



OUR ORIGINAL WORLD WAR TWO MEMORIAL

COVER PICTURE

The etching on our cover shows the All Saints' Second World War Memorial as originally built. The Memorial was in this form from its dedication in 1949 until quite recently, when oak panels were added on all four sides in memory of Mr. T. H. Bosward.

These panels, and a memorial lamp in memory of Major E. N. Ayrton, will be dedicated at a special service on Sunday, 9th May at 11 a.m. A photograph of these extensions will be included in the next issue of "The Chronicle".

CONFIRMATION — 1965

At the present time, it does not appear that we will have sufficient candidates to be able to hold our own Confirmation Service at All Saints' this year. However, in order that a definite decision about this Service can be made, the Rector would be grateful if any prospective candidates would get in touch with him within the first two weeks of May. To be eligible for confirmation this year, candidates should be at least fourteen years old by October, 1965.

NEW TIME FOR EVENSONG

From the first Sunday in June, until the end of August, it is proposed to commence Evensong at 6.15 p.m.

This earlier starting time was adopted last year after a plebiscite of parishioners, and our experience was that the attendances were slightly better than if the time of 7.15 p.m. had been continued. More parishioners said they preferred 6.15 p.m. to the former time of 7.15 p.m. or earlier time such as 5.15 p.m.

Because of the results of last year, we shall be starting at the earlier time of 6.15 p.m. for the months of June, July and August, reverting to 7.15 p.m. in September. During these three months, the monthly Social Hours and Film screenings will not be held.

DEDICATION OF MEMORIALS

At 11 a.m. on Sunday, 9th May, the Rector will dedicate two additions to our Church's Memorial for the Second World War.

The additions will take the form of oak panelling around each side of the Stone of Remembrance area, erected in memory of the late Mr. Thomas H. Bosward, a lifelong parishioner of All Saints', together with a memorial lamp on the northern wall of the panelling in memory of the late Major E. N. Ayrton.

The cost of the memorial to Mr. Bosward was contributed by the members of his family, the parishioners of All Saints' Church, and members of the Petersham Returned Soldiers' League. The lamp is the gift of Mrs. Ayrton in memory of her son, who was killed during army service.

All parishioners are invited to attend this Service. The Corporate Communion of the Y.C.I. will be held in conjunction with this Service and not at 8 a.m. as has been the previous custom.

PARISH NEWS

● Watch the weekly Church notice sheets for the date of the Annual Easter Vestry Meeting, to be held during May. At this meeting, which all parishioners may attend, annual reports are presented by the Rector and all Parish Organisations, the Church's Annual Financial Statement is considered, and Wardens, Parish Councillors and other Church Officers are elected for the ensuing year. Parishioners over the age of 18 years may vote at these elections.

● By the time this "Chronicle" is published, the brickwork of the outside wall of the Columbarium will have been finished, leaving only the stone coping and an iron gate to be added before the area can be dedicated. The bricks have been laid by a small band of our men, working each Saturday over the last three months under the leadership of Mr. Arthur Cook and the Rector.

● Attention is invited to the special item elsewhere in this "Chronicle" about a possible Confirmation this year. We can hold such a Service only if we have a certain minimum number of candidates to present to the Bishop, and those who would like to be confirmed this year should see the Rector straight away, so that we may find out whether or not we can have a Service.

● Including private communions, just over 300 parishioners communicated at Easter this year. The number is slightly smaller than that of last year, but this is only to be expected, with the number of removals and deaths of regular parishioners. In addition, a considerable number of our adherents were away on holidays over the Easter period this year.

SOCIAL AFTERNOON THIS MONTH

All parishioners are invited to a Social Afternoon to be held in the Parish Hall on Wednesday, 19th May, in aid of Fete funds.

The programme will comprise social games and cards, and is being organised by Mrs. I Clark of John Street. Admission is 3/- and the Social begins at 1 p.m.

Card players are particularly invited to go along; bring your friends and make up a foursome. An entertaining time is assured.

BOOKS OF THE BIBLE THE PSALMS

Of all the books of the Bible few are more familiar than the Psalms. Since the time of their writing, men have found in the Psalms strength, reassurance and hope. Pre-eminently the Psalms are written records of men's experience of God, of their needs, troubles, tragedies, both personal and national, their prayers poured out before God, and their glad rejoicing in God's deliverance and his powerful help and intervention on their behalf.

The Psalms might well be described as a collection of Israel's religious poems or songs. In our Authorised Version they are described as the "Psalms of David" but other compositions from other writers have been added to the original collection of the Psalms of David who was traditionally "The sweet singer of Israel".

As we read the Psalms we are immediately aware of their intensely personal nature, we are reading of men's direct and personal relationship with God. But the Psalms are more than the mere "writings of men", they are part of the whole revelation of God and His message to all mankind in the Bible. Just as God used the letters of St. Paul written to a particular church for a particular need, so the Psalms, being the poetry and writings of men, are used also, as are the Epistles, as God's message to all men.

Many of the Psalms are part of the national history of Israel. Psalm 137 records the distress of Israel in exile in Babylon, Psalm 124 a record of victory in war, Psalm 79 tells of invasion and national disaster. Other Psalms were part of the temple ritual linked with national religious festivals, such as the songs sung by the pilgrims on their way up to Jerusalem for the Passover, e.g., Psalm 122.

Other Psalms are completely personal, speaking directly of religious experience and communion with God in a way that is relevant and meaningful to all generations. Psalm 139 speaks in vivid language of God's personal knowledge of us all, Psalm 73 tells of suffering and God's release from pain of mind as the Psalmist draws near to God in prayer. Psalm 104 proclaims in triumphant language the majesty and glory of God as displayed in His creations, Psalm 103 is a great song of thanksgiving. Read them over and see this for yourself.

The best testimony of the spiritual power of the Psalms is their use in the New Testament and especially by our Lord. For us, the way to gain most from the Psalms is to read them and let them become familiar to us. Some of them, at a first reading, may seem remote, but for every Psalm that fails to speak to us there are two that tell us afresh of the mercy and love of God and "that His loving kindness is better than life itself".


● Items for the June "Chronicle" will be due by Sunday, 23rd May, 1965.
