THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
27th February, 1939.

Dear People of All Saints',

Once again the Church invites her members to keep these six weeks before Easter as a special period of training. Each loyal member of the Church will mark the solemn season of Lent in his or her own way, but I would suggest that we give more time and thought to our private prayer, our Bible study, and our worship, so that we may learn what is the will of God for each one of us.

While John the Baptist of old called the people to get rid of their sins, to give up this or that in their personal and social lives which caused offence, Jesus was calling men to the larger task of serving the Kingdom. Jesus said: "God's Kingdom is in your midst, listen to the good news of it; open your eyes and see it; open your minds and understand it; consecrate your wills and serve it." Our greatest, our most pressing need is for God, that mankind should recover religion and replace in the centre of its activity the service of the Eternal, should recover the proportion and perspective which only a background of eternity can give, should begin to estimate the value of what is new by no other standard than that of conformity to the will of God. We who are privileged to live in such wonderful times, we who have seen vast realms of new knowledge made available for man, we who have seen so immense an enrichment of the material side of life, we who in the light of all this new knowledge ought to be able to see the glory and grandeur of God as no generation has ever yet seen them, are failing to see God in it at all, which largely accounts for the appalling muddle we find our world in to-day.

Lent, therefore, comes as an opportunity and a challenge to dedicate ourselves to the service of God; to face the reality not only of ourselves and our sins, but of God and His Christ. Penitence does not mean a morbid dwelling upon your own spiritual diseases—they are obvious enough in most of us, and although we have to face up to them, we are liable to pamper them by dwelling upon them overmuch. Penitence means opening the eyes of the spirit and seeing God. It means consecrating oneself, even though one feels unfit, to the task which God lays upon you.

I would ask again for your co-operation in the matter of Lenten gifts for the extension of Christ's Kingdom through the two great missionary societies—the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society. I am amazed and not a little saddened to find that there are still people in the Christian Church who think that the cause of Missions is something "tacked on" to ordinary work of the Church, and that if there should be anything left over, after we have settled our own domestic affairs, then we might "give it to Missions." The missionary work of the Church is an integral part of the Church's responsibility; it is our response (or lack of it) to a definite command of our Lord. No blessing can come to a church or a parish that refuses to be definitely missionary. Christ challenges us to-day as He has always done.

There is no excuse for inaction or apathy, for we all know the need, and no one can plead ignorance. "The harvest truly is great, but the labourers are few . . ." The church is an organisation of labourers for the Harvest of God in the world. A church is not set up in a neighbourhood to be supported and patronised. It is placed there primarily because it has something to give that is beyond price. It is there to impart, to bless, to serve and to save men. That exactly is the fundamental reason why any church exists in any neighbourhood. That is why All Saints' Church is in Petersham. It is not here just to be supported, far less to be patronised. It is here because the men and women of this parish need the great and unconquerable message of the Gospel of God as revealed in Jesus Christ, and need it to-day as never before in our time. Obviously the church cannot give to those who are unwilling to come and receive.

The next issue of the "Chronicle" will be on Palm Sunday (the first day of Holy Week), so it is necessary to advise you now of the Services being arranged for Holy Week and Easter. On page 8 you will find a calendar which I ask you to study and keep by you for reference, as the time draws nearer.

We all join in welcoming The Archbishop and Mrs. Mowll after their short visit to their homeland, and to Madras, where they represented Australia at the great Missionary Conference.
