THE RECTOR'S LETTER.

All Saints' Rectory,
29th July, 1940.

Dear People of All Saints',

Our Consecration Festival now looms very close; and if it is to be a success, we shall need the full co-operation and support of all parishioners. Sunday, August 18, will be observed again as a "Back-to-All Saints' Sunday," and you can help considerably by getting in touch with all the former parishioners you know, and inviting them to worship in their old parish church on that day. You can assist also by inviting present parishioners, particularly those who do not attend church regularly, and those who do not come at all. Above all, please remember the Festival Services in your daily prayers.

All the men of the parish who are communicants are invited to attend the early celebration on August 18, and to join in the fellowship of the Men's Communion Breakfast which follows. You will find particulars of the services being arranged for the Festival elsewhere in this issue.

Those who have collecting boxes, which have been in use for the past five months (in lieu of a fete) will please return them on the Festival Sunday. For those who have no box, there is a **special envelope** issued with this "Chronicle," in which you are asked to place your **special offering** and bring it to church on the same Sunday.

In connection with our Festival, there is the Parish Tea and Social Re-union on Wednesday, August 21. All Saints' Parish Tea has been so wonderfully successful, and so very greatly appreciated in years past, that we feel we should like to maintain the very high standard. Donations are invited from any who may be willing to give a table or part thereof, and promises of donations in kind will be most welcome. Admission to the Tea and Social Re-union is by ticket, which costs one shilling, and which may now be had from members of the Women's Guild, from your District Visitor, or from the Rectory. You will understand the importance we place upon the sale of tickets, for it is only by such sale that we can hope to approximate the number for whom it will be necessary to provide. In short, it will be a help if you purchase your ticket as soon as possible.

Confirmation classes commence during the first week in August, as already advised. Will those who desire preparation please fill in the form provided in the July "Chronicle," and send it in immediately. It is absolutely essential that the candidates for Confirmation should attend the classes **regularly**, and should put their preparation classes before all other engagements. If sufficient adults apply for preparation, it may be possible to form a class for adults only.

In common with many other parishes, All Saints' has felt the effect of prevailing influenza and measles epidemic. The Rector has been afflicted, and at the present moment is dictating this letter under great difficulties. What is lacking therein he trusts you will excuse.

B.C.A.—It is twenty-one years since the late Bishop Kirkby founded the Bush Church Aid Society. We feel, therefore, this year, that we must do something of a special nature to mark the coming-of-age of the B.C.A. The Organising Missioner, Rev. T. Jones, will preach at All Saints' at both morning and evening services on September 1, and will also come on the following Tuesday, September 3, to give a B.C.A. Travel Talk. It is hoped that everybody will make a special point of attending, both on Sunday and the Tuesday, especially when many are stating that they cannot do as much for B.C.A. as they used to do. We all know the many claims made upon us these times, but we cannot, and must not, let the work of the B.C.A. suffer.

During the short time he has occupied the position, he has endeared himself to all, and we shall indeed miss him.
