FELLOWSHIP OF LEAST COIN.

CHINA - AF OR THIRTY-FOUR YEARS ABSENCE.
(Cont. fr a February 'Newsette)

Deaconess Andrews continues: "We left by train for Hangzhou. There the guide told us we had to leave for Hong Kong a day early because the plane on which we were booked had been cancelled. This was very disappointing because it meant that I could not visit the town where I had served in China.

However, the guide arranged for us to visit one of my former students in Lin Hai, the Rev. Chen En-foh, now the pastor of Hangzhou church. After dinner we were driven to the pastor's apartment and had a joyous reunion. Pastor Chen had much to share of God's blessings in recent times. So far this year, 600 people have been baptized at the church and he also lectures at Hangzhou Theological Seminary where increasing numbers of young men and women are training.

It was good to hear too, about former students who had become pastors and of my former colleague and successor in charge of the parish of Shaoxing who was now Dean of the Nanjing Theological College. Today 185 students are preparing for Christian ministry there.

My earlier disappointment turned to joy when my guide was able to arrange a visit to my old town which has a population of 600,000. The countryside and the village had not changed. Farmers could be seen planting rice, cutting and stripping hemp and cutting sugar cane in what is now a very lush and fertile part of China.

We went to the Da Liang Church which had been used as a theatre up until 1983. As word got around, many old friends came to visit us. We were told that 90 people had been baptized at Easter time and that the church was packed out every Sunday with 600 worshippers.

The last time I preached in that Baptist Church was on Christmas Day 1950. As I finished a Communist cadre jumped up on the platform and said "Do not take any notice of what you have been hearing. You are being promised a pie in the sky when you die. We are going to give that pie now." The next generation will not know anything of Christianity because we will indoctrinate the children, he went on to say. How I thanked God that the prediction had been reversed and now the Church community is larger, stronger and much more enthusiastic than in 1950.

It seems that the tremor of God's spirit, evident at the founding of China, is still the power of man to halt.
