

AUSTRALIAN CHURCH WOMEN - N.S.W. STATE UNIT

MINUTES of COUNCIL MEETING held at 222 Pitt Street Sydney on Monday August 28 1995.

OPENING; President Lucelle King welcomed members and asked that all pray for the U.N. Women's Conference at Beijing to commence on 30th August. Devotions were presented by Executive Members using those prepared by Lucelle for National Conference based on 'Jesus, Women and the World'. Matthew 25:31-46, Matthew 28:18-20.

PRESENT: 37 members as per attendance sheets.

APOLOGIES: 27 (including E. Cox, P. Blake, H. Reid, M. Ward, J. Harrison).

MINUTES of meeting of June 18 were confirmed after correction of Mrs. "Cela" Cooper's name and under Business Arising - 4. National Conference - "observers accommodation to be paid by relevant denominations and travelling expenses be paid by the Unit."

BUSINESS ARISING:

1. ECUMENICAL LUNCHEON JULY 17 - very successful occasion - 95 attending. Many favourable reports. Thanks to Marie McCann for her excellent organisation of the day and to Beth Finlay for organising Scots Church facilities and transport of food, etc.

Thanks to Hazel McIver, Heather Reid, Shirley Wells, Beryl McLachlan, and Joan Oeding for their efficient handling of food preparation - heating etc. Programme well received.

Sister Lynne Green's ecumenically encouraging address very thought provoking. "Women are natural ecumenists and have a special role to play in making visible the search for Christian unity".

2. NATIONAL CONFERENCE: Thirteen members attended from N.S.W. Unit. Conference very well organised by Victorian National Committee. Rev. Jill Manton gave splendid Bible Studies on the "Woman at the well", "Martha" and "Mary Magdalene" - how special they were to Jesus in His Ministry. Our motion re possibility of change of name to "Church Women United" (because of conflict with other organisations using the acronym 'ACW' - Australian Council of Women, Australian Civilian Widows, etc.) was defeated. Our Motion re the possibility of having two forms of Service available for Fellowship Day and World Community Day - one traditional and another to appeal to younger women - was passed - to be considered. Regarding the Winifred Kiek Scholarship 1996, two projects in Cambodia will be supported through the Cambodian Christian women's Association - a weaving and tailoring course and literary and English language classes - more details later. It was interesting to meet Mrs. Athalie Glose, Rev. Winifred Kiek's grand-daughter; she is the Winifred Kiek Convener in South Australia. *Ford*

3. FUNCTIONS ATTENDED: PWA luncheon - Heather Reid attended, July 3. UCA Mission Support August 11 - Lucelle King attended, with Margaret Jessup. Mothers' Union Forum on 'Euthanasia' Aug 11, Mina Whybourne attended, BCA - August 17 -

National Council of Women Foundation Day - Marie McCann had been nominated as 'Woman of the Year' with several others. Mrs. Sarie Brown received the title, with Marie receiving a special certificate. Mrs. Brown is the first woman elected to the Board of the Great Synagogue and is very involved in community work.

Proposal from Dr. Ann Pattell-Gray regarding 1st National Ecumenical Aboriginal Christian Women's Conference 2-10 December 1995 - requiring financial assistance for aboriginal women to attend (\$10,000 has been contributed by Australian Church Women - passed at National Conference) . It was proposed Edith Ridge seconded Marie McCann that we pay the registration fee of an aboriginal or Torres Strait person to attend the Conference. Registration fee \$150.00. Carried.

It was moved Dorothy Woodhouse seconded Helen Stutchbury that we contribute \$500 to form half of one of these sponsorships. Carried.

World Community Day: 2520 printed - 43 parcels sent.

A.C.W.C. Joan Tong reported that Ms Iluminada Domingo will be attending the Beijing Conference representing A.C.W.C. (and as we are affiliated with A.C.W.C. thus representing Australian Church Women also) .  
Joan Stott will represent an ecumenical group of women.

WINIFRED KIEK SCHOLARSHIP: Full report regarding 1995 Scholar, Mrs. Captain Lily Politini and her attendance at the World Women's Christian Temperance 33rd Triennial Convention - May 3rd to 10th - in Melbourne is written in the June-July edition of A.C.W. National News, distributed to members.

GENERAL BUSINESS:

FELLOWSHIP DAY COMMENTS: Attendances over all very good. Lucelle King reported that at her first Fellowship Day in Camden, attendance had been 40. This year the attendance had grown to 100.


SISTER LENORE SHARRY- had died in Melbourne in June. She was very involved with the Council for Christians and Jews. (She had been a member of Australian Church Women Council as a Catholic representative - N.S.W. Unit). A special fig tree has been planted in her memory, in Phillip Park, opposite St Marys Cathedral - 100 people present including Marie Majoor and Beth Finlay - a tree has also been planted in Israel in her honour.

MRS. MABEL WYLIE - Deaconess Mary Andrews had attended a Memorial Service for Mrs. Mabel Wylie, the first President of Australian Church Women. Deaconess Andrews was asked to write an appropriate Minute to be recorded in the Memorial Bursary Book when a donation would be sent to the National Executive.

President Lucelle thanked Anglican members for providing the morning tea and Salvation Army for the room set-up.
