Dear Friends,

Another matter of interest—more than interest—was our Church Fete this year. The financial result was excellent. It exceeded last year's result. The day itself was magnificent. After nearly ten days of heavy rain, to have such a beautiful day, was incredulous.

Knowing our Fete was on the next Saturday, I challenged the congregation to pray for fine weather. On that Sunday the church roof was leaking and that evening while the service was in progress a flash of lightning hit the flagpole on Petersham Town Hall. Only prayer would bring a fine day. Fine it was; God answers prayer.

We praise God for the wonderful day, for the way in which young and old worked together in harmony and also for the excellent financial result. God is good to those who depend upon Him; and thank you to all who helped.

At last Parish Council meeting we had a good discussion about the paper collection, or to be technical, our Recycling Program. As a parish we are very grateful to those who give us their unwanted newspapers. They bring around \$5,000 a year into Church funds. Of course, turning newspapers into money requires a lot of hard work by a few people—collecting, stacking, folding, bundling and then loading a truck. Help in this area is always appreciated.

Parish Council decided that on Sunday, 16th December, at 3 p.m. we will hold a special Christmas Carol Festival followed by afternoon tea as a way of saying thank you to all who help by making contributions of newspapers month by month.

I'm inviting you to come on that Sunday afternoon. The Carol Festival will begin at 3 p.m. and will be followed by afternoon tea in the Church Hall at 4 p.m. Keep the date free.

I must also remind you of the Christmas and New Year services at All Saints, Petersham.

Services on Christmas Day will be at 7.30 a.m. and 9.30 a.m., both will be services of Holy Communion.

On New Year's Eve there will be a celebration of Holy Communion at 11.30 p.m.—a Watchnight Service.

On behalf of my wife, Helen, and our sons Stephen and David, and of course myself, may I take this opportunity of wishing you, each one, a Happy and Holy Christmas.

To many people the joy of Christmas is over after the food is eaten and the gifts worn out, but the true and lasting joy is linked with the names given to the Babe of Bethlehem: JESUS which means Saviour; and EMMANUEL, which means God with us.

To know God is our Saviour and Friend is to receive a gift that never wears out, and is a joy that never passes away. The wonder of it all is that it is free to all, just for the asking. May you have a joyful Christmas.

### RECYCLING

Our recycling operation continues to be very healthy, financially. We have two sources of income—recycling aluminium cans and recycling newspaper, magazines and telephone books. Newspaper recycling produces by far a bigger income but it is also the biggest drain on our physical resources. We are fortunate in that our regular monthly service is supported by more than 200 householders, many of whom also collect from friends and neighbours. We have been greatly assisted by the

increasing quantity of paper which arrives laid nicely flat and square—thus reducing the work we have to do before tying it into bundles.

Collecting, bundling and tying is done on the second Saturday each month whilst we are still collecting from the various runs and is followed when necessary by bundling on Tuesday evenings. Anyone wishing to assist in the Saturday tie-up is invited to come along after 7 a.m. on the second Saturday in the knowledge that there is no restriction on time of start or finish. You may come and go when you wish. The little bit you may do could save the camel a broken back.
