THE RECTOR'S LETTER

All Saints' Rectory,
30th December, 1951.

Dear People of All Saints',

As I write, the remaining life of 1951 may be reckoned in hours. Any occasion that reminds us that the past has gone beyond recall, that the sands are running out for each one of us, that the unknown lies ahead, and that fresh opportunities are in front of us—any such occasion should be welcomed by all who are not insensitive to the great issues of life. It is a wise policy to audit one's book of life at least once a year if we wish to make a success of the business of living. Find out what you have lost or gained during the past twelve months. Have you been wasting time on things that are not really worth while? How do you stand in regard to the debt you owe to God and to His children? The end of one year and the beginning of another is a good time to take stock of our position. We make some sort of a balance of the past year, giving thanks for its joys and achievements, and confessing with sorrow its failures and shortcomings. We look back and we look forward, making our plans and our resolutions, but oftentimes forgetting to look UP, and pray for a power greater than our own. Maybe we have not been so regular as we might be, in attendance at Holy Communion and the other Services of the Church. We want to take our stand with those who absolutely refuse to surrender their Christian ideals, but we have failed through lack of courage.

I suggest we take the words Moses gave in his parting message to the Children of Israel, as our motto for the New Year: "As thy days so shall thy strength be." Again and again has this great leader of men proved the truth of these words. Although we might express the thought differently there are thousands of people who have experienced the same truth. Yet, the strange thing is, that at every new turn in the way, at every fresh hill of difficulty, in the presence of every unexpected foe, we become dismayed and unbelieving. It is a universal weakness to forget the lessons of the past when facing the future.

For the gigantic tasks before us in these difficult days our confidence must be in the strength and courage which God imparts. All experience goes to show that the work which God has sent us into the world to do will remain undone unless we are humble enough to rely on His help. Today, as ever, Christian discipleship is an exacting business. It calls for the destruction of many wayward tendencies, the acceptance of high ethical standards, and the manifestation of a Christlike spirit. We feel we cannot attain to it. We have seen the fruits of it, we admire it, but we deny that the victory is possible for natures like ours. But He Who calls us, saying, "Follow Me," gives the assurance, "Lo I am with you always, even unto the end of the age." Personally and nationally we are being faced with changes. In spite of what God has done for us in the past, we are fearful and unbelieving—the hearts of many are dismayed as they face the future and they fear the worst. I would commend to such these words of Moses; and ask you to study your own nation's history, to look into your own past, and as you face the unknown road of 1952, to discover

afresh the truth of this great assurance, "As thy days so shall thy strength be."


We record thankfully the inspiration of our well-rendered Christmas Services. The Church was beautifully decorated for the Festival by Mrs. Adams, Mrs. Bosward and Mrs. Sayers to whom (together with those who kindly brought extra flowers) we are very grateful. We were glad to welcome our old friend, the Revd. A. E. Gardner (recently returned from abroad), and to have his assistance at the Christmas Day services. Mr. Gardner leaves shortly to join the staff of Caulfield Grammar School: he will take with him our good wishes in his new appointment.

We commend to you the Churchwardens' Appeal for the Rectory Repair Fund. It is many years since anything was spent on the Rectory. As some of the work is of an urgent nature, we hope for a ready response. There is something to be said for the old Latin tag, "Bis dat qui cito dat"—"he gives twice who gives quickly!"

We at the Rectory wish you **ALL** that inward happiness of service to God and man which alone can put any real meaning into the old, old wish

A SPECIAL MESSAGE TO ALL PARISHIONERS

2nd January, 1952.

Fellow Parishioners,

As you are aware, the Rectory is an important part of All Saints', Petersham, which wields much influence for good in our district. We, the Wardens, and Parish Councillors, are seriously concerned at the condition of the building, the deterioration being such that immediate repairs and renovations are essential. The water service is also in a deplorable condition, and a complete renewal of the piping is an urgent necessity. The kitchen, and indeed most rooms in the building, require attention to make the building habitable. From preliminary enquiries we gather that the cost of the necessary work would be in the vicinity of £400, and it is apparent that any undue delay in carrying out the repairs would ultimately involve the Parish in an even heavier cost. The financial commitments of the Parish make it impossible to meet such an expenditure from our General Fund. It has, therefore, been decided to make a special appeal for the purpose mentioned. On page four appears a slip which we invite you to detach and forward with your contribution to the Hon. Treasurer, care of All Saints' Rectory, Stanmore Road, Petersham. As an alternative you may use the special envelopes which are available in the Church Porch. They are marked "Rectory Repair Fund," and all donations will be acknowledged in the "Chronicle."
