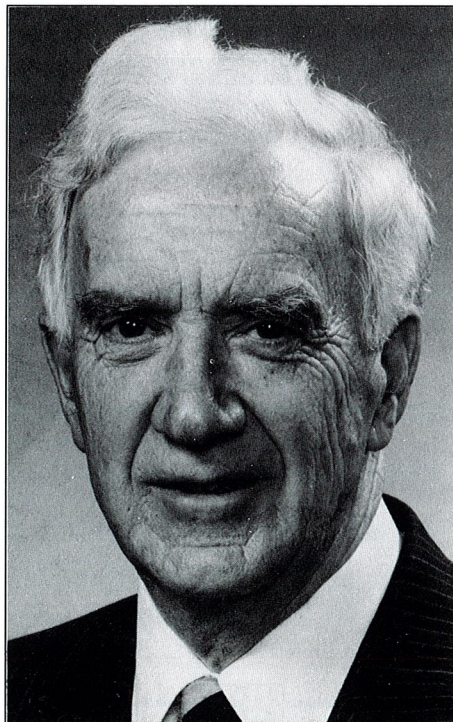

DAVID BROUGHTON KNOX 1916 - 1994

The whole College community mourns the passing on 15th January 1994 of Dr David Broughton Knox, aged 77 years, after a brief illness.

Known to family and friends as Broughton, Dr Knox was appointed to the staff of Moore College in March 1947 as a tutor and lecturer. His great interest was in Theology. After a 3 year leave of absence to obtain a doctorate from Oxford, he returned in 1954 as Vice-Principal. When Canon Loane became a bishop in 1958, Dr Knox was appointed Principal, a post which he held for a record period of 26 years (1959-1985).

Dr Knox supervised the affairs of the College during years of great change in Australian society, in the Church and in the College itself. He was committed to preparing ministers of



the gospel who were spiritually-minded and prayerful. He worked tirelessly to purchase property surrounding the College and it is his vision which has made it possible to maintain a residential college in Newtown. The current status of the Library as one of the finest theological collections in Australia is a tribute to his energy and foresight.

After he retired as Principal in February 1985, Dr Knox continued to lecture in Theology until the end of 1988.

The Moore College community will always remember Broughton Knox with deep affection and gratitude. He was a man who loved God, and he brought all the extraordinary gifts with which he was blessed to sharing the knowledge of God with others.

A Lasting Memorial

In recognition of the great contribution made to Moore by Broughton Knox, the College Council has decided that the new teaching centre should be named in his honour.

The new building is to be known as the

Broughton Knox Teaching Centre

and the large lecture theatre on the first floor as the

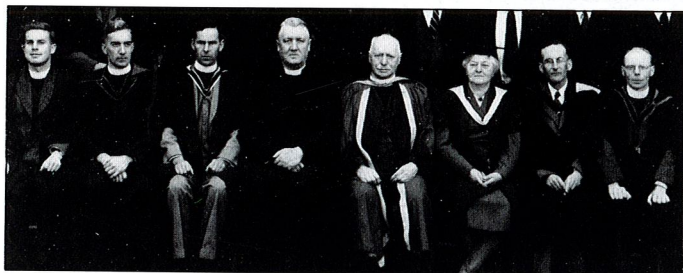
Broughton Knox Lecture Theatre

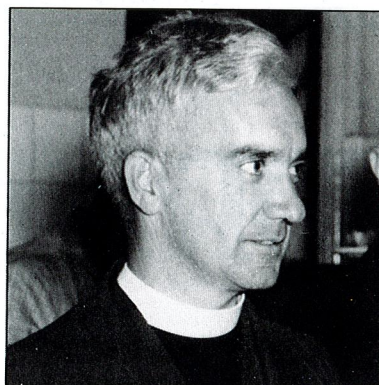

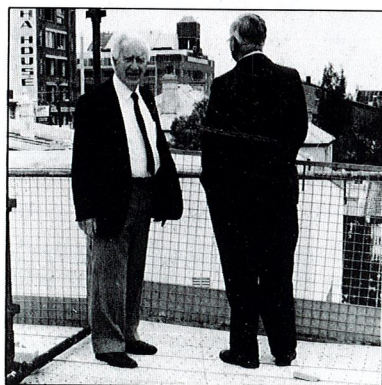

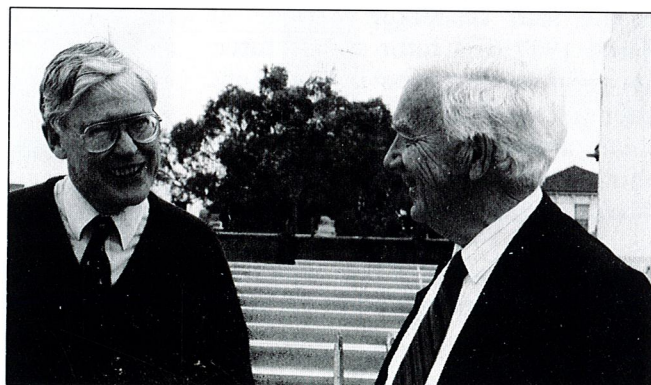

Fire Strikes Moore Graduate

Andrew Macaulay, Pastor of Como Presbyterian Church, with his wife, Kate, and 14 month old daughter, Ruth, made a dramatic escape on Saturday, 8th January, just minutes before fire engulfed their home and adjoining church. Such were the conditions, as fierce winds whipped up flames from the valley, that neither police nor fire-fighters were on hand.

