THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
Feast of SS. Philip and James, 1939.

Dear People of All Saints',

Although many of our people were away for the Easter holidays, and although we missed them from our fellowship, we have every reason to be most thankful for our Holy Week and Easter Services. We are grateful to ALL who contributed in any way to the success of the Festival Services. To my mind, one of the most encouraging things was the increased Lenten Offerings for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Through the Lenten Boxes and Envelopes, £17/16/8 came in for C.M.S., and £11/1/- for A.B.M.; this, together with the Children's Lenten Offering for the A.B.M., will make over £32 for Missions from All Saints' during Lent.

The story is told that one Easter Day an English Vicar had a thousand communicants. He was so pleased that he wrote to tell his Bishop. The Bishop replied, "Bravo! But will you tell me two things about that thousand? How many of them take a missionary magazine? How many of them have a missionary-box or subscribe to Foreign Missions?" The Vicar enquired, and could only discover twenty! He no longer felt proud of his thousand communicants. On Easter morning they came to rejoice that Jesus Christ is alive, but the great majority of them showed no interest in the task which He gave His Church to do.

The Lenten response prompts me to ask why not have a missionary box all the year round, and not merely for the forty days before Easter? You may not be able to put a great deal in it, but if every one in every parish put aside even a little each week, the results would surprise you.

So many good Church people seem to look upon the cause of Foreign Missions as a kind of "extra"—something tacked on to one's religious life. If, for example, one has an ear for music and is interested in music, one "goes in for it"; so, if one should happen to be interested in the missionary cause, one "goes in" for missions and supports their work. Whereas, the extension of Christ's Kingdom is part and parcel of our religion—we cannot claim to be true followers of Christ if we obey only some of His commands, and reject others.

Mrs. Pearl Buck, the novelist (you remember her book, and the picture, "The Good Earth") who knows China so thoroughly, says that whenever she is tempted to question the worthwhileness of foreign missions, she finds herself forced back on this question, "Am I willing to have the figure of Christ pass from this earth?" And because she is not so willing, because, as she writes: "In nations where the figure of Christ has been perceived, however dimly, I do find something I do not find elsewhere. To some degree the sick are cared for, the weak and defective are housed and cared for with tenderness, women are more honoured, people do struggle somewhat after goodness; somehow the poor are helped a little. It is all too little, too badly done, and there are many failures and much suffering, but—here is the point—it is better than where the figure of Christ has never been known. Somehow where Christ has been once truly seen at all, either by an individual or a people, there remains a spirit of some sort, a memory. The memory may be weakened, the spirit may fail. But there is a difference." Because of all this, she feels she dare not keep Him for herself alone, or even for her race.

At our Annual Vestry Meeting held on April 26, Messrs. W. P. Bannan and S. L. Rankin were unanimously re-elected People's Wardens, and Mr. E. C. King again kindly accepted nomination as Rector's Warden. The meeting elected to the Parish Council Messrs. J. M. Boyle, L. C. Calver, A. S. Cusiter, G. A. Guilfoyle, D. B. Hunter, H. F. Jones, W. Sopwith, Junr., C. E. Tanner and W. Webster. I subsequently nominated Messrs. W. F. Stephenson, J. Williams and W. J. Cooke as members of the Parish Council.

Mr. R. K. McWilliam and Mr. L. Derrett were elected honorary Auditors. With the exception of Mr. Les. Browne (who has removed from Croydon) we are able to welcome the former "team" into office, and I am pleased to add to it, Mr. W. J. Cooke, who has for years been a keen member of our Choir and Sunday School Staff.

This month brings us two important Church Festivals—**Ascension Day** on May 18, and **Whitsunday** on May 28. In place of the usual central gathering at St. Andrew's Cathedral, the Committee of the Church Missionary Society is asking all rectors to hold a local Temple Day for C.M.S. in their own parish church. This we hope to do at All Saints' on Ascension Day. Pamphlets setting out the reason for Temple Day will be distributed at church on the two Sundays previously, together with a special envelope for your gifts.

On Whitsunday evening there will again be an interchange of pulpits arranged by the Ministers' Fraternal. I am not yet able to announce the preacher at All Saints', but I am sure that parishioners will realise that there is but one way of welcoming a visiting preacher, that is by being present at the service to hear him!

We ask your co-operation in the Box Appeal which was inaugurated on Easter Day in lieu of a fete. It is not too late for you to do your part, if you will act promptly. From the time you receive this letter you will have most of May, the whole of June and July and almost three weeks in August, before the boxes are called in. There are one hundred and ten boxes already issued, and we are aiming this year at an issue of two hundred. Ask your District Visitor for a box, or apply for one at Church. We wish to make it clear that any donations you give to the District Visitor each month are for general Church funds; the Box Appeal is a special effort for our Parish Hall debt. We find it is far more effective than a fete, it entails less work, and it makes it possible for many more people than would ever come to a fete, to help to reduce the debt upon the Hall. The younger members of our congregation who use the Parish Hall quite a lot, should be interested in this appeal equally with their seniors.

I trust that whatever we have been able to achieve together during the financial year that is past will be an incentive to do even greater things this year, and will be an encouragement to go forward to meet the challenges of another financial year with increasing zeal, notwithstanding the uncertainty of the times in which we are living. The longer I live, the more am I convinced that nothing of lasting value can be achieved without sacrifice—sacrifice of time, energy and substance. Let us resolve to meet whatever lies ahead in gratitude for the privilege of being allowed to share in the Fellowship of Service in the Church of God, and in the spirit of Hope and Courage for the year ahead.

The Y.C.I.—The manuscript Journal still holds pride of place among the many features of the Y.C.I. Syllabus. The issue released early in April—the one hundred and tenth—was well up to the usual high standard, with all the regular authors represented, and also some new ones. The articles were a mixture of serious and comedy writings, and Institute affairs were dealt with as much as questions of the day in politics, society and economics. As the articles presented are preserved after each issue, the Institute has a wealth of comment on affairs over the past twenty-nine years in the back files of the Journal, and as this is added to each quarter, a unique and general history of the Institute, together with problems of many years, is contained in its pages.

Mr. Alec. Hunter was the Maestro, and Mr. Geoffrey Horton and Mr. Roy Atkinson provided the music at the Song Night held just after Easter. The first Dance and Card Evening of the year held on April 12 was a success both financially and socially. About ninety guests were entertained, and over three pounds was realised for the Parish Hall Fund.

It is not desired to disturb any moneys already being given for general Church Funds, but it seems possible that there are at least some who would be willing to give something to the Kindergarten Fund, and thus enable us to proceed with a work which will fittingly perpetuate the memory of two lovers of the children, and provide a very necessary adjunct for the training of the little ones, from whose numbers we build the Sunday School and, eventually, the Church of the future.
