THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
30th July, 1949.

Dear People of All Saints',

The foundation stone of our Parish Church was laid in May, 1870, and, being partly built, the Church was opened on All Saints' Day, 1871; but it was not until August 15th, 1903, that All Saints', Petersham, was consecrated. Year by year, we commemorate the consecration of our Church by holding special services on the third Sunday in August, and by making it a time of re-union of parishioners past and present, both on that Sunday and on the Wednesday following.

Once again, we seek the utmost co-operation of every parishioner in all that is being done to mark this anniversary on **Sunday, August 21**. We ask that you will endeavour to get in touch with all former parishioners you know to invite them to worship with us on our Festival Sunday, thus joining in a corporate act of thanksgiving and dedication and helping to maintain the "Back-to-All-Saints'" tradition which has been for so long associated with this day. For your convenience in inviting others, we suggest you send them a copy of this "Chronicle," drawing special attention to page 5. In addition to remembering the Festival Services in your daily prayer, you could assist considerably by inviting present parishioners, particularly those who do not attend regularly and those who do not come at all.

As the people of this parish gave generously to clear the debt from their Church and thus have it consecrated forty-six years ago, so we trust the present parishioners will be no less generous in their special offerings for our Parish Hall debt. If you have a box, please return it on August 21st; if not, please use the envelope provided in this issue for your special gifts. We have a wonderful heritage in our beautiful Parish Church and all it stands for; we owe much to the devotion and self-sacrifice of those who have gone before us; we have a big responsibility as fellow-workers with God in the building of His Kingdom in our own day; and as we must one day hand on the torch of our Church life to those who shall come after, it is our job to see that it is burning brightly and that they are well-equipped and ready to carry it. Every time you look at your Church, you may say to yourself: "So long as those doors remain open, there is hope for the world." Whether men listen or refuse to listen, so long as there is a redeemed community in their midst, where the Gospel of God's grace in Christ is proclaimed, and people's lives are changed, the door of opportunity is still open. Suppose there were no Churches in this city? What if there were no consecrated Christian personalities here and there throughout this community, keeping its life sweet and clean? Many who never come to Church would shrink from such a prospect. We know that a society with no Church, no Gospel, no Christian personalities, would be a society with no hope. Because men and women are going out from the Churches with even a little of the spirit of Christ, the door of opportunity remains open and there is still hope for the world.


We hope to have our Annual Festival Tea on Wednesday, August 24 (St. Bartholomew's Day), but it will all depend upon the duration of the strike, and the period restrictions may have to be imposed after its cessation. We could possibly obtain emergency lighting for the hall, but the preparation of food and the serving of tea to so many would be very difficult under present restrictions. However, tickets are available and may be purchased from your District Visitor, from Women's Guild members, and may also be had at the Rectory. The early purchase of tickets will be appreciated, for ticket sales give the organisers some indication of the number for whom it will be necessary to provide. Donations will be welcome from any who would like to give a table, or a portion thereof, and gifts in kind will also be very acceptable. If it should be necessary to postpone the Tea, the same tickets will be available for the deferred date.

By the time this letter is in your hands, Confirmation Classes will have

commenced. Regularity of attendance is required of all candidates, who should be willing to place their preparation before all other engagements. Special arrangements can be made for adults who desire to be prepared for Confirmation if there should be any who are diffident about attending a young people's class. If you are eligible for Confirmation, please do not defer it; take the opportunity which is offered you NOW. Confirmation will be administered on Sunday morning, October 30th, and the candidates will make their first Communion on Sunday, November 6th—our Patronal Festival.

Gifts of white flowers (particularly arum lilies) for the Consecration Festival will be most welcome, and should be left at the Church no later than Saturday morning, August 20th.