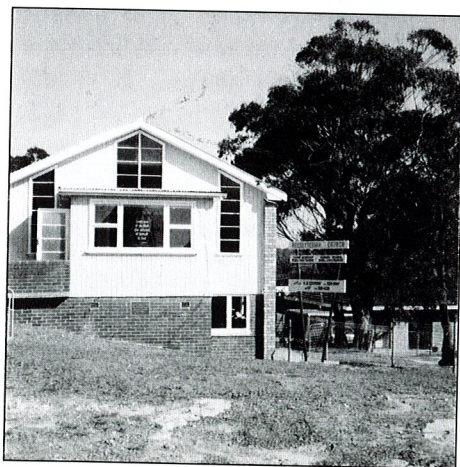
Minutes previously Andrew and a friend had been hosing down the roof, surrounded by smoke but with no fire in sight. They were just descending says Andrew, "when the flames were suddenly there!" He describes yelling to Kate (then 3 months pregnant), "Grab Ruth and run!" and, with family in the car, backing out of their drive and up the street as flames lept over them and spot fires broke out all around.

The Macaulays' church and house were among 87 buildings in the Como/Jannali area destroyed that day and many more homes were damaged and uninhabitable. Of the Como Presbyterian membership, 50% lost their homes and at least 9 families from Anglican churches in the area are also known to have lost homes.

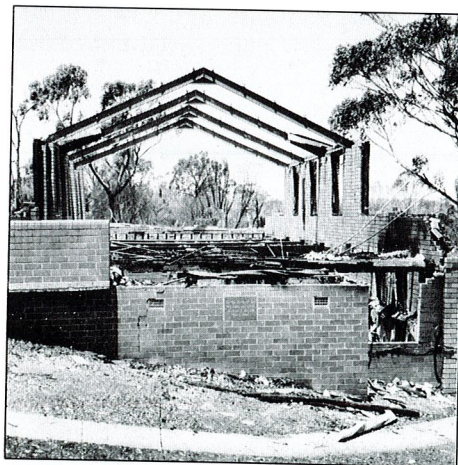
The use of St Anne's Anglican Church at Como has graciously been offered to the Macaulays' congregation for services until a new church is built.

Andrew says, "The priority is healing the hurt. The hardest thing is that I feel the tension between the need to rebuild our own lives emotionally and spiritually and the need to minister to others who are experiencing the same problems".

Andrew graduated from Moore in 1992. The whole College community extends love and sympathy to them and to all families who lost homes or suffered damage in the fires.

Consumed by Passion

What was distinctive about Paul's missionary activity and what did Paul have in common with other Christians? Why is there so little in the Pauline letters about the need for Christians to evangelise? Did the apostle expect believers to be caught up in God's saving purposes as he was?

These are some of the questions Peter O'Brien, Vice Principal of Moore College, addresses in his latest book *Consumed by Passion*. It is a call to Christian men and women, who have come under Jesus' rule as Lord and experienced the saving power of the gospel, to be committed to its ongoing dynamic advance.

Moore Past Student Report

Senior Student at Moore in 1989, Stephen Gibson spent 2 years as Assistant Minister at St Clement's Mosman before taking leave of absence to accept a position in the USA. He has recently returned to be Rector of Narrabeen Parish. Of his experience overseas he says,

"In my 2 years as Associate Rector of St Andrew's Fort Worth, Texas, I was conscious of serving in a very different church culture: the Episcopal Church of USA.

The time away has certainly given me an even greater appreciation for Moore College. A training which is academically rigorous but always sits under biblical authority is almost unknown in Anglican seminaries (theological colleges) in North America. In fact it is unusual to meet someone in North American Anglican circles who has received a solid biblical grounding. As one rector I met put it, 'The average Baptist Sunday School teacher would know more about the Bible than most Episcopal clergy.' So even the remaining conservatives struggle as Anglican seminaries have become both too liberal, abandoning biblical authority, and too specialised, for example graduating ordination candidates who have never taken an Old Testament subject.

In all of this I am very thankful to God for my training at Moore and pray that the College will continue to be an instrument in God's hand for the extension of his Kingdom in Australia and beyond."

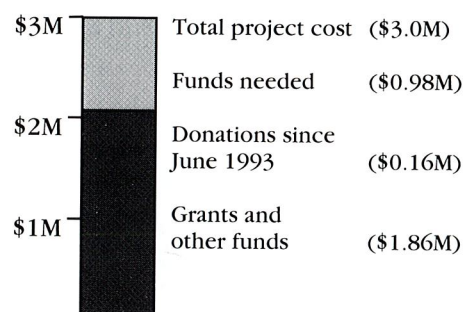
From the Development Office
