THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

27th October, 1952.

Dear People of All Saints',

The beauty and simplicity of the Church's "Order of Confirmation" are always impressive, and this year they were no less so, when, on Sunday, October 26th, Bishop Pilcher laid his hands upon forty-two candidates—21 boys and 21 girls. The Bishop was particularly pleased with the service, and in praising the choir-master, soloist, and the choir for their devotional rendering of it, made special reference to the atmosphere created by the singing of Foster's appropriate anthem, "O for a Closer Walk with God." Dr. T. E. Page's beautiful Confirmation hymn, "Soldier, Go! Thy Vow is Spoken" (for which the music was written by Bishop Pilcher), was again sung. It certainly was a beautiful service to which the candidates themselves made their contribution by their attentive and reverent bearing. We thank the Bishop for his addresses, the text chosen this year being our Lord's words in Acts 1: 8, "Ye shall receive power . . . and ye shall be witnesses unto Me."


We commend these young people to you, hoping that you will remember them in your prayers and that, where possible, you will get to know them and help them in every way you can to be true to the promises and vows they made in their Confirmation. They go out into an indifferent and even hostile world, and they will need every help and encouragement their elders can give them. This Christian way of life to which we are all called is no easy thing—it is a constant struggle and a challenge to the best that is in us. The glory of the Christian Faith is that it not only sets before us the highest ideals, but also offers us the power to attain to them.

November promises to be a very busy month. We have the Children's Festival in the morning of the 9th, and the Evening Service will commemorate Remembrance Day. November 16th is the Masonic Service, and the 23rd, the Y.C.I. Commemoration.

As we approach November 1st, All Saints' Day brings the fond memory of at least one person who has commended himself or herself to one's knowledge and remembrance as being in reality a true saint of God. Doubtless, most of us have known more than one such person; some of us, perhaps more privileged than others, have known many, whom, in spite of all weaknesses, in spite of all failings, we should call true Christian Saints. They grew to be Saints because they did not wander aimlessly through life, but with unswerving and consistent purpose, they chose the one and only highway of obedience to God—the way of sacrifice and self-surrender.

It is a world-wide custom to observe the Eve of St. Andrew's Day as a day of continuous prayer for the missionary work of the Church. As Saint Andrew's Day falls on a Sunday this year, the Feast is transferred to Tuesday, December 2. I suggest, therefore, that we keep that day as our day of Intercession, commencing with a Celebration of Holy Communion at 7.30 a.m. and concluding with Evening Prayer at 5 o'clock. A roster will be prepared for you to place your name against the particular period you may be available, so that the continuity of prayer may be maintained throughout the day.

HOLY COMMUNION AND THE RECENTLY CONFIRMED

The twelve weeks' preparation are over, the Confirmation Service has come and gone, and you are starting out on a new life. Remember, Confirmation is not an end, it is a **beginning**.

In our Preparation Classes great stress was laid upon the importance of **REGULAR** attendance at Holy Communion. You may come to Communion as frequently as you wish. Wherever you may be, you should be present on the Great Festivals of the Church's year (Christmas, Easter, Ascension, Whitsunday and Trinity), also on Saints' Days, if possible. The choosing of one particular Sunday in each month, and regarding it as "Your Day," is to help you to become a regular Communicant and to remind you never to allow your attendance at Holy Communion to become less frequent than once a month.

Holy Communion is, of course, **THE** fellowship act of the Christian community, bringing together the individual members as one family, week by week. The other services, too, in a rather different way, aim at bringing us together in prayer and worship, reading and listening and thinking and planning together for the strengthening of our own lives and of the life of the family as a whole. Any club or society which never met would be a poor sort of community, much more so the Church—for the Church sets out to be a great deal more than an ordinary human society. Of course, it does need discipline and sacrifice, but if we aren't willing to give these we ought to ask ourselves what our membership is really worth.

The text the Bishop gave you—Acts, chapter one, verse eight—"Ye shall receive power . . . and ye shall be witnesses unto Me," should be marked in the space provided on your Confirmation Card. The words will remind you that you cannot hope to bear your witness to Jesus Christ without the Grace and Power of God.

Rectory Repair Fund.—Maintenance work in connection with our Parish buildings is a large item in our expenditure, and recently the Parish Council found it urgently necessary to have the Vestry roof renewed. It was a costly job and emphasises the necessity of meeting the debit for the Rectory repairs without drawing on our General Fund. The Rectory Repair Fund, which was launched with this objective in view, has met with a good response from parishioners, but as we have a good leeway to make up new contributors will be welcomed.—L.C.C.

B.F.B.S.—The Treasurer has received the following letter of thanks from the Rev. L. J. Harris, Assistant to the General Secretary of the N.S.W. Auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society:—

"Thank you very much for the donation of £5/3/9 which you have sent on behalf of the All Saints' Church, Petersham.

We appreciate very much your co-operation in our Bible Society Sunday.

A general survey clearly shows that there is a desperate need for Scriptures in every part of the world today. The destruction of Bibles in war, the shortage of paper for some years and the enormous growth of literacy are the chief reasons for this present position. Political and other changes are taking place so rapidly that doors which are open today may be closed tomorrow. We are doing our utmost to enter these open doors whilst there is yet time."

Children's Festival.—In addition to the Family Service on the first Sunday morning in each month, we ask the interest and support of the parents in the CHILDREN'S FESTIVAL, on Sunday, November 9, at 11 a.m., when the Chaplain for Youth, the Rev. A. D. Deane, will be the visiting preacher. Mr. Deane comes to us just prior to leaving Sydney to attend the World Conference of Christian Youth, to be held in Travancore, India, in December. We want every member of our Sunday School present at this Service (which is the Children's part in the Festival of All Saints) and we hope also that many parents will show their interest in a practical way by their attendance on November 9.

The Sunday School Picnic to Watson's Bay is being arranged for Saturday, November 22. Further details of this will be given later through the Sunday School.

We regret that we shall soon lose the services of Miss M. Rex, and we thank her for her faithful service with the senior girls. We are sorry to know that Miss M. Hunt is also discontinuing. This means we need, urgently, two teachers. Are there any who may feel called to this most important work in the service of God and His children?

District Visitors.—Miss Farley is kindly continuing her work until the end of the year. The Rector is grateful for this, as he himself has been doing two districts for the past two months, and, in view of his many other duties, he simply could not tackle a third! Looking over a crowded church on Confirmation Sunday, one wonders why it is so difficult to secure a few extra helpers for this and other important pieces of service urgently needing to be done in the parish.
