of the new "Southern Cross" when it is finished in a few months time. Mr. Vaughan has had considerable experience with ships and will serve as captain and Padre of the new Melanesian Mission ship. Opportunity was taken by two of our Sunday School scholars to present Mr. Vaughan with £16 from the Sunday School Lenten offertories, towards the cost of the new ship. The balance of the Lenten Money will be given to C.M.S. funds. We are grateful to Mr. Vaughan for his very inspiring message on the text "And there was no more sea."

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### OBITUARY

Mr. George A. Durley, of 3 Miller Street, Petersham, father of Mrs. Millarey, passed away on the 18th April, 1956.

The late Mr. Durley left England and arrived in Sydney on 11th November, 1911. He had for many years frequently worked on board the Royal Yacht the "Victoria and Albert" and was known as "The Royal Apartment Joiner and Keeper of the Keys". When leaving England and the Portsmouth Dockyards, he was presented with a wallet which was made from a piece of leather from King Edwards couch, and lined with a piece of blue silk bearing the rose, thistle and shamrock, this silk was part of the draping of Queen Victoria's coffin.

Mrs. Durley, his widow, has also had a most interesting life, as she came out to Australia as a small child with her parents and lived on Garden Island. Her father, Mr. W. Foster, was the first man sent out by the British Navy to take charge of the Island and a nice brick home was built there for him. Mr. Foster was in charge of Garden Island for fifteen years and Mrs. Durley spent all her girlhood on the Island.

## ANNUAL VESTRY MEETING

This important meeting of parishioners was held in the Parist Hall on Wednesday evening, 9th May. The Rector, Rev. T. E. Champion, presided, there was a larger attendance than usual. A motion expressing the Parish's welcome to our new Rector as well as to his wife and family was enthusiastically carried, and Mr. Champion was assured of loyal support in his important duties. The Rector, in his remarks, spoke appreciatively of the friendly atmosphere of the Parish and paid tribute to the work of individuals and organisations which made All Saint's Petersham, a live force in the community. The Hon. Treasurer, Mr. W. Sopwith, Jnr., presented statements of Receipts and Expenditure covering the various accounts of the Parish, and representatives of the Choir, the Sunday School and Kindergarten as well as the various Parochial organisations reported on the activities of these bodies during the past twelve months. The election of office bearers was then proceeded with. The Rector announced his re-appointment of Mr. L. C. Calver as Rector's Warden, and Messrs W. Sopwith and E. Quelch were re-elected unopposed, People's Wardens. It was decided that the powers of a Church Committee be vested in the Parish Council of nine elected members and three appointees of the Rector.

Messrs T. H. Bosward, H. J. Shaw, K. Grant, E. B. Olofssen, J. Humphries, H. Y. Brodie, H. F. Jones, B. Pullen and D. B. Hunter, M.L.A. were elected by the meeting and Messrs J. N. Boyle, A. H. Thomas and J. Carroll were appointed by the Rector. An important decision was made by a unanimous vote, in reverting to the office of sidesmen, Messrs J. Ditchburn, B. Livingstone, R. F. Atkinson, A. Jones, G. R. Minter, V. C. Barrett and Colonel C. H. Granville were elected. Messrs S. L. Derrett and E. W. Brooks, who audited the statements presented to the meeting were thanked for their honorary services and were re-elected for the ensuing twelve months. Messrs L. C. Calver, T. H. Bosward, R. F. Atkinson, J. N. Boyle and D. B. Hunter, M.L.A. were re-elected Parochial Nominators. After discussing general business the meeting was closed but not before appreciation was expressed to Mr. J. Carroll who recorded the proceedings of the meeting, which were provisionally confirmed. The gathering then partook of supper in the happy atmosphere which was in evidence throughout the meeting.

## £20,000 NEEDED THIS MONTH

The Church Missionary Society of Australia needs more than £20,000 in order to balance its budget by June 30.

C.M.S. budgeted to spend £120,000 during the current financial year. Each year the Society seeks to discover the work it believes God has committed to it and proceeds to do that work, trusting God for the financial provision.

Thus, during this current year it has committed itself to work in 13 different countries, with 150 full-time missionaries in the field.

C.M.S. is essentially a family, a group of people committed to a specific job. It depends upon all its supporters to carry on the work. In the long run you—the supporter at home—are as important as the missionary in the field.

## NEW CATHEDRAL FOR BORNEO

The new Cathedral for the Diocese of Borneo will be opened at Kuching on June 9.

The new building will replace the old Cathedral which was damaged beyond full repair during the Japanese occupation. The Australian Church will be represented at the consecration service by the Archbishop of Brisbane. Australia is now playing a significant part in the missionary work in the Church in Borneo.

At Tawau, the C.M.S. Centre in North Borneo, a recent new innovation has been the introduction of services held in Malay. A number of Malay speaking people have been contacted and attendances at the services have been very encouraging.
