THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,

1st July, 1940.

Dear People of All Saints',

Writing for the July "Chronicle" reminds one that our Consecration Festival is just round the corner! It is time now to commence getting in touch with former parishioners to ask them to keep August 18 free, so that they may be able to observe that day as a "Back-to-All Saints" Sunday, to mark the 38th Anniversary of the Consecration of our Parish Church. We hope also to have the Annual Tea-meeting and Re-union of parishioners, past and present, on Wednesday, August 21st. This is just a preliminary notice of our plans for the Festival: full details will appear in the August "Chronicle."

Upon our Festival Sunday—August 18—the boxes being used in lieu of a fete, will be called in and presented. Box-holders are reminded that from the time they receive this letter there will remain but six weeks in which to fill up your boxes. For those who have no box, there will be issued a special envelope (in next month's "Chronicle") in which you will place your gifts. In view of the many calls made upon us at this time, we may not attain last year's total, but I am sure that if we have the loyal co-operation of all parishioners, we shall not come far short of it.

The time for commencing our preparation classes for Confirmation also draws near, and I again earnestly ask that the parents and friends of our young people will give them every possible encouragement in their approach to a decision which they themselves must make. Obviously, we cannot decide the question of Confirmation for them; but we can, by our interest in them and in their problems, help them considerably at this most important period in their lives. The concluding words of the Baptism Service still stand as a solemn charge to god-parents and parents: "Ye are to take care that this child be brought to the Bishop to be confirmed by him . . ." I shall be pleased to arrange a special class for adults, if numbers should warrant it. Will all those who wish to be confirmed please fill in the accompanying form and return to me not later than July 31st?

One would need a very much bigger parish paper than ours to be able to pass on to you all that one would wish, in these troublous times. But I would like you to read some words of Canon F. R. Barry, which appear

in the Religious Book Club's Bulletin of May, 1940. Writing under the heading of "The Real War and The Churches," the Canon says:—

"It is coming to be understood that the war in its military aspects is only part of something far bigger; that it is, indeed, but an incident in a vast moral and spiritual conflict between Good and Evil, Light and Darkness, which is being fought out in the souls of this generation. 'We wrestle not against flesh and blood . . . but against spiritual hosts of wickedness.' By these I do not mean Hitler and his armies! We dare not claim that everything evil is on one side of the Franco-German frontier and everything that is good on the other. Shall any man be just before God? For that reason I do not feel able to speak of this as a crusade or 'holy' war—words which seem to me frankly blasphemous. 'A War for Christianity' doesn't make sense. Yet if the Allied armies are defeated, then even the bare possibility of a Christian way of life would be ruled out in Western Europe for many generations. We must hold the fort. That is the immediate duty. But there can hardly be anyone who believes that the victory of the Allies in the field will, by itself alone, win the war in any sense in which it is worth winning. For there is, all the time, a war behind the war—a conflict of ultimate allegiances, a choice between 'life and good and death and evil.' That is how the Bible looks at history—as the arena of a moral conflict; and we are beginning to see how right it was. We can see now that Justice, Truth and Charity and the values of a liberal civilization are bound up with our Christian inheritance. We have seen that where Christianity is repudiated all that makes life worth living goes down with it. If we surrender to a pagan world-view, everything that we stand for must perish . . . Thus, if we, conscious as we are, that the world is being challenged by 'evil things' do not wish to be ourselves defeated by the very evils against which we contend, we must commit our ultimate allegiance. We must make our choice between Christ and anti-Christ . . .

"What has not yet been recognised in this country is that Christianity may die out not only through deliberate repression, **but also, and far more probably, through neglect.** The cause of Christ may be lost in the schools. And it is no imaginary danger. An enormous percentage of our population is trained up to-day in real ignorance of the simplest elements of Christianity and without the smallest interest in its claims. In heart we are still a Christian people; but our minds are being rapidly paganised; and even our respect for the great Christian values of Justice, Truth, Freedom and Charity is not likely to last another twenty years if the intellectual basis is destroyed. Religious neutrality in education has become a dangerous anachronism. As we can see elsewhere, freedom of worship in a pagan or secularised society means little, and will not last long. As Hitler knows, the schools are the key to sovereignty. If they are controlled by non-Christian influences, the Churches will very soon be museums. The question of religious education is life and death, for the Church and for the nation . . ."

Although these words were written before the tragic surrender of the Bordeaux Government, they remain very true, and as applicable to Australia as to England.

I would urge the acceptance of every opportunity for prayer, both private and corporate. This sustained contact with God is not just that the praying person might have a sense of protection and of spiritual well-being (though that is certainly one of prayer's effects), but rather that he, together with the whole society of praying people, the Church, may be channels through which the Divine life, and love and power may get through into the world.

It is well to remember that the real self is not this bodily presence. The body may be shot or burned or drowned, and yet the real self remains untouched. If we are overwhelmed by the happenings of these days, it is only because we ourselves have capitulated. We invite the enemy to come in whenever we stoop to any form of selfishness. The promise of Jesus Christ is not immunity from physical danger, but peace in the midst of tribulation. His peace He gives to us, and if we possess **that**, we may walk through the fire and not be burned. Fire deals differently with

different materials. It burns up the dross. It refines the gold. Let us pray that whatever is evil in ourselves, and in the Church and in the nation may be consumed, and that we may come through this terrible conflagration as pure gold.

