Reports are to hand from the World Community Day 2011.

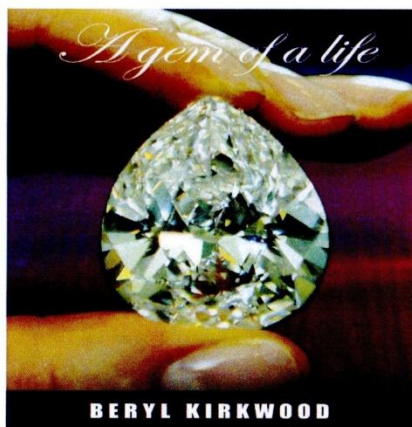
More than 20 groups [totalling 850 persons] met to explore the theme *Reflecting the Light of Christ*, as prepared by the State Unit in South Australia.

Excerpts from the Report by Edith Ridge

Representative to PPSEAWA for Australian Church Women NSW Inc.

.....There are always interesting meetings with good speakers.

We heard **Alan Byrnes**, husband of a PPSEAWA member, and a Salvation Army Minister for 35 years with a lot of experience.

Following his retirement he had the opportunity to become part of the Chaplaincy Team at Sydney International Airport—he is also honorary Chaplain to the Airport Police.

His 'working' day begins at 7am and he is at the Airport until 5pm, visits every counter on the land side and speaks to staff and passengers, then visits every departure gate.

On his way home he visits any who may be in hospital, as his ministry is not only at the airport but he follows up with families of staff etc. It is a ministry that he enjoys even though he never knows when he leaves home in the morning what the day will bring.

Also heard recently from **Meliana Siuhengalu**, wife of the Uniting Church Minister at Kingsgrove. Meliana spoke of the changes that have come to Tonga, her birthplace—now a very different country from the one she grew up in.

There is 98% literacy in Tonga as the people are passionate about education and the church (most of them are Methodists).

One change is that husbands don't have work in Tonga and often rely on aid from overseas, mainly from Australia and New Zealand. She delighted in showing the beautiful Tongan handcrafts from her own collection.

Presidents of Corporate Bodies were invited to the October meeting where the speaker was **Dr Grace Warren** who shared about her on-going work with lepers and the Leprosy Mission.

Dr Warren has perfected surgical techniques in reconstructive surgery on hands, feet and faces. These techniques she used in her work with leprosy patients and when lecturing paramedics and doctors on subjects related to the treatment of nerve damage brought about by leprosy or similar diseases such as diabetes or as the result of accidents.

Reconstructive surgery has achieved much to ensure the affected part is made whole but also to overcome the stigma that the disease brings. Segregation is gradually being phased out.

ASIAN CHURCH WOMEN'S CONFERENCE

Greetings and a Happy New Year to all our Readers. We start the New Year with new prayer partners within the ACWC fellowship. For the next four years Australia's prayer partners are Mongolia and East Timor. I encourage you to add these countries, particularly the women of these countries, to your prayer list and to prayerfully follow reports and news items concerning these countries.

One of my Christmas gifts this year was the purchase of some seeds on my behalf for a community in East Timor. Communities in mountainous areas in East Timor are often faced with landslides, land erosion and limited water resources. The roots of the fruit trees that grow from these *gifted* seeds help keep soil firmly in place, protecting villages from such hazards. The planting of trees also prevents valuable water resources from drying up. Plus, farmers can generate an income from their crops so that they can provide for their families.

One farmer writes: *I have planted two hectares with coffee trees which will produce coffee within three years which I plan to sell in order to pay for my children to go to university in the future.*

Here is a good prayer point to begin our prayer partnership with East Timor – that projects such as the gift of seeds will grow a prosperous future for the East Timorese.

THE HISTORY OF 'APRONS'

**Many of our Children and
Grandchildren might not know what
an APRON is**

The principal use of Grandma's apron was to protect the dress underneath, because she only had a few, it was easier to wash aprons than dresses and they used less material, but along with that, it served as a potholder for removing hot pans from the oven.

It was wonderful for drying children's tears, and on occasion was even used for cleaning out dirty ears...

From the chicken coop, the apron was used for carrying eggs, fussy chicks, and sometimes half-hatched eggs to be finished in the warming oven...

When company came, those aprons were ideal hiding places for shy kids.

And when the weather was cold grandma wrapped it around her arms. Those big old aprons wiped many a perspiring brow, bent over the hot wood stove...

Chips and kindling wood were brought into the kitchen in that apron. From the garden, it carried all sorts of vegetables. After the peas had been shelled, it carried out the hulls.

In the fall, the apron was used to bring in apples that had fallen from the trees.

When unexpected company drove up the road, it was surprising how much furniture that old apron could dust in a matter of seconds.

When dinner was ready, Grandma walked out onto the porch, waved her apron, and the menfolk knew it was time to come in from the fields to dinner.

It will be a long time before someone invents something that will replace that 'old-time apron' that served so many purposes
