## THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,

29th May, 1948.

Dear People of All Saints',

This part of the Christian year which commences with the long series of Sundays "after Trinity" deals not so much with Christian faith as with Christian life. The Bible, from beginning to end, insists that religion must find practical expression—"by their fruits ye shall know them." Those fruits are there for all the world to see in the shape of ordinary men and women facing life victoriously in the power of Christ. It is simply not true to say "Christianity makes no difference to one's life." Furthermore, have you ever thought how many of our modern humane and social provisions originally emerged, not from political action or humanitarian idealism, but from Christian faith expressed in Christian living?

Whatever goodness there is in the world, whatever improvement we have seen in outlook and practice, whatever reform, whatever progress has been made in social life and economic conditions, it can all be traced back to the influence and activity of certain individuals whose lives were channels of God's truth. In this connection, I commend to you two fairly recent biographies—(a) Florence Higham's "Life of Lord Shaftesbury," and (b) Janet Whitney's "Elizabeth Fry" (which is published cheaply in the "Guild Books" Series). In the former, we have the story of that great Victorian who changed for the better the lives of millions, and, as one reads of his unweary, herculean efforts on behalf of the children, the sick in mind, the exploited workers, one is reminded of what tremendous issues hung just on one life! What radiance and power emanated from one heart filled with God's love! "If one man," writes Florence Higham, "not brilliant nor over confident, could do so much, what could the world accomplish if it set itself the same rule of living?"

Elizabeth Fry badgered Parliament and her influential friends for drastic reforms in the prisons and penal code. She had Newgate Prison cleaned and whitewashed; she started a strong campaign against capital punishment; she intrigued bishops and cabinet ministers and the Royal Family. Even when her husband's business collapsed and she had to live very humbly, she carried on this vast labour of love. She made journeys to France, Belgium, Holland, Germany and Denmark to start the work there, despite what she called "the roughs of the journey" ("roughs" indeed! for a woman of 60, one hundred years ago!). She spoke at meetings, agitated for reforms, collected funds, organised, pleaded, wrote thousands of letters, interviewed everybody of power and importance, and meantime ceaselessly visited the prisons herself and radiated her own marvellous personality in direct loving contact with those in prison.

Incidentally, as a very chastening thought to those of us "who would rather like to do something for Christ and His Church if only we were not so busy"; Elizabeth Fry managed her home, entertained largely, brought up eleven children, started libraries for coastguardsmen; initiated an institute and a pension scheme, plus registry office, for domestic servants; organised the first visiting nurses for poor people; and established the home for nurses from which Florence Nightingale subsequently drew her Crimean nurses; and was withal a gay and unruffled person.

There is, you know, a fair amount of mock humility about in these days. When the rector asks Miss Snooks to take a class in Sunday School, she replies: "Oh, Rector! I'd love to, really; but I couldn't; I just haven't got the brains!!" You know how mortally offended she would be, if the rector had said: "Oh, Miss Snooks, I was going to ask you to take a Sunday School class, but I remembered, just in time, that you haven't got the brains of a


hen!" As a matter of fact, people who talk like Miss Snooks know perfectly well that they should be doing something; but they are not prepared to give up a portion of their Sundays, not even to help mould the characters of those our Lord had in mind when He said, "Feed My Lambs."

We welcome to All Saints' Mr. C. W. S. Taylor, who has accepted the office of Verger, commencing on May 24th. We ask that you will help him in his new and important work, in which we hope he will be happy. A little consideration for others, especially by those who use the Parish Hall, will obviate unnecessary work, and show that we do desire to co-operate.

A sketch block has been made (through the courtesy of Mr. A. E. Carruthers) to give some idea of the Stone of Remembrance we hope to erect as our Parish War Memorial, about which we shall communicate further with parishioners and all interested friends very shortly.

My sister and I very deeply appreciate the assurance of your prayers, your sympathy, and the evidence of your sincere friendship so generously expressed in many and varying ways by numerous enquirers in her serious illness.

fruit. The restaurant is well patronised and each day brings its quota of new customers. It would be impossible to cope with the numbers but for our band of willing helpers. Their assistance with the salad and sandwich making and the serving and waiting on tables has proved invaluable, and it is mainly for their sakes that I am making a fresh appeal to you for still more help. The work is becoming too heavy for those who are so willing to cope with it. The shifts are from 10 to 2, from 2 to 5 and from 5 to 8. Any reader who can spare four hours once a week will be playing a big part in furthering the post-war work of the C.E.N.E.F. Our restaurant, as you know, is a room to be proud of, and I think our helpers enjoy their association with it. I am also going to ask those of you who have gardens, would you please drop some flowers into the Centre when you come to town, or perhaps your husbands would be good enough to take them to their offices, where I could arrange to have them picked up.