I would again ask that information be sent me regarding those men from this parish who have enlisted in the A.I.F., the R.A.N., and the R.A.A.F., and any women who have joined the Nursing Staff for service abroad. Full name and home address, their rank and unit in which they serve, and, where possible, a small photograph, will be helpful in compiling a **Roll of Remembrance** which we propose keeping in All Saints' Church. We also desire these particulars for the purpose of remembering each one individually in our intercessions.

The Y.C.I.—Keeping in step with the times, a "Jackpots" Evening was held at the Y.C.I. meeting on June 7. The feature was carried out in typical radio style, but most of the questions dealt with the control and management of meetings. The evening was a success, not only because of the interest of the proceedings, but perhaps as much because of the interjections and comments of members by the members.

A Bucks' Night was held on June 21st, when a programme of games kept members warm until a hot supper was served. The games played were especially devised for their novelty and comedy, and included cricket with a crazy bat and a ping-pong ball, a mock Head of the River (Fours), a species of Surf Life-saving, and a corruption of Basket-ball.

Members are reminded that the Y.C.I. is entertaining the Girls' Club in the Club room on Monday evening, July 8, and that the annual social of the Institute will take place on Tuesday, July 23. With so many members away on Military duties, it is hoped that others will give their support to both functions.

The Y.C.I. and the War! All men's organisations are feeling the effect of the war upon their membership, and the Y.C.I. is no exception. Some of the members are away for militia training, others are permanently engaged in Home Defence units, and the following have enlisted for overseas service: B. H. Dick (R.A.N.), J. T. Hollands, F. L. Browne, Allan Dixon and Ron McCarty (A.I.F.). Wherever they go they take with them the goodwill of the Church and of their fellow members.

We were delighted to see our good friend, Mr. R. L. Calver, place the foundation stone of the Kindergarten Hall on June 1st. It was pleasing also to see so many interested friends present, and we hope to have an even larger gathering on the occasion of the Opening, which takes place on July 20th.

Our School contributed two items at a Concert arranged by the West Sydney Teachers' Conference, in aid of the Board of Education.

The Monthly Socials continue to be popular, and it is gratifying to note an increase in attendance. The next Social will be held on Saturday, July 20th, at 8 p.m. All welcome.

The Kindergarten.—As far back as October, 1936, Mr. R. L. Calver and Miss E. M. Belfield, by their generous gifts, gave us a substantial start in establishing a Kindergarten Building Fund. It was therefore a real joy to assemble on Saturday, June 1st, for the laying of the foundation stone of the new building. The Rector, assisted by Mr. Ridley, conducted the service. A scroll, containing a copy of the "Sydney Morning Herald" of June 1st, a copy of the Parish paper of November, 1936 (in which the original gifts were recorded), a current issue of the "Chronicle," and a copy of the Order of Service, was deposited in the cavity. The stone was then set by Mr. Calver, with the words:

"In the faith of Christ, and with prayer for the blessing of God, I lay this Foundation Stone of a Parish Kindergarten Hall, to the Glory of God, and in memory of Charlotte Annie Amelia Calver and Elizabeth Evans; in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost." Amen.

"Within these walls here to be raised, may the little children of this parish come to know and love God and His Son, Jesus Christ; and may truth, faith, and the fear of God, together with Christian love and sound learning, forever flourish and abound." Amen.

Miss E. Carolus, Kindergarten Leader, made a presentation to Mr. Calver on behalf of the Kindergarten Building Committee. Mr. Calver in responding spoke of the great pleasure the laying of this foundation stone afforded him, especially mentioning the long connection of his family with All Saints' Church and Sunday School.

After service, afternoon tea was served by the Kindergarten Leader and her staff, to whom we offer our thanks for the excellent arrangements.

The Offertory received was £16/11/5, and with a further £3/9/3 from the afternoon tea and sale of cake, made an additional £20 for the Building Fund. We record our thanks to Mr. L. E. Williams, Architect, for much helpful advice and preparation of plans; and to Mr. C. W. Sims, Builder, for his co-operation in the erection of a building within certain financial limits.

We now look forward, and invite our people to the Official Opening on **Saturday afternoon, July 20, at 3 o'clock**, when we feel they will agree that we have a Kindergarten second to none in the Diocese.

Women's Guild.—The annual Gift Evening in aid of Medical Missions was held on June 13. Owing to sickness and counter attractions, the attendance was not large, but we are thankful that the receipts are not less than formerly. We had hoped to have raised more this year, and could quite easily have done so if everyone had done his or her bit in helping on this tremendously important work of missions. Thanks to the "faithful few," we were able to send £10 again this year towards the Medical Gift Appeal. The programme during the evening was provided by the members of the

Y.P.U., who took their respective parts excellently, and the Misses Wheeler and Westbrook delighted everyone with their musical numbers. The Rally held on June 27 was well attended in spite of the inclement weather. It took the form of an Intercessory Service conducted by our curate, as the Rector was suffering from an attack of influenza. His absence was much regretted, but Mr. Ridley ably filled the gap. Afternoon tea provided by Mrs. Brady's group was, as usual, enjoyed by the ladies. The next meeting of the Guild will be held on July 11, and will be devoted entirely to business matters. A large attendance is requested, as there are several matters of importance to discuss. On July 25 the Rector is giving a Bible Study.
